Ronny Culpepper, currently employed at New Braunfels High School as head basketball coach, will begin serving as San Antonio College's new basketball mentor next fall.

The soon-to-be Ranger, who ended a four year tenure with the Unicorns, has come a long way in just a short period of time. He played his basketball at Garland High and then Henerson County Junior College and McMurry College in Abilene. After coaching junior high ball for a year in Amarillo, he was entrusted with the task of rebuilding New Braunfels basketball program at the age of



22. In 1969-1970, New Braunfels Unicorns were District 29-AAAA Co-Champions.

Culpepper is noted as a sound fundamentalist and a firm believer that a well-disciplined ball team can be a winner--despite being out-manned.

Such a philosophy paid off for New Braunfels this season just as it has in the previous four during which Culpepper has been in charge of the Unicorns' basketball program.

Culpepper may be young--he is only 26--but he has definite ideas concerning San Antonio College and its basketball program. Where the course will lead the Rangers is uncertain, but Culpepper is positive that only that only good things await.

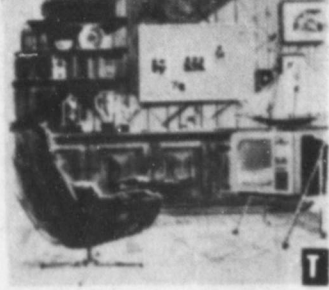
Dibrell, Brad English, and Parker Kidd.

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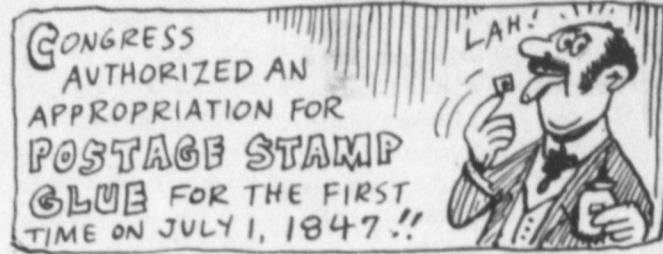

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LIBERTY AND JUSTICE FOR ALL
Our precious heritage embodied in the flag of the United States, is as alive today as it was when written for the eyes in the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution. It stands for all the world to see and for all Americans to cherish. And in the traditions of Washington, J. B. and Hamilton, we, too, have a privilege, a right, and a duty. While we may disagree as to the methods we should employ to reach the goal—that of preserving the greatest democratic society the world has ever known.
Our flag is a symbol, not of sentiment, but of history, the history of men and women willing to live and die for it. Surely this willingness is worth so well, because daily we experience more of the blessings that are ours—surely because we are Americans.

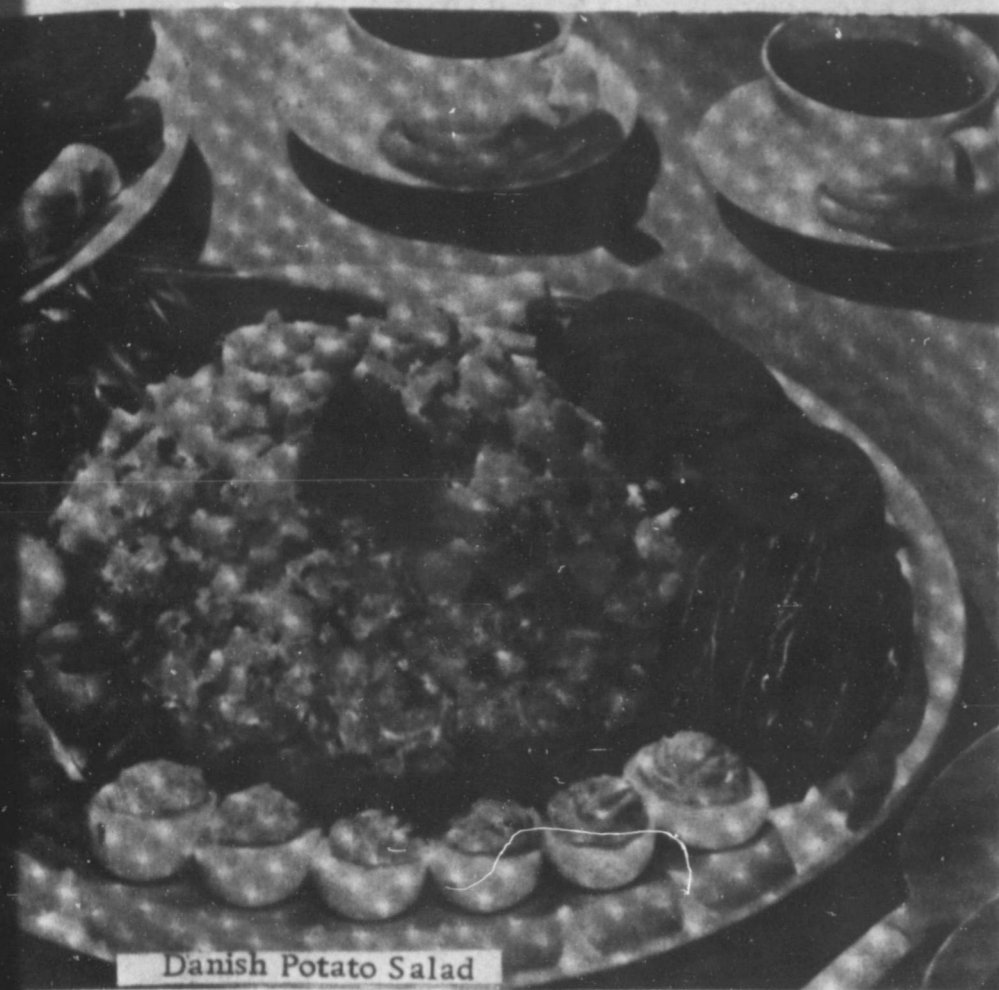

Danish Potato Salad

DANISH POTATO SALAD

|-------------------------|--|
| 1/2 cup vinegar | 4 cups cooked potatoes, cubed (about 2 lbs.) |
| 1/2 cup water | 2 hard cooked eggs, chopped |
| 1/2 cup sugar | 1/2 cup chopped cucumber |
| 1/2 tsp. salt | 2 Tbsp. minced onion |
| Dash of pepper | 1 Tbsp. chopped green pepper |
| 1 tsp. prepared mustard | |
| 2 eggs, well beaten | |
| 1 cup salad dressing | |

Combine first six ingredients; bring to a boil and reduce heat. Gradually beat in eggs. Cook, stirring constantly until slightly thickened (about 5 minutes). Toss together remaining ingredients and pour on dressing. Toss gently. (Makes about 6 servings)

In the AL East, (1) Baltimore, (2) New York, (3) Detroit, (4) Boston, (5) Cleveland, (6) Washington.

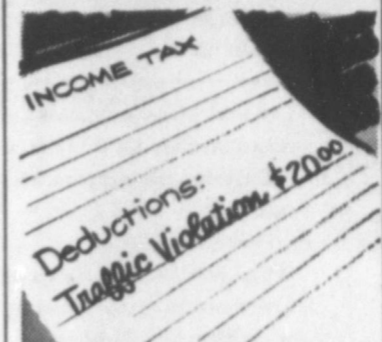
In the AL West, (1) Minnesota, (2) Oakland, (3) California, (4) Chicago, (5) Milwaukee, (6) Kansas City.

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Deduct Traffic Fines?

While hurrying to a business appointment, you are sired to the curb by a traffic officer and given a ticket for speeding. Could you deduct the amount of the fine on your next income tax return as a "business expense"?

No. The law does allow you to deduct the "ordinary and necessary" expenses of doing business. But as a matter of public policy, courts usually will not recognize lawbreaking as ordinary and necessary. For if such deductions were



allowed, the law would be imposing a penalty with one hand and "taking the sting" out of the penalty with the other.

However, a violation of law might involve other expenses, besides the fine itself, that would be perfectly legitimate deductions. Thus:

A businessman was found guilty of mail fraud. On his next tax return, he claimed a deduction for the legal expenses he had incurred in defending himself. Tax officials objected to the deduction, saying he never would have had those expenses if he had not broken the law in the first place. But the court felt otherwise, and allowed the deduction to be taken.

"No public policy is offended," said the court, "when a man faced with serious criminal charges employs a lawyer to help in his defense. It is his constitutional right."

Suppose you spend money on something which, while not strictly illegal, is still unethical. Consider this situation:

A manufacturer paid secret kickbacks to certain purchasing agents, in return for their giving preference to his products. Later, he tried to deduct these payments as business expenses.

But the court said such payments were not deductible even if they were within the letter of the law. Finding no evidence that kickbacks were common in this particular line of business, the judge said:

"The mores of the market place of this nation (are) not such that kickbacks, while they do occur, are an ordinary means of securing or promoting business."

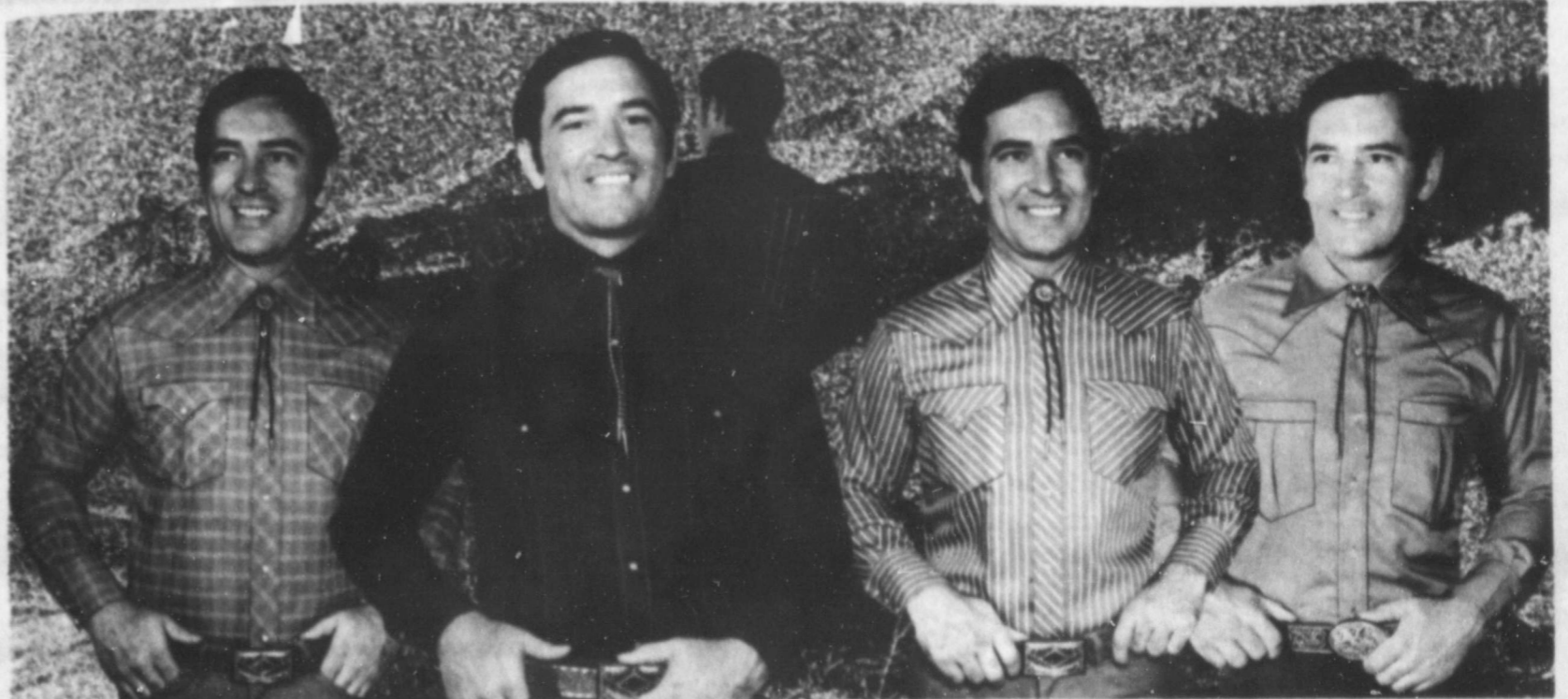
