Profit on Your Home?

Every five years, assuming you are an Average American, you will give up one residence and move to another. If this involves selling your home, and if you make a profit, do you have to pay income tax on the amount of



Generally, no-provided that you buy another house within one year. The federal govern? ment will usually allow you a tax nent, on the theory that the sale is not an ordinary business deal but a matter of personal

But in order to qualify for the tax deferment, you must fully meet the conditions that the law lays down. For example, your second house must be not only bought but actually occupied within the one-year limit.

In one case, a man moving to another city bought a house that needed remodelling. The work took considerable time, and his family was still living in a rented apartment by the time the year was up.

Nevertheless, he tried to get a tax deferment by arguing that at least his intentions were clear by the time of the deadline.

But a court turned him down. The judge said the law was based not on what a person intended to do but on what he did.

In another case, a man failed to buy a second house within the year solely because of a sudden illness. Was this an acceptable excuse? Again, a court said no. The court said the law "is unambiguous and leaves no room for interpretation because of unfortunate circumstances," adding: "We are powerless to rewrite

the statute.

What if you decide to build a new house, instead of buying one already in existence? In that case, the law does give you an extra six months' leeway, so long as you have at least started construction within the 12-month period.

One would-be builder bought a lot, arranged a loan, and obtained a building permit - all within the year. But actual work on the house had not yet begun. Had he started "construction" in time to qualify for the tax deferment?

Yes. The Treasury decided that, with so many tangible steps already taken, it could not fairly turn him down,

### Silver Anniversary

Prepare 4 9" cake layers (your own or from mix); cool. With silver paint, paint 2 11/2" curtain rings silver. Frosting and decorating: Prepare 11/2

times recipe for Snow-Peak Frosting,

Stack the 4 cake layers, using Snow-Peak as the filling; set in center of foil-covered 12" cardboard circle. Frost cake, smoothing off frosting on sides and top. Heap rest of frosting around base of cake, pulling it up with spatula to make peaks. Now fill a paper cone with frosting; then cut off 1/2 " from tip. On the side of the cake at the center front, press out frosting to make the figures "2" and "5". Then outline each of the figures with silver dragées. Set the cake in place on the table; then tuck pleated silver-fabric edging in place around the base. At one side on top of the cake, arrange gardenias, which are protected underneath with a circle of foil; alongside the gardenias, stand the 2 rings, tied with a bit of white satin ribbon.

Golden Anniversary: Make the 4-layer cake above, tinting the frosting golden yellow; use the figures "5" and "0," 2 gold (brass) rings, pleated yellow fabric edging, yellow flowers, such as roses, daisies, chrysanthemums, etc., and yellow satin ribbon.

### **Snow-Peak Frosting**

11/4 cups white corn syrup 2 egg whites Pinch salt

1 teasp. vanilla extract

Heat syrup to boiling in small saucepan With electric mixer at high speed (or with egg beater), beat egg whites until they form soft peaks when beater is raised; add salt. Slowly pour in syrup continuing to beat until frosting is fluffy and hangs in peaks from beater; fold in vanilla. (For spoon designs, beat until very stiff.) Stays soft at least Fills and frosts top and sides

of 28" or 9" layers Maple Snow-Peak Frosting: Substitute dark corn syrup for white; use 1/2 teasp. each maple flavoring and vanilla.

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
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
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
