Tuesday is the day of the General Election in Texas and across the nation. Texans in each county will vote for State, district and local office holders. There is no contest locally. While there are a number of people in the community who embrace the Republican philosophy, there are none of them who think enough of the GOP to stand up and be counted. They all want to vote in the Democrat primary.

The Republicans will have names on the ballot in state offices and also Joe Meissner will be running for Congress. He was runner up in the special election last winter in which Purcell was elected.

Voters will be faced with 14 proposed changes in the State Constitution.

Every qualified voter ought to make an effort to vote even though you may think there is no contest. Remember, Texas has lost much of its leadership in the United States the past two years simple because the Democrats stayed at home and let the reactionaries elect the Republican to the Senate.

One of the worst mistakes the voters of Texas could make would be to elect Jack Cox as governor and turn the reign of State over to such leadership as Tower and Goldwater provide.

What is the next step in Cuba? Seems to be the current question around town. And of course no one has the answer. Something very definite is likely to break within the next day or two.

Our guess is, that perhaps by the time you read this or soon thereafter, if we do not have good reason to believe the missiles are being deployed in Cuba, that US planes will begin pin point bombing of these installations.

The US has won acclaim and support from the free world on our stand toward Cuba. It would be nothing short of catastrophic to back away from that leadership now.

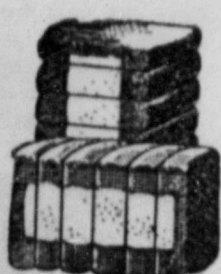
And we have no indication to think that there will be any softening of the US position now.

Somewhere, a good many years ago, we heard an old proverb, that seems to pretty well fit. Here it is: Be sure you are right and then go ahead with full strength. Evidently JFK and his advisors are carefully employing this philosophy.

DRAFT BOARD OUTLINES CLASSIFICATION PROCESS

Since President Kennedy's proclamation of arms quarantine around Cuba, some men who have no legal obligation for draft or military service have been asking draft boards how they stand. Here is the complete draft setup, as furnished by the local draft board office.

If you were born on or before Aug. 30, 1922 you are not registered with a draft board and you have no legal obligation to register. Furthermore, you have no responsibility to keep a draft board advised of your current address. If you were born after Aug. 30, 1922 you are legally required to be registered, unless you are not yet 18 years old. If you are registered and are 35, you are no longer liable for military service under present law, but you are still obligated to keep your board advised of present address.

Some men are no longer liable at ages 26 and 28. At these ages where a man is no longer liable for service he is classified V-A and the little classification notice he is required to carry in his pocket is so marked. An increasing number of people are asking draft boards for the meaning of the Selective Service classifications. These are:

- 1A: Available for military service.
- 1AO: Conscientious objector available for non combatant military service.
- 1C: Member of the armed forces, Coast and Geodetic Survey or Public Health Service.
- 1D: Qualified member of the armed forces reserve, or student taking military training including ROTC and accepted aviation cadet applicants.
- 1O: Conscientious objector available for civilian work contributing to maintenance of the national health, safety or interest.
- 1S: Student deferred by law until graduation from high school or attainment of age 20 or until the end of his academic year at a college or university.
- 1W: Conscientious objector performing civilian work in

the national interest, or who has completed such work.

1Y: A man qualified for military service only in time of war or emergency.

2A: Occupational deferment, other than agricultural and student.

2C: Agricultural deferment.

2S: Student deferment.

3A: Extreme hardship deferment, or a man with child or children. Any man who before Aug. 25, 1953 had a child or children and lived with them in his home, and so advised the board is eligible for class 3A. Any man who acquired a child or children on or since Aug. 25, 1953 is not eligible for Class 3A because of them unless military service would result in extreme hardship to them or certain other dependents.

4A: A man with sufficient prior active service, or who is a sole surviving son of a family of which one or more sons or daughters already have died in line of duty in the armed forces.

4B: Certain public officials deferred by law.

4C: Deferment of certain aliens.

4D: Minister of religion or divinity student.

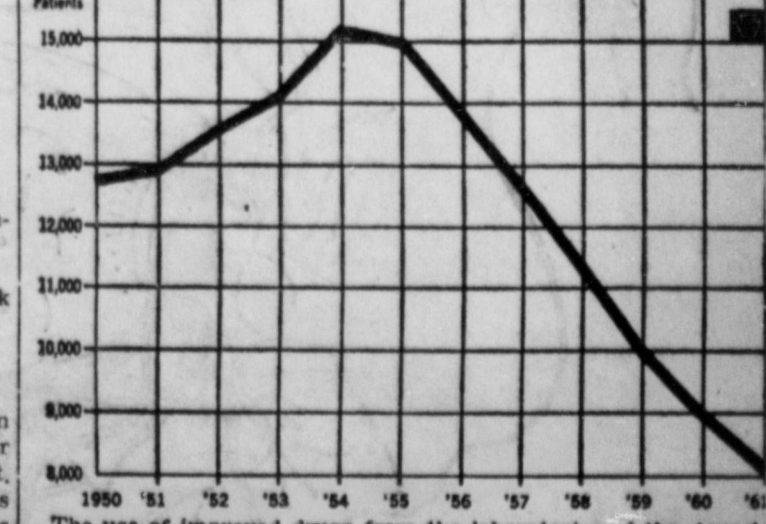
4F: Physically or mentally unfit or morally unacceptable.

VA: Over the age of liability for military service. If a man receive certain deferment resulting in classification in class 1D, 1S, 1Y, 2A 2C 2S 3A 4B and 4F before he is 26 years old his liability for military service will be extended from age 26 to ages 28 or 35 depending upon the deferment received.

Today is the final day for absentee voting in the 1962 General election. Voting may be done in the office of County Clerk Gerald Fincher.

TB DRUGS REDUCE VA HOSPITAL LOAD



The use of improved drugs from the laboratories of the American pharmaceutical industry has dramatically cut the number of war veterans hospitalized for tuberculosis, with great savings to taxpayers, according to figures released by the Veterans Administration. The daily average of TB patients in VA hospitals increased steadily to a peak of 15,221 in 1954. In that year the number of patients began to decline and has dropped steadily since, reaching a low of 8,153 in 1961. "The decrease in TB patient load can be attributed primarily to development of effective drug treatment for the disease," a VA spokesman stated.

Book Review

By Anne Fowler

THE WORKS OF ANNE FRANK

Contain the contents of the two notebooks Anne Franks left behind her on the day she and her family were arrested by the Dutch Nazi police and taken off to concentration camp. One contains her diary and the other her personal reminiscences. Essays and stories, recollections of school and of her early life in Amsterdam. In March 1945 she died in Bergen-Belsen leaving behind a legacy for all the world to read.

Anne was born in Frankfurt, Germany on June 12, 1929 to wealthy Jewish parents. When Hitler came to power in 1939 they moved to Amsterdam. In July 1942 they remained hidden in small group of rooms behind Frank's former offices and during this time Anne was writing continually, furthering her desire to be a writer. Her diary describes a typical day in their hiding place and all the details. Her old world had crumbled her new world was filled with misery.

There is no way of knowing her thoughts on the night before the Nazi police stormed in and took her away. In the heap of papers and books the police had dumped on the floor during the search for valuables, friends later found Anne's notebooks and put them aside for the day when she would come back for them -- a time that never came. This book is on file in the Kent County library.

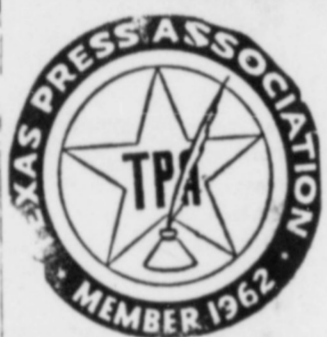

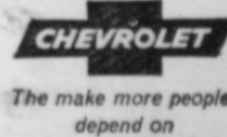
