All of this just goes to show how a simple little remark made by a club woman about trying to get more business in our community so the people won't have to leave home, can snow ball into something big. Or how a simple little idea, once it gets started can gain in momentum until it is a big idea.

Jayton, in a few years may be the seat of a big copper manufacturing center. Some time the name might be changed to Coppertown, who knows? Or one man might be able to eat all the copper that is ever produced here. This writer does not propose to even guess what the outcome will be.

But the point here, I want for a community to grow and to stay in pace with the rest of the world, the chief thing is ideas. Scientists, promoters, bookkeepers, mechanics, salesmen and managers or what have you... they are not important, they can always go out in the market and employ them.

Let the person with an original idea... there is the thing that will do a community some real and lasting good.

A West Texas town a few years ago, in which this writer once lived, posted a highway sign that pretty well describes our community: Home of a certain number of fine people and a few old soreheads.

## LOST ACRES MEAN MANY DOLLARS TO KENT COUNTY

In the year 1961 Kent County farmers planted 19,945 acres out of an available 21,671 or only 92%. This represents a loss of 1726 acres based on the average yield of 247 lbs of lint this cost the county the revenue on 426 bales at \$150 this amounts to \$63,900.00.

Considering the effort being made by those interested in the betterment of Kent County it would seem that a good bit is missed by not getting all the cotton acreage that is available, seeded this year, or so things Kent County ASCS office manager Joe Favor.

The County Committee met Wednesday to consider requests for additional acres that have been released. In approving these requests for additional acres the committee urges each farmer to plant his entire allotment. This will help preserve the county allotment and also bolster income.

With the provisions made for counting only the acreage occupied as cotton this will allow farmers who normally planted two and two, and two and one to seed from one third to one half more than they had previously.

This year 99 farmers requested 1741 additional acres of which 964 were released by other farmers in the county. The county received 375 acres from other counties thus making available 1339 which was reapportioned Wednesday.

Information has just been received, Favor said, that skip rows of at least four rows wide in a uniform pattern will qualify as diverted acreage under the 1962 feed grain program.

Residents of the County may go to the office of County Clerk Gerald Fincher and vote there. Or those who are going to be away, can have ballots mailed to any out of the county place and go before a notary public and vote.

Absentee voting will continue until three days before the day of the election which will be on May 5th.

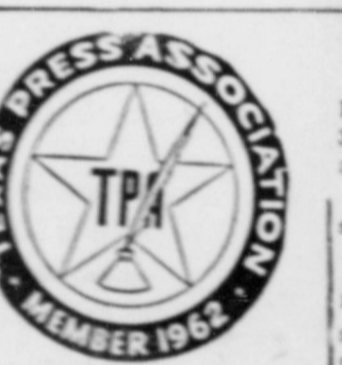

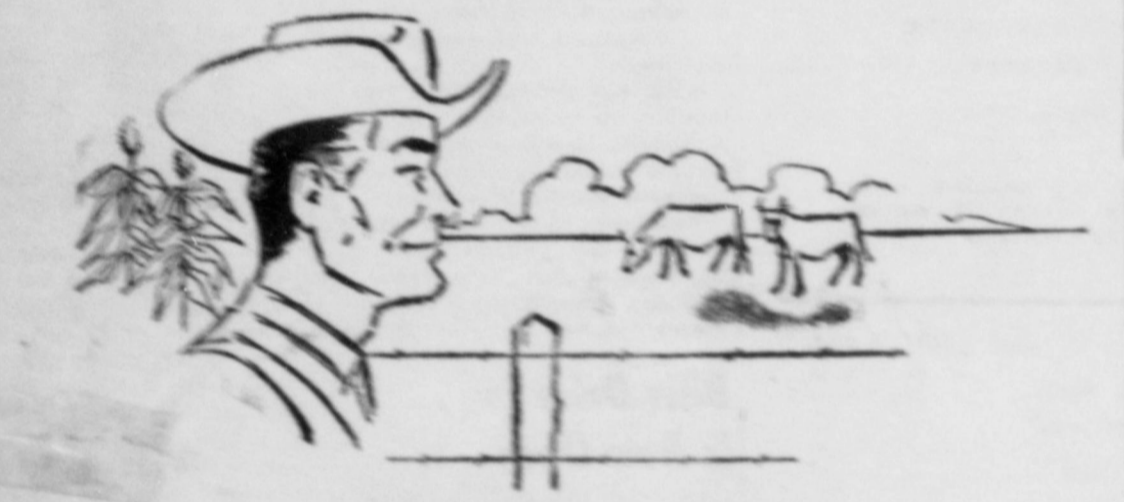

### Screw Worm Control Funds Grow

Members of the Kent County Screwworm committee reported at the meeting on Tuesday night that about \$3390 had been collected for the control of the screwworm in Texas f r o m Kent County ranchers.

Chairman J. B. Morrison also estimated that additional monies might have possibly been made available to the state research program by the ranchers who owned cattle in Kent County but resided in other counties. It is possible about 80% of the Kent County quota is being reached at this time. All who have not contributed to the control of the screw worm in Texas are urged to do so as soon as possible.

Sterile flies are being released south of a line from Del Rio to San Saba and west of a line from San Saba to Port Lavaca. This is the buffer zone where the control is being effected to eliminate the screw worm from Texas. Areas out side of this space that have screw worm cases are urged to contact the local screw worm committee of the county agent immediately so that samples of the worm can be sent into the lab and control measures set up in the affected areas.

M. V. Jay reported that the Kent Cornty committee submitted \$2500 to the state committee in mid April and about \$800 had been collected since that date. Each county committee sends its money to the state research committee on the 15 and 30 of the month.

Other committee members member, are Halley Wade, and R. R. Chisum for precinct 1, Nig Wyatt for precinct 2, Manuel Davis in 3 and L. O. Mayer in 4.

Information on the screw worm program is available at the office of the county agent.
