By Senator G. H. Nelson

I give the above figures to let you now that you cannot keep men in our Legislature without it costing you an enormous sum and that the more you have there, the more the cost. Still, the actual cost in dollars and cents for the operation of your Legislature is not the propelling motive for my adherence to the one house system. In fact, from a saving on supplies, salaries and such like the greatest saving will not come.

The greatest saving will come because of the abolition of the free conference committee. Likewise because of the abolition of such committee laws will be passed which will compart with the wishes of the people. Let me give you three examples.

During the 44th. Legislature at /the first called session the question of passing a law in compliance with the expressed will if the people on the liquor question arose. A bill passed the Sanate of Texas which included the defination of a Saloon such as would scrohibit being sold in Texas by the drink. History of Unicameral State Ad Valoren Tax Rate Cut To 65 Cents

Austin, May 21, - The State ad valorem tax rate has been reduced from 77c to 62c and the \$1,109,472.54. Thus you can the Confederate Pension fund, at

The \$18.50 per capita apportionment is the largest ever made by the State of Texas. It will effect th destiny of about 1,558,000 scholastics.

During the Allred administration about three million dollars will have been paid for the Centennial. Every debt of the available free school fund has been paid and appropriations for rural aid have been increased by two million dollars per year. Since September of last year \$2,731,000.00 has been set aside for sinking fund and interest on the State's bonded indebtedness. The State owes at this time \$13,-537,750.00 on the twenty million dollar relief bonds votedl in 1933.

Tax payers have been saved approximately four and three-quarter million dollars by the slash in the State ad valorem rate from 77c to 62c, the Governor pointed out.

Allred said: "We all realize that during the past five years both the State and National governments have been called upon to assume financial responsibilities entirely new to the sphere of governmental responsibilities. Seed is getting scarce and its hoped that the rain will come in more temperate quanities until the crops are up to where they can stand these weekly down-pours. Weeds and grass are doing fine. The pastures are looking better than in years. Farmers are very busy, either fighting weeds or replanting. None seem discouaged as this part of Texas has always made the best crops when weeds were plentiful as the same conditions which make weeds grow thriftly makes the crops produce abundantly. 

PAINT AND VARNISH REMOVED WITH MINIMNM EFFORT AND FOR COUNTY JUDGE AND COST

"Every trace of old paint or varaish can be removed by using a lye solution, and the wood is left smooth for the next coat of stain," reported Juanita Ybarra, bedroom demconstrator of the Harmony H. D. club.

Juanita's dresser had been finished with dark oak varnish, which had become scarred with use and she removed the varnish with the following solution: to one gallon of boiling water, add one cars of lye. Fill bucket one half full of the water, then add the lye gradually to prevent boiling over. With an old broom or dish mop apply solution. Remove Enish from a small portion at a time and work quickly to keep lye from sating into the wood. Rinse thoroughly with water, then rinse with vinegar to neutralize the action of the lye. Dry well and smooth down with 00 sandpaper if necessary. This may be used satisfactorily on floors to remove original or varnish.







RABIES CONTROL RULES ARE GIVEN

Austin, May 6,-Rabies is increasing in prevalence in many parts of Texas, although it may be controlled and even could be exterminated by intelligent measures, according to records of the State Health Department. Unfortunately it has been the practice to wait to apply control measures until the disease is wide spread.

The dog is the chief source of rables infection in man, but all warm blooded animals are susceptible. Contrary to a wide spread belief, rabies is not a warm weather disease. It occurs just as frequently in the cold months. The most logical procedure in the control of rabies would be to vaccinate all dogs. Where this is impossible the stray dog should immediately be impounded, for the stray dog is chiefly responsible for the spread of rabies.






