



Careful planning, however, is the only way to assure a successful and pleasant trip for your baby as well as yourself. Here are some tips on how to streamline those plans

DON'T PACK THE KITCH-EN SINK: It's a temptation when traveling by car, to take 'everything' along playpens, feeding tables, strollers. sorts of collapsible and folding gear. Usually a few pieces of multifunctional equipment are enough. For example, a car bed can be used in the back seat while traveling as well as a crib after you reach your

FORMULA PREPARATION Generally, modern prepared infant formulas provide excellent nutrition closely paral leling human milk in content and digestibility. Some formu-las, like Mead Johnson's Enfamil are available in convenient ready-to-use forms, in either bottles or cans. These formulas are ready togged your baby with little preparation on your part. BASIC FIRST AID

Since infants under a year live fairly protected lives, first ent will be simple Your doctor may recommend an infant thermometer (rectal), some baby aspirin (know the proper dosage) and, for 9 to 12-month-olds, an anti-nauseant for travel sickness, which, at your doctor's orders, can also be used as a mild sedative. For older infants, those already creeping, take along adhesive bandage, an antiseptic, petroleum jelly and other tumble or splinter soothers. And don't forget the vitamin drops,

CAR SAFETY

MAGGIE'S CAKE I stick butter

l box vanilla wafers

1 pkg. Chocolate chips

I can Angel Cocoanut 1 cup pecans

I can Sweetened Condensed Milk.

Melt butter in pan. sprinkle crushed vanilla wafers in pan; Add chocolate chips, cocoanut and pecans. Then, pour milk over all ingredients and bake at low temperature until done.

### CHERRY PECAN **UPSIDE-DOWN CAKE**

1 cup butter 2 cups sugar

1 cup pecan meats, chopped 2 cups pitted tart cherries, well

drained 21/2 cups sifted cake flour

3 teaspoons baking powder 1/4 teaspoon salt

2 eggs, well beaten % cup milk

1 teaspoon vanilla Whipped cream Fresh charries

Melt 1/3 cup butter in heavy skillet, add 1/2 cup sugar and stir until dissolved. Add nuts and cherries. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Cream remaining butter with remaining sugar until fluffy. Add eggs and beat thoroughly. Add sifted dry ingredients and milk alternately in small amounts, beating well after each addition. Add vanilla and pour batter over mixture in skillet. Bake in moderate oven (350"F.) I hour. Remove from oven and turn onto large platter. When cool, cover with whipped cream and garnish with fresh cherries. Serves 12.

### CHOCOLATE **UPSIDE-DOWN CAKE**

2 ounces (squares) chocolate 11/2 cups (1 can) sweetened con-

densed milk 11/2 cups sifted cake flour

1/4 teaspoon sait 2 teaspoons baking powder

6 tablespoons shortening 1 cup sugar

2 eggs, well beaten 1 teaspoon vanilla

1/2 cup milk


Melt chocolate, add condensed milk and mix well. Line greased pans with paper and grease paper. Pour chocolate mixture into pans and cool. Sift flour, salt and baking powder together. ### CRANBERRY **UPSIDE-DOWN CAKE**

3 tablespoons butter 11/2 cups sugar 2 cups cranberries

11/2 cups sifted cake flour 11/2 teaspoons baking powder 1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 cup shortening 1 egg, beaten 1/2 cup milk

1 teaspoon vanilla

Melt butter and 1 cup sugar baking pan; add cranberries. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Cream shortening with remaining sugar until fluffy; add egg and beat thoroughly. Add sifted dry ingredients and milk alternately in small amounts, beating well after each addition. Add vanilla. Pour batter over cranberries and bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 40 to 50 minutes. Turn upside down. If desired serve with whipped cream. Makes 1 (8x8 inch) cake.

CRANBERRY CLAZE CAKE-Omit butter and use 21/2 cups cranberries. Mix 1 cup of the sugar with 1 tablespoon cornstarch, add 1/2 cup boiling water and cook until slightly thickened. Add cranberries, spread over bottom of pan and proceed as above.

#### RHUBARB **UPSIDE-DOWN CAKE**

4 cups cut rhubarb

1 cup sugar 1 cup quartered marshmallows 1% cups sifted flour

2 teaspoons baking powde % teaspoon sait 1/2 cup shortening

1 cup sugar 2 eggs, separated Vs teaspoon almond extract

Va teaspoon vanilla

Cook rhubarb over low heat until juice begins to run, add sugar and marshmallow and mix well Simmer about 10 minutes and pour into greased cake pan. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Cream shortening with sugar until fluffy. Add egg yolks and flavorings and beat thoroughly. Add sifted dry ingredients and milk alternately in small amounts beating well after each addition. Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry and fold into batter. Pour over rhubarb mixture and bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 40 to 50 minutes. Loosen cake from sides and bottom with a spatula and turn out onto cake plate. If marshmallows are very fresh, do not add to rhubarb until just before cake batter





YOUR CHILD-HEADED FOR HIPPIE "HEAVEN"?



year old really is not an adult, and one of the advantages of

living at home is the parental guidance there available, and if you turn off all guidance you turn off one advantage of living

If you provide a girl with all the money she could possibly need to live in the city (lest, "heaven only know what she'll do to get money") you turn off another advantage of staying home: freedom from hav-But if strictness doesn't al-

ways work, and if total freedom doesn't always work, then what can you actually do? There are experts who'll disagree with one or more suggestions on almost any list, but a better than fair number of experts would agree with the following. 1. Give reasons, not just

rules. If you don't have rea-sons, why have the rule? And if you feel that you have reasons "but can't quite put them into words," consider the possibil-ity that they are not valid reasons—and that you "can't" express them because you realdon't want to.

If you want a daughter home by an early hour during the week so she can be fresh in school the next day and improve her chance of getting into college, you have a valid reason. But if you want her home early Saturday night because you don't want the neighbors to see her coming home late, you don't have a reason valid to her unless she cares about the neighbors as much as you do.

2. Be willing to negotiate.

You have the power and the money, so your child's only

alternatives, if you issue "non-negotiable demands," (kids didn't invent the concept) is to give in (again)-or leave "once and for all." You can create a third alternative negotiationif you are willing. This way, if your youngster can convince you that others in her class are staying up until 2:00 a.m. at a dance, you can bend. That's if she can convince you: negotiation doesn't mean backing away from a parental responsibility you utterly believe in.

3. Spend time with your children. Answer their questions. When they want to talk, listen. If a child doesn't have an adult to talk with comfort ably and learn things from, the child may find someone only a few years older than himself. and a youth is a less reliable instructor than a parent. Get ready to talk about sex and drugs—and to defend your views with facts—and to have facts meaningful to the child, not just to your sense of what is "right."

4. Examine your own stand-ards.
