Jaybirds Tumble To New Home Leopards, 20-14; Schedule Set For 1970 Season For District 5-B

'Birds To Invade Sands Saturday

The Jayton Jaybirds were knocked from the list of undefeated in district play Friday night when they lost to the New Home Leopards 20-14.

New Home jumped to an early 8-0 lead on a 70-yard run by Renny Farr. Jimmy Fillingim ran the extras for the Leopards.

The Jaybirds came back early in the second stanza on a 13 yard run by tailback Martin Garcia. Garcia then cashed in on the extras to tie the game up, 8-8.

New Home wasted no time in getting their lead back on a 64-yard scoring bomb from Fillingim to Craig Dwing. The try for extras failed.

The Jaybirds drew blood again as Tommy Gibson rumbled 11 yards to the double stripe. The point after failed.

The Jaybirds moved in on the New Home end zone just before half but the clock ran out, leaving them on the eight, and both teams carried 14 points into intermission.

Leopard Farr spelled doom for the Jaybirds after the half as he scored from the one. Farr had earlier set up the winning TD on a 37-yard pass by him to Fillingim. Point after failed and the scoreboard was through for the night.

Jayton drove close within stalling distance of the New Home goal in the fourth but could never push the ball across.

The loss knocked Jayton out of a lead tie and left Wilson atop the district standings.

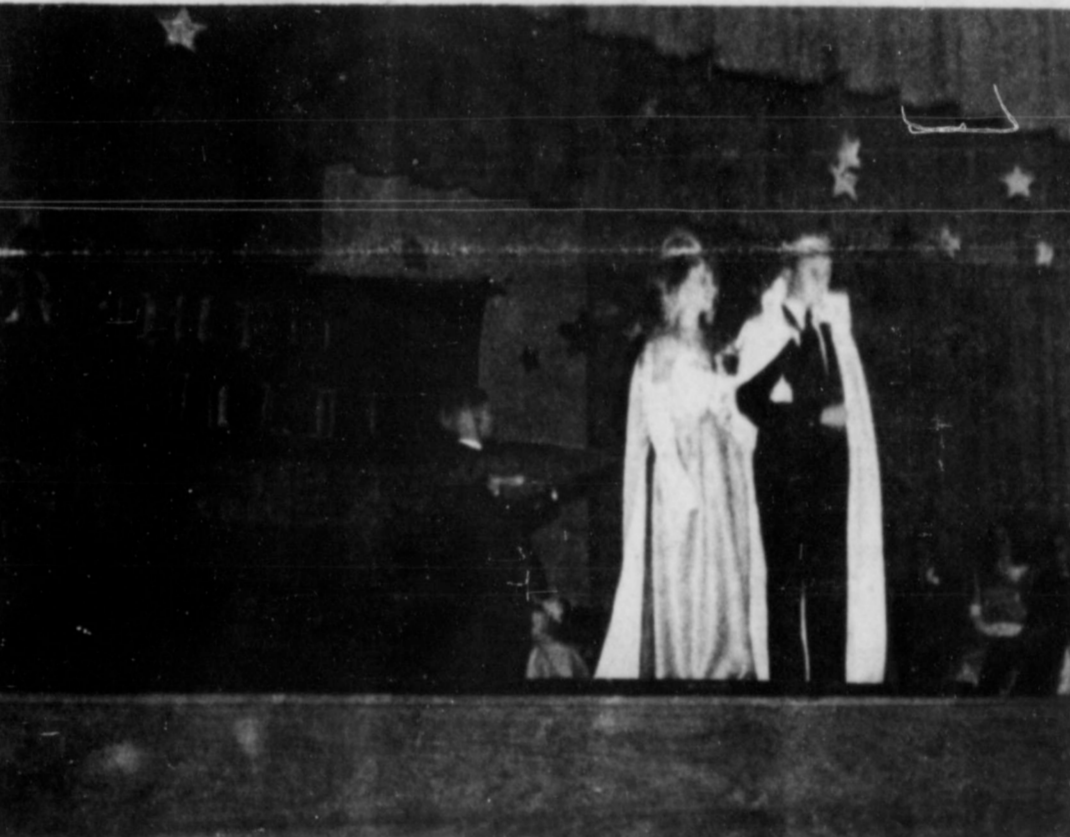
She was born Aug. 18, 1880, in Commanche. She was a member of the Baptist Church. She formerly lived in Snyder.

Ultimatum for Drinking Drivers

Alcohol-related car accidents are killing more than 25,000 Americans per year. To help catch the drunk driver, science has come up with new and improved chemical tests for sobriety. These tests, which check blood, breath, urine, or saliva, are far more accurate than such old standbys as walking a straight line or pronouncing "Methodist Episcopal."



But there has always been one big problem: what to do about the motorist who, after being stopped by a policeman, refuses to take the test. To force him to submit is to raise touchy questions of constitutional rights.

Now, however, a growing number of states are finding the answer by passing an "implied consent" law. This law says that a motorist, just by using the public streets, gives his implied consent—in advance—to a sobriety test. Then, when he is halted, he faces a kind of ultimatum: either take the test or lose your driver's license.

True, he cannot be put to this choice without reasonable grounds. An arresting officer may not insist on a test unless there are visible signs that the driver really is intoxicated.

Furthermore, it does not count as a refusal to take the test if the motorist is simply unable to carry out the officer's instructions.

In one unusual case, a motorist was unable to blow into a testing balloon because of difficulty with his dentures. A court ruled afterward that, under these circumstances, the state had no right to revoke the man's license.

On the other hand, a refusal to take the test is not excused by the fact that the motorist is later acquitted of having been intoxicated. His license can be revoked anyhow, not as a penalty for drunk driving but as a penalty for his refusal to obey the officer's lawful request.

"It must be remembered," said one court, "that it is a privilege to operate a motor vehicle on our highways and not a right. The state may prescribe conditions on which that privilege is exercised."

How many out of the ten can you answer? If you get more than five you can consider yourself a pretty good "straight", less than five and you're a real "square."

How much does the individual actually know about drugs and their use. Usually very little. Marijuana is not a narcotic, and does not cause physical dependence, but it may lead to "psychological dependence" if taken regularly. Its use is a felony. Conviction, even with suspended sentence may cause later trouble. It will cause difficulty getting a drivers license in some states, entering a profession and getting a responsible job.

LSD can differ in its effect of the same individual at different times its taken. There is no way of knowing if a "trip" will be a "good" one or a "bad" one. And then days, weeks, even months after using LSD, the things the user experienced while on the drug may recur unexpectedly. An experience on LSD can sometimes be disturbing enough to cause acute and perhaps long-lasting mental illness.

The use of amphetamines (ups) can leave a person totally depleted physically, since he feels like neither eating nor sleeping.

After each time, larger and larger doses are required to feel the effects and the regular user is usually irritable, unstable and if he tries to withdraw from the drug abruptly may suffer a suicidal depression.

Barbiturates (downs) can become addicting in regular and excessive doses. Overdose or abrupt withdrawal for a heavy user can cause death.

Heroin is psychologically and physically addicting. The addict's main goal in life becomes getting the drug. He may turn to crime to have the money to afford the drug, which can run as high as \$100.00 per day.

Marijuana has not been found to be physically harmful to the body, yet there is no current conclusive evidence that it is "medically safe."

Answers to the questions asked above are:

1. A joint is a hand-rolled marijuana cigarette.

2. A "hit" is a deep breath inhaled from a marijuana cigarette.

3. When a person "crashes", he drops off drugs abruptly.

4. A "head" is a person who regularly takes LSD, drugs, and perhaps along with marijuana.

5. "Alice's Restaurant", Arlo Guthrie.

6. "Speed Freak".

7. "to drop" a pill is to take it orally.

8. "to shoot" is to take a drug through injections in the arm.

9. "Mary Jane" is another name for marijuana,

along with grass, pot, . . .

10. A pusher is the man that supplies the drugs to the area from outside (the top man). Each pusher has "dealers" who then peddle to individuals. A "head shop" is a person dealing in marijuana and drugs and sells many accessories to accompany drugs.

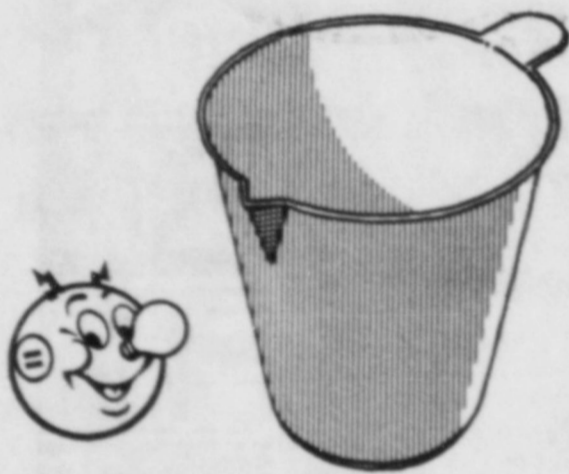
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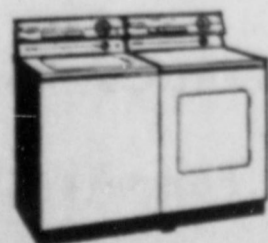
