

What Choices Mean In The Cotton Referendum

Basic program choices lorment and will be eligible will be made by cotton pro- for price-support loans. ducers voting in the Dec. 1-5 mail referendum on upland cotton marketing quotas, said W. E. Walker, Chariman of for a share of the export the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee.

A "yes" vote by twothirds or more of the producers voting in the national referendum means: Marketing quotas will be

in effect for the 1970 crop. Producers who plant within their farm allotment will be eligible for a price-support loan of 20, 25 cents a pound (for Middling 1-inch cotton at average location) on cotton they produce. They also will be eligible for a price-support payment of 16.80 cents a pound for the projected yield of cotton planted within the domestic allotment which is 65 percent of the total farm allot-

Farms with allotments of 10 acres or less or farms with projected production (allotment times projected yield) of 3,600 pounds of less may receive a payment of 11,95 cents a pound on the projected yield of 35 percent of the farm allotment. They also will receive the price-support payment on the domestic alCrowers who choose not

participate in the priceprogram may apply market acreage reserve and produce for export only, without Government assistance or marketing quota penalties. Application for export acreage must be made on or before Dec. 31, 1969

at the County ASCS Office. A "no" vote by more than one-third of the producers voting in the national referendum on upland cotton for 1970 means:

No Marketing quotas and no penalties will apply to the 1970 upland cotton crop. No price-support payments will be made. Pricesupport loans at 50 percent of parity will be available to producers who do not exceed their farm acreage allotments. Acreage allotments will remain in effect as a means of determining eligibility for the price-support loan. There will be no export market acreage re-

The ASC Committee Chairman said cotton producers will receive their acreage allotments prior to the referendum period.

This Week . .

From page one they don't mind using it.

We hear about the swanky business on Fifth and Park Avenue, but this was a real disappointment. The entire sky-scraper district is dingy, dirty and extremely crowded. There may be a very nice store, and right beside it a digny, dirty, crowded pawn shop, a cafe, a grocery, or a coin on laundry. Not more than one person in 25 would ook at home on the streets of ayton They are of all colors, races and creeds, and everyone in a hurry to get some-

If you see a cafe and a restaurant, it it doesn't have its' menu posted in the window where you can see the prices you had better not go in, unless you are on an expense account and have some-

one else to pay the bill. Everything in the East is at least fifty percent higher than in this part of the country. Food is about twice as high.

The subway is really something. They are underground, of course, with three levels of operations. As you descend the stairs to get into the sub system, you buy tokens for 20¢ each. Put a token in the turnstile, and go to the train a reas, and this entitles you to ride until you go back upground. The boarding stations are about every three blocks. They have two trains going in each direction. One a local, the other a cross town express. People get on the express, until they get as close to where they are going as they can, and then transfer to a local. The boarding stations are about a half block long. And that is about the length of the trains. The trains pulls up parallel to the station with about 10 to 20 cars. Each car has four doors on each side. The cars can be completely filled and jammed, and yet they unload and reload in from 10 to 15 seconds and the train is gone again. A car is never considered full. There are rows of benches along the walls. When they are filled, they stand and hold to straps, and they just keep jamming in,

and unloading.
