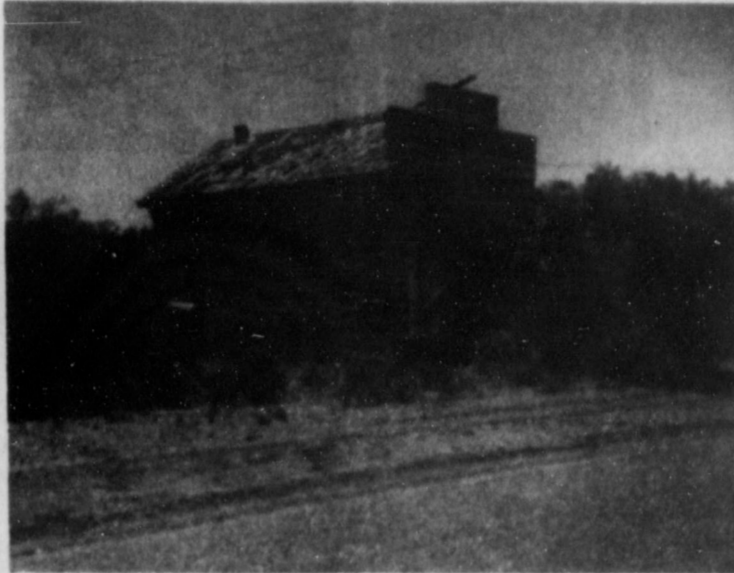

School Board To Meet Thurs. Night

The Jayton School board will hold its regular meeting Thursday night. Several important items will be on the agenda.

In his report to the board, Pierce will tell them he recommends that teachers in the system this year be paid a minimum of \$1,000.00 per year above the state recommended schedule. Special teachers will get more.

He will report a total receipt of \$2,150.80 from the auction sale recently. Kenneth Marks did a fine job" Pierce said about the sale. He will also discuss with the board the disposition of several housing units from the Girard district. They have been discussing the possibility of moving some of them to Jayton. He doubts that this is practical.

Another item to be given the board will be the pay of the auxiliary employees like the cooks and the bus drivers. He recommends that each person gets a minimum of two hours work a day. This would mean a minimum salary of \$90 per month, and some getting \$131.00 per month.

About transfers into other districts, he said the State would not permit the Spur bus to come down into the Jayton district. Arrangements will have to be made with the parents of a transfer about transportation.

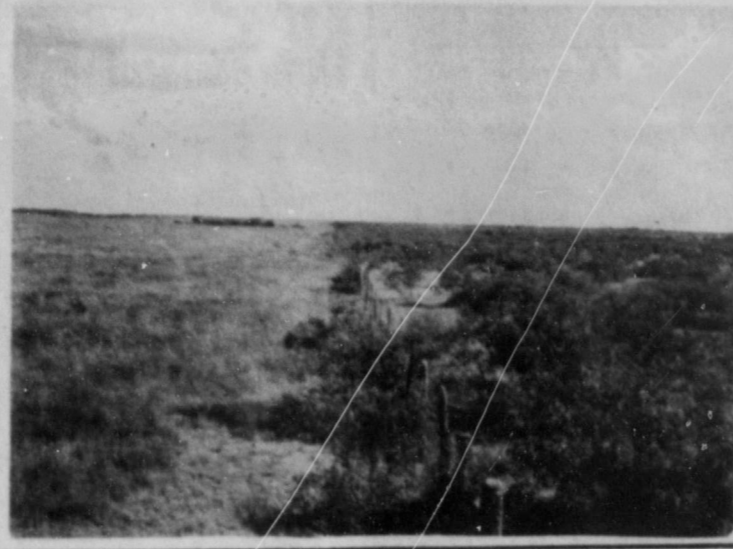

Kent Countians Give Full Support to Brush Control

Kent County farmers and ranchers have contributed almost \$2000 to the statewide Brush Control and Range Improvement Association to support research on brush problems in Texas, reports M. W. Davis of Claiborne. Davis is chairman of the Kent County BCRIA Committee. To date, over \$70,000 has been contributed to the state association.

The BCRIA was established by a group of livestock producers to fight brush invasion of land throughout Texas. The goal is to obtain 1¢ per acre, each year for five years, from landowners and other interested individuals and organizations.

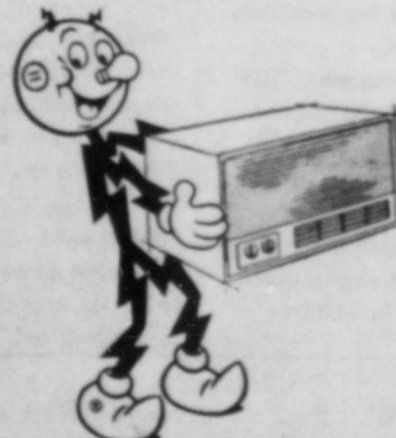
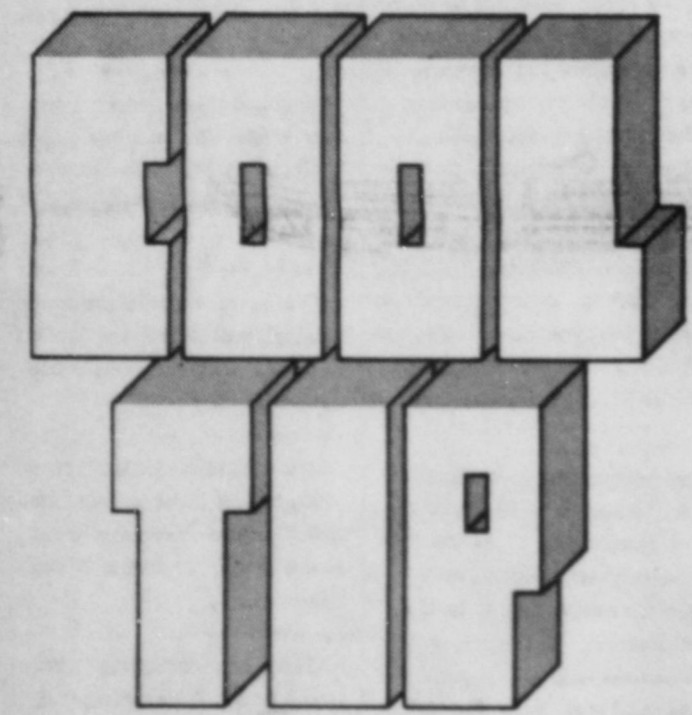

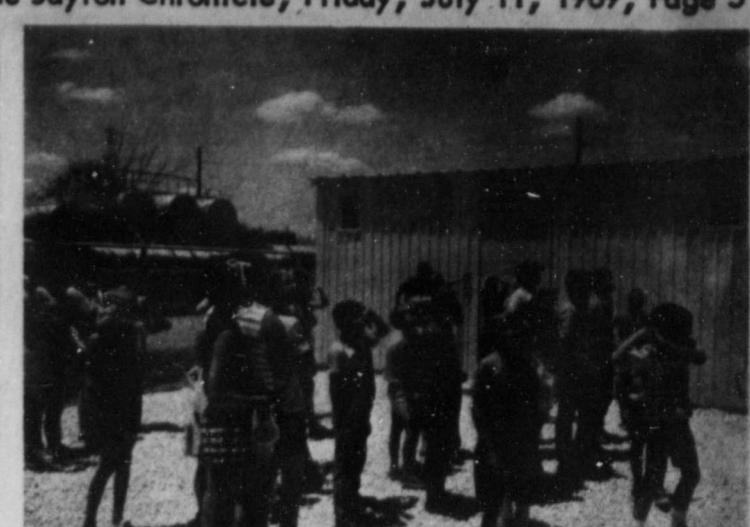

Arlington, Texas: SIX FLAGS Over Texas commenced its Summer operating schedule and is now open seven days a week from 10:00 A.M. to 10:00 P.M. through Labor Day.
The popular theme entertainment park located between Dallas and Fort Worth just opened its newest attraction, a 300-foot oil derrick, the world's tallest land based oil rig.
Completed at a cost of \$750,000 the towering attraction was originally scheduled to open at the beginning of SIX FLAGS 1969 season in mid April. However, a near four month dock strike at the Port of Houston delayed two vital pieces of equipment arriving via ship from Switzerland which was necessary to operate the attraction.
Two elevators capable of carrying 50 passengers each take visitors up to observation levels near the top of the oil rig for a panoramic view of the entire 145-acre Park stretched out below.
At the fifty-foot level of the rig, a 180-foot long 12 lane stainless steel slide is attached. Visitors can race down the entire 180-foot length of the slide seated upon fiber glass blankets in 8 or 9 seconds flat. The slide is as tall as a five story building.
SIX FLAGS new wild west show entitled "The Cavalcade of the Horse" is now in full swing. Performances are scheduled three times each day with four shows on Saturday in a 1,500 seat arena located in the Texas section.
In mid July, a new ride called the Mini-Mine Train opens. This ride is a smaller version of the very popular Run-A-Way Mine Train and was especially designed for the younger set.
Attendance during the Spring was up 13% and SIX FLAGS anticipates hosting more than 2,000,000 visitors this season.

Nevertheless, there are times when the law must and will step in. A church is not altogether "off limits." Crime is no less a crime merely because it takes place inside a church building.
For example, a court held it a punishable offense for a man to deliberately—and noisily—crack pecan nuts during a service. Even a minister was found guilty of public indecency for using profane language in the course of his sermon.
Furthermore, the law will take a hand if there is merely a question of property rights to be settled.



Pets' PEEVES

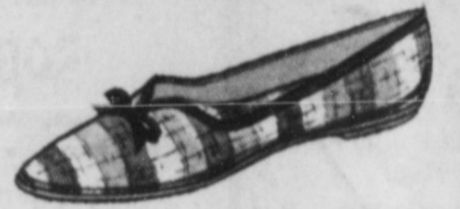
