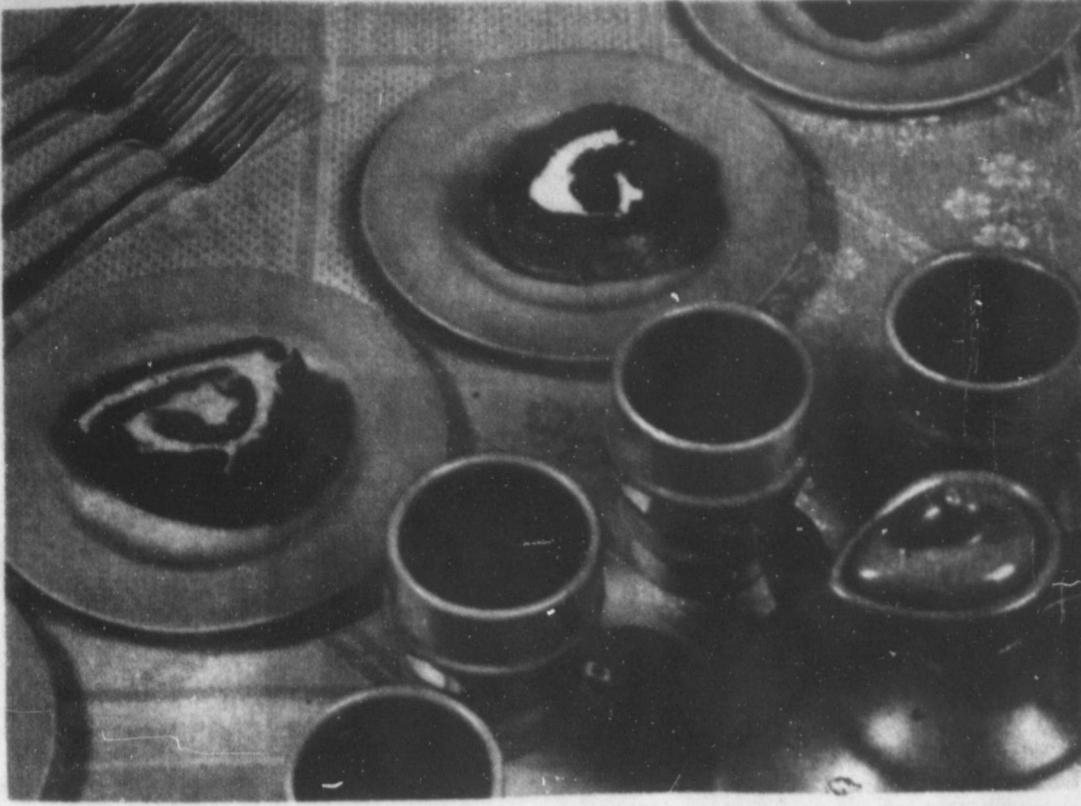

Ring Of Coconut Fudge

2 cups sugar
 1 cup cooking oil
 2 eggs
 3 cups all purpose flour
 3/4 cups unsweetened cocoa
 2 tps soda
 2 tms baking powder
 1 1/2 tps salt
 1 cup hot coffee or water
 1 cup buttermilk or sour milk
 1 tsp vanilla
 1/2 cup chopped nuts

1/2 cup flaked coconut
 1 cup (6 oz package) semi-sweet or milk chocolate pieces

GLAZE:
 1 cup powdered sugar
 3 tpsps. cocoa
 2 tpsps. butter
 2 tpsps vanilla
 1 tp. 3 tpsps. hot water

Generously grease and flour a 10 inch tube or bundt pan. Prepare filling and set aside. (No need to sift flour.) Measure by lightly spooning into cup and leveling off. In large mixing bowl, combine sugar and oil, and eggs. Beat one minute at high speed. Add

FILLING:
 1/4 cup sugar
 1 tsp vanilla
 1 package (8 ozs) cream-cheese, softened
 1 egg

remaining ingredients except filling and nuts. Beat 3 minutes at medium speed, scraping bowl occasionally by hand. Stir in nuts, pour 1/2 batter into prepared pan. Carefully spoon prepared filling over batter, top with remaining batter. Bake at 350 degrees for 70 or 75 minutes until top springs back when touched lightly in center. Cool completely, drizzle with glaze.

FILLING: In small mixing bowl, beat sugar, vanilla, cream cheese and egg, until smooth. Stir in coconut and chocolate pieces.

GLAZE: In mixing bowl, combine the powdered sugar, cocoa, butter, vanilla, and hot water. Stir until smooth.

LOOKING BACK TO JUNE 1945

Monday evening between 6 and 7 o'clock practically all of Jayton kept a close eye on the cyclone which struck the north western part Lost Lake Community. The cyclone traveled down Duck Creek on past harmony in the southern part of the county, destroying every thing in its path, completely destroying the Ing Rodgers and Luther Johnson homes. Nothing was left of the Ing Rodgers home but the Frigidaire and part of the concrete foundation. The Johnson place was a total destruction, house, garage, barn and all. Small pieces of furniture, clothing were found several miles from the place.

Dead animals chickens were carried off by the truck loads. Other homes and houses destroyed were rent houses in the Lost Lake Community and a house belonging to Mrs. Willis in the Antelope Community. The house where Bill Rackley once lived was also completely destroyed. It destroyed 3 windmills on the Overton Place, windmills on the O-O Ranch combine and other farm machinery. It took the Window with the window sill at the Bob Barbee home.

Wire from fences was wrapped around post as if done by machinery large cotton wood and mesquite trees were uprooted and wheat fields were flattened.

Rain hail accompanied the storm, the hail doing great damage to crops and buildings. The rain in Jayton was as much as 4 inches in Jayton folks in number took to their storm cellars. While others watched with anxious eyes and longed for a hole in which they could take refuge.

But Jayton escaped with only a light rain of three quarters of an inch and no rain or hail damage. As far as we know there was no one injured in the storm.

COMMUNICATIONS

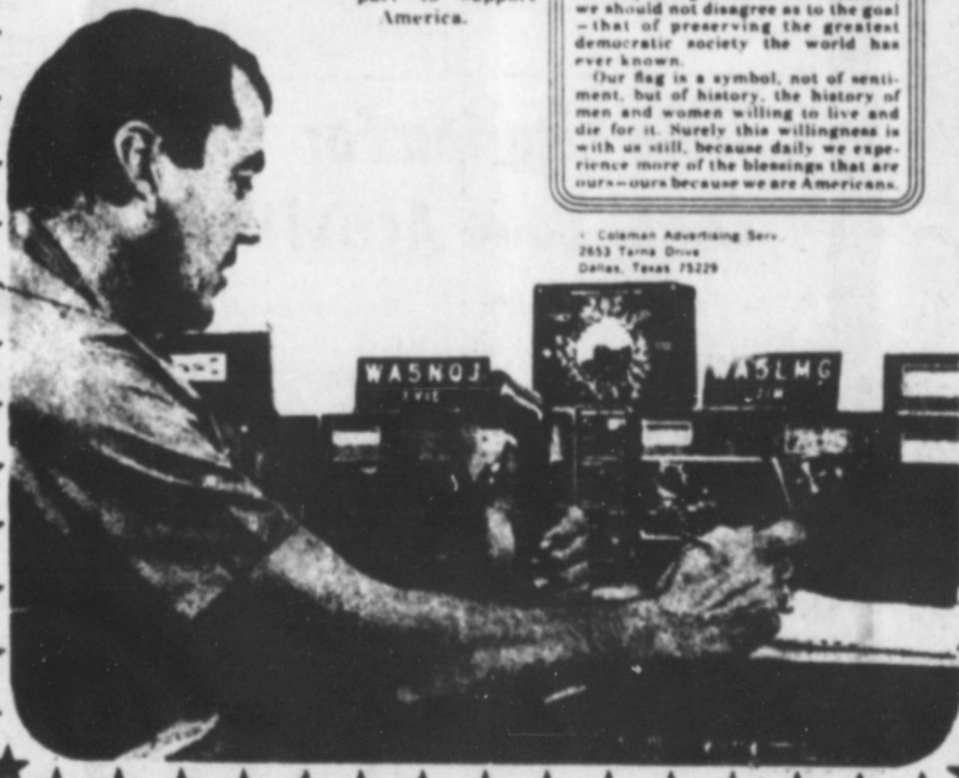
