SPECIAL SESSION OF LEGISLATURE SET SEPT. 16

Austin, Aug. 28 -Governor Allred definitely decided today to recall the Legislature for a special session Sept. 16 to consider liquor regulations and possibly other laws.

Whi's he was hopeful legis ation could be completed in 30 days, the belief was held in other quarters that because of the controversial matters with which it would deal, a 60 day day session would be necessary.

Governor Allred said the first subject submitted would be liquor regulations and that his proclamation, expected tomorow, would probably contain a clause under which other subjects might be submitted from time to time.

"In making up my mind on Sept. 16, I have not only talked with members of the Legislature, but particularly with Lieutenant Governor Walter Woodul, Speaker Coke Stevenson and representative R. A much asked question is: "To what extent are government policies dulged to the full without regard for others or for himself. responsible for the improvement?" A few think that if congress took a swing to the right, the course of recovery would be immeasurably accelerated. That is a matter of opinion - and, in the light of recent Presidential statements, there seems little chance that the administration will go conservative. Here are some business briefs of interest:

RETAIL TRADE: Well above lest year, with chain systems having a particularly favorable experience. (Sales for J. C. Penny dry-goods chain recently broke all records for first-half-year sales.) National Retail Dry Goods Association forecasts thart the fall season will bring a 10 to 15 per cent additional increase. CONSTRUCTION: Substantially a bove last year. Residential awards in a recent month were 143 per cent over the same month in 1934. General Motors has announced that it will spend \$50,000,000 for new plant capacity - this represents the largest sum any corporation has decided to spend for building in a long time. For the first seven months of this year, industrial contracts totaled \$99,000,000 - within a few millions of the total for the entire wear of 1934.

FARM EQUIPMENT: Belief is that 1935 will be the best year for this industry since 1930. Farmers are buying again because their existing epuipment is inefficient or wornout, and they want to replace it. Most farm equipment manufacturers have taken heavy operation losses in recent years - now they are again in the market.

AGRICULTURE: It is the forecast that total farm income for 1935 will be more than \$1,000,000,000 over 1934 -- which exceeded 1932 by \$1, News Service, expert fact-finding and forecasting organization, says there that. At Chicago, incoming hog shipmerts recently touched an all-time low, while prices reached the highest level since 1929.

Next year will be Centennial year for Texas and Kent County should be represented at this celebration and the only way a credible show for this County could be arranged is for every farmer to start right now in selecting his best ears of corn, best heads of grain and vegitables. All products like corn and grains must be stored away in the dry and safe from rats and mice. As to fruits and small vegetables, select the finest specimens as to form and size. Handle carefully and place in a bottle, arranging tuem so as to show best, Fill each bottle to the neck with fruit, then pour on the liquid recommended, filling the bottle within 1-2 inch of the stopper, so as to entirely cover the fruit. Then place the stopper in the bottle and run a little melted beeswax or paraffin over the joint to make it air tight. The following preservations are used by the U. S.

Department of Agriculture: 1. Boric Acid, 1 lb; water, 45 lbs. Disolve by agitation, and then add 5 pints of alcohol. If the fluid is not clear, allow to stand and settle, when the clear upper portion may be poured off and the remainder filtered.

2. Sulphurous acid, 1 pint; water, 8 pints; Alcohol 1 pint. Allow the mixture to stand and should there be sediment, pour off the clear liquor and filter the remainder.

The few damaged the many-and everyone involved, save the crook was the loser.

Of the myriad new federal laws and restrictions, security regulations seems to be one of the few that is of real benefit to the people. The investor has assurance that securities offered him are based on legitimate business activities and that the prospectus tells the truth. If an issue is speculative, it must be so labeled, which is certainly fair enough. Both those who wish to gamble, and those who wish to invest conservatively, can make an inteligent choice of issues.

CONTROL OF CREDIT A BASIC QUESTION

Economist Describes Conflict Between Opposing Social Viewpoints on Government Bank.

Agitation for government banking is a phase of the conflict between our presents "personal competitive enterem" in America and the "com pulsory state collective security system" of several European States, Virgil Jordan President National Industrial Conference Board, says in an article in a recent issue of "Banking" published by the American Bankers Association

"They involve irreconcilable principles of human conduct and philosophy of life and the conflict between them is the key to the economic, social and political struggles of today," Mr. Jordan says.

The enterprise system of which "the development of the United States has been the unparalleled example, depends for its motive power of progress upon the inexhaustible reservoir of energy in individual desire for personal advancement in prosperity, but it guarantees nothing to the individual save freedom of opportunity," the article

The collectivist security system, he says, "places all emphasis upon the maintenance of a minimum standard of living for the mass without regard to the creative power of the individual. Quite simply the security system involves the modern form of the philosophy of the slave society." He continues

A Sign of the Times "The many-sided movement toward governmental banking, deposit insurance and currency management is the most direct and decisive expression of the universal instinctive search for security which is the sign of the times. In America our so-called social security legislation is an important indication of the drift away from the enterprise system toward a collectivist security system with concentration of author ity in a central Federal government.

"The nationalization of credit is crucial and indispensible for complete state control of the complex industrial and business structure of this coun-The drive toward government banking and monetary control is most determined because the relation of the state to credit goes to the root of the enterprise system. A collective security system is inconceivable without nationalization of credit. An enterprise system is inconceivable with it."

Under a collective security system based on government banking the controis "lie solely in the hands of a few persons and depend upon their judgthat it is they who must de determined plan or upon pure political expediency of the moment, what lines of industry and even what individual enterprises shall have access to the credit reservoir." The state, he says, has the power of life and death over all enterprise that utilizes credit.

"Every government is an organ of party power and must respond to the will of the party that put it in power," the Jordan article says, "Under unchecked government operation it is an inescapable tendency of every currency to depreciate and for credit to expand. However much it may be in the interest of the nation, deflation is too dangerous politically for any governmer to undertake it deliberately.

"In the end government banking and curre cy management resolve themselver simply into the use of credit as a poll; cal instrument of power, and this in rument tends to be used in the long un for expropriation of the savings of the community."

THE FARM BUDGET

With the accumulated data from previous inventories and budgets, budget making becomes easier and more accurate and valuable. The budget helps to formulate a financial program. It is of special importance in arranging to meet special or large expenditures. If the income and expenditures are carefully budgeted it prevents the spending of money needed for interest and taxes before the time of their payment arrives. It neips to provide a reserve.

The Agricultural Commission of the American Bankers Association feels that this type of work is so important that special emphasis has been placed upon the field of farm inventories, budgets and credit statements as one f its national projects for farm aid.

Austin, Aug. 28 -Governor Allred definitely decided today to recall the Legislature for a special session Sept. 16 to consider liquor regulations and possibly other laws.

While he was hopeful legis ation could be completed in 30 days, the belief was held in other quarters that because of the controversial matters day session would be necessary.

ECONOMIC HIGHLIGHTS

Statistics indicate that both the current business situation and the business outlook are improving. Many important industries are doing better ually running ahead of their 1529 experience.

A much asked question is: "To what extent are government policies responsible for the improvement?" A few think that if congress took a swing to the right, the course of recovery would be immeasurably accelerated. That is a matter of opinion - and, in the light of recent Presidential statements, there seems little chance that the administration will go conservative. Here are some business briefs of interest:

RETAIL TRADE: Well above last year, with chain systems having a particularly favorable experience. (Sales for J. C. Penny dry-goods chain recently broke all records for first-half-year sales.) National Retail Dry Goods Association forecasts thart the fall season will bring a 10 to 15 per cent additional increase. CONSTRUCTION: Substantially a bove last year. Residential awards in a recent month were 143 per cent over the same month in 1934. General Motors has announced that it will spend \$50,000,000 for new plant capacity - this represents the largest sum any corporation has decided to spend for building in a long time. For the first seven months of this year, industrial contracts totaled \$99,000,000 - within a few millions of the total for the entire wear of 1934.

FARM EQUIPMENT: Belief is that 1935 will be the best year for this industry since 1930. Farmers are buying again because their existing epuipment is inefficient or wornout, and they want to replace it. Most farm equipment manufacturers have taken heavy operation losses in recent years - now they are again in the market.

AGRICULTURE: It is the forecast that total farm income for 1935 will be more than \$1,000,000,000 over 1934 -which exceeded 1932 by \$1, News Service, expert fact-finding and forecasting organization, says there that. At Chicago, incoming hog shipmerts recently touched an all-time low, while prices reached the highest level since 1929.

CONTROL OF CREDIT A BASIC QUESTION

Economist Describes Conflict Between Opposing Social Viewpoints on Government Bank.

Agitation for government banking is a phase of the conflict between our present "personal competitive enterprise system" in America and the "compulsory state collective security system" of several European States, Virgil Jordan, President National Industrial Conference Board, says in an article in a recent issue of "Banking" published by the American Bankers As-

"They involve irreconcilable principles of human conduct and philosophy of life and the conflict between them is the key to the economic, social and political struggles of today," Mr. Jordan says.

The enterprise system of which "the development of the United States has been the unparalleled example, depends for its motive power of progress upon the inexhaustible reservoir of energy in individual desire for personal advancement in prosperity, but it guarantees nothing to the individual save freedom of opportunity," the article says in part.

The collectivist security system, he says, "places all emphasis upon the maintenance of a minimum standard of living for the mass without regard to the creative power of the individual. Quite simply the security system involves the modern form of the philosophy of the slave society." He con-

A Sign of the Times "The many-sided movement toward governmental banking, deposit insurance and currency management is the most direct and decisive expression of the universal instinctive search for security which is the sign of the times. In America our so-called social security legislation is an important indication of the drift away from the enterprise system toward a collectivist security system with concentration of authority in a central Federal government.

"The nationalization of credit is crucial and indispensible for complete state control of the complex industrial and business structure of this country. The drive toward government banking and monetary control is most determined because the relation of the state to credit goes to the root of the enterprise system. A collective security system is inconceivable without nationalization of credit. An enterprise system is inconceivable with au-

Under a collective security system, based on government banking the controls "lie solely in the hands of a few perrane and depend upon their judg-ment, will or caprice," Mr. Jordan says, adding that it is they who must dedetermined plan or upon pure political expediency of the moment, what lines of industry and even what individual enterprises shall have access to the credit reservoir." The state, he says, has the power of life and death over all enterprise that utilizes credit.

"Every government is an organ of party power and must respond to the will of the party that put it in power," the Jordan article says. "Under unchecked government operation it is an inescapable tendency of every currency to depreciate and for credit to expand. However much it may be in the interest of the nation, deflation is too dangerous politically for any government to undertake it deliberately.

"In the end government banking and currency management resolve themselves simply into the use of credit as a political instrument of power, and this instrument tends to be used in the long run for expropriation of the savings of the community."

chinery, fencing, livestock, etc., it may be necessary to limit other branches in order to meet these pressing require-The budget helps to formulate a financial program. It is of special importance in arranging to meet special or large expenditures. If the income and expenditures are carefully budg-

eted it prevents the spending of money needed for interest and taxes before the time of their payment arrives. It helps to provide a reserve. The Agricultural Commission of the American Bankers Association feels that this type of work is so important that special emphasis has been placed

upon the field of farm inventories, budgets and credit statements as one € its national projects for farm aid.
