When I was a kid not quite a hundred years ago, overseas, and bogged up to my ears in the effort that failed to make the world safe for democracy I learned something that I've got a lot of profit out of since.

Ours was a machine gun outfit and for each gun we had a mule. The Germans were pecking away at us with their artillery one evening and one of their shells scored a direct hit. There was meat anywhere you wanted to look and all of it mule. "Oh, Boy!", one of the kids yelled, "Fresh me at at last, but we'll have to e at 'er raw!"

If you read the papers, listen to the radio, watch the television and take not of it all the bickering and brawling that is going on in our country today you might get the impression that anybody who can be amused now is a lunatic and would laugh in the graveyard or on a cross. But if boys qho have no guarantee they will be alive in the next secand can face this problem without becoming maniac depressives we should at least try to stay out of the psychiatric wards and the "dumps."

I have a friend here who is the editor and owner of one of those little throw-a-way advertising papers. He is as close to the racial problems we face as anybody I know and is working as hard to solve them. But he took his nose away from that grindstone last week long enough to cook off their brand new and cogent suggestion,

He says that it will solve part of the racial problem to have the seating arrangement on all the means of public transportation built on a revolving system like Ferris Wheels and Merry-Go-Rounds, No-body would have to ride in the back-seats because there wouldn't be any.

When a pessimist goes home to his sweet wife and children and she finds a long blonde hair on his coat he knows he's hubbed it and can't move a muscle to save himself, so he humps up in a corner and waits for the storm to blow over.

The optimist on the other hand studies his problems and finds solutions. In this case he tells her something like, "Well, honey" when I came home this evening the bus was crowded and I had to share a seat with a Hippie. Every wife knows Hippies have long hair so, no sweat, and constructive thinking wins again.

Never in the history of mankind has youth been so vocal. We must try to understand the youth of today but they need desperately to try to understand the generations before them. Eric A. Walker, president of Pennsylvania University recently gave a remarkable address to the graduating class of that institution. It was so timely and pertinent and presented such refreshing view that I think it deserves repeating.

"Ladies and gentelemen of the graduating class, no one has more pride in your accomplishment than the elder generation. But I am not going to tell that older generation how bright you are. Nor am I going to say we have made a mess of things and that you are the hope of mankind.

"I would like to reverse the process. For if you will look over into the bleachers, I will re-introduce you to some of the most remarkable people ever to walk the earth; people you might want to thank on this graduation day-your parents and grandparents.

'Let me tell you about them. "These-your parents and grandparentsare the people who within just five decades have by their work increased your life expectancy by approximately 50 per cent and who, while cutting the working day by a third, have more than doubled per capita output.

These are the people who have given you a healthier world than they found. And because of this you no longer have to fear epidemics of flu, typhus, diptheria, smallpox, scarlet fever, measles or mumps that they knew in their youth. And the dreaded polio is no longer a medical factor, while tuberculosis is almost unheard of.

"Let me remind you that these remarkable people lived through history's greatest depression. Many of these people know what it is to be really poor, what it is to be hungry and cold. And because ofthis, they were determined it would not happen to you, that you would have a better life, you would have food to eat, milk to drink, vitamins to nourish you, a warm home, better schools and greater opportunities to succeed than they had.

Because they gave you the best, you are the tallest, healthist, brightest, and probably the best looking generation to inhabit the land.

"And because of them, you will work fewer hours, learn more, have more leisure time, travel to more distant places, and have more of a chance to follow your life's ambition.

"These also are the people who fought man's grisliest war. They are the people who defeated the tyranny of Hitlr, and who when

it was all over had the compassion to spend billions of dollars to help their former enemies rebuild their homelands. And these are the people who had the sense to begin the United "It was representatives of these two gene-

rations, who through the highest court of the land, fought racial discrimination at ever turn to begin a new era in civil rights.

They built thousands of high schools, trained and bired tens of thousands of better teachers, and at the same time made higher education a very real possibility for millions of youngsters-where once it was only the dream of a wealthy few.

"And they made a start-although a late one- in healing the scars of the earth and in fighting pollution and the destruction of our natural environment. They set in motion new laws giving conservation new meaning, and setting aside land for you and your children to enjoy for generations to come.

"While they have done all of these things, they have had some failures. They have not yet found an alternative for war, nor for racial hate.

"Perhaps you, the members of this graduating class, will perfect the social mechanism by which all men may follow their ambitions without the threat of force-so that the earth will no longer need police to enforce the laws, nor armies to prevent some

men from trespassing against others.
"But they—these older generations—made more progress by the sweat of their brows than in any previous era, and don't you forget it. If your generation can make as much progress in as many areas as these two generations have, you should be able to solve a good many of the world's remaining ills.

It is my hope, and I know the hope of these two generations, that you find the answer to many of these problems that plague mankind. But it won't be easy. And you won't do it by negative thoughts, nor by tearing down

or belittling. "You may and can do it by hard work, humility, hope and faith in makkind.






