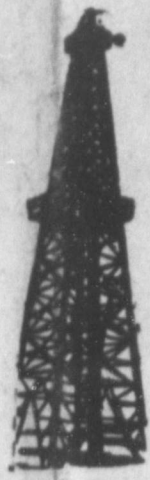

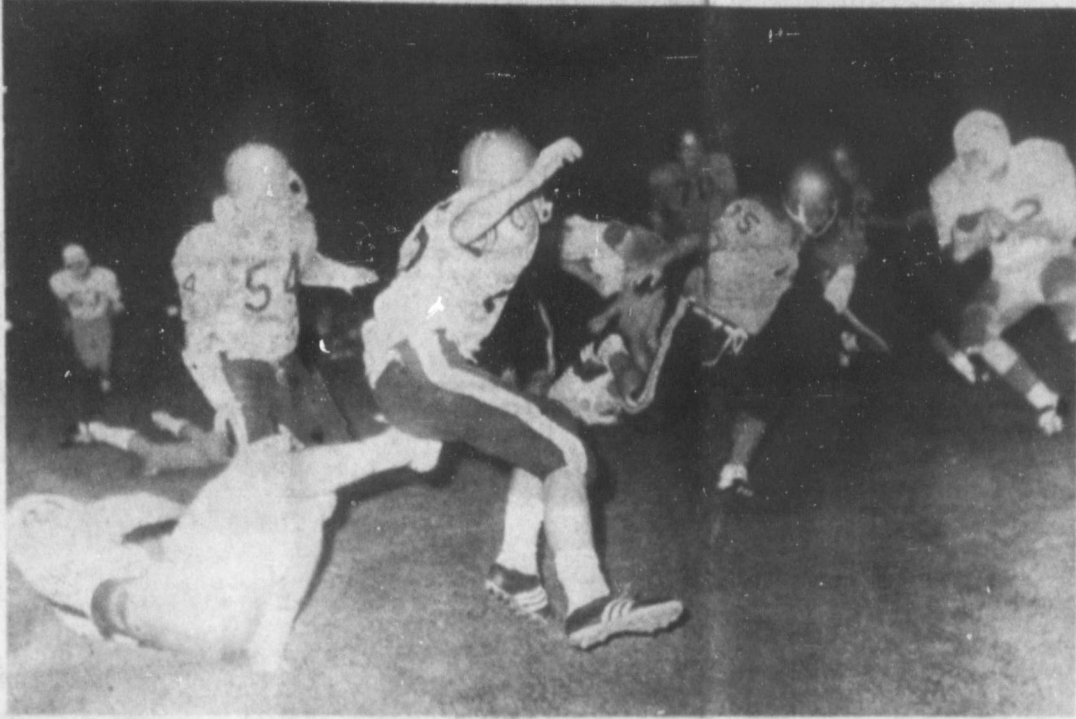
Annual Jaybird - Matador Contest Here Friday Night

Jaybirds Find First Victory Friday Night At Rochester

On the first play from scrimmage at Rochester Friday night, Brad Dibrell faked to Parker Kidd going into the middle of the line, then pulled back and hit Tommy Parker with a long pass, which found Tommy behind the Steer defense, and only daylight between him and the goal line.

But the officials had gone fishing, or something, and when Kidd tackled about four yards upfield from the line of scrimmage, they blew their whistles and the play was brought back and nullified.

This was followed by several fumbles and punts by each team, and then midway the second period the Birds put on a 6 yard drive that was climaxed by the 1 ft. TD by Dibrell. Then Dibrell found Tommy Parker in the end zone with an aerial to put them 8 points on the score board.

A few plays later Parker picked himself off a Steer pass at the 41 and no one put a hand on him as he scampered the distance to the double stripe. Parker Kidd went around the left corner and into the end zone, and the score board read

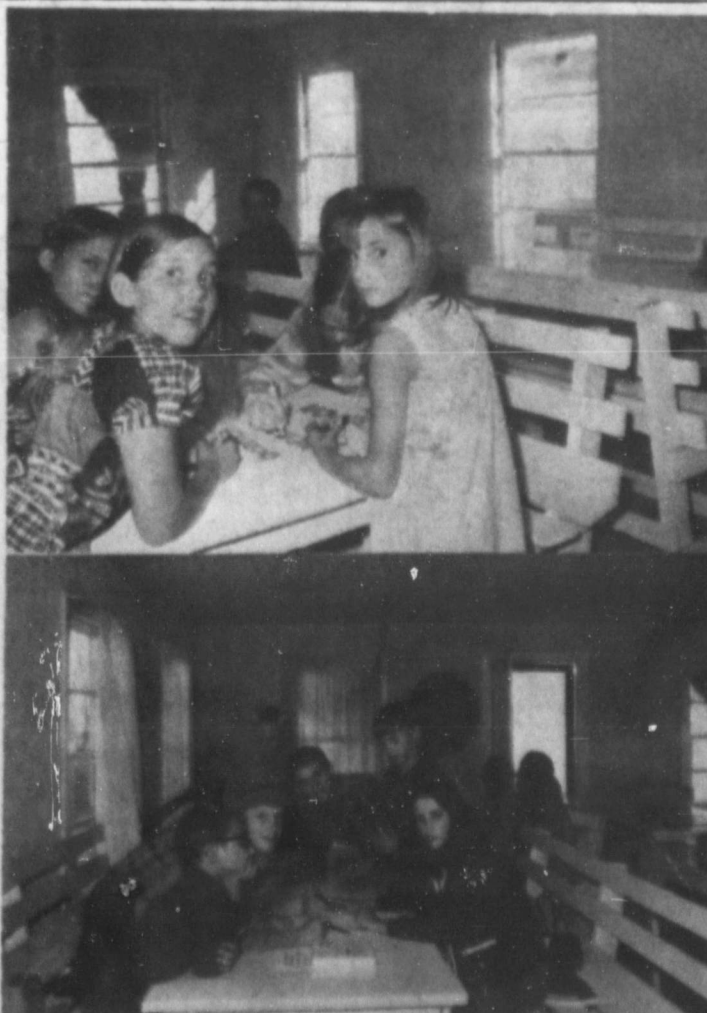

DEAR MISTER EDITOR:

I had saw this piece in the papers where this doctor at the University of California Medical School had studied suicides in cities where they was newspaper strikes, and when I got to the county store Saturday night I found out all the fellers had read the same report. about the suicides without the papers. Furthermore, went on Ed, blaming suicides on the papers is a backhanded way of saying that ignorance is bliss. It may be, but who wants it, was Ed's words.

Clem Webster was agreed with Ed, which was good news as our sessions go at the store. Clem said the reason we get newspapers is cause we'd rather know than not know. And Clem said he holds to the old line that the papers don't make the news, they just report it. If the papers weighed everything they print agin how happy it would make the reader, they'd be a heap of folks standing in line to give the editors a hand with their suicides, was Clem's words.

Zeke Grubb recollected back when they was this made up story on the radio about an invasion from Mars, and how people was throwing theirself off buildings to get away from the monsters from outer space. Zeke said the play actors told everybody it wasn't real, but the point is that people believe what they want to evertime. They is a heap of good news in the papers, went on Zeke, but folks ruther skip on over to the killings and robberies.

Mister Editor, the fellers was general agreed that news is like the weather, it happens. The reporter may call it the threat of more rain, but it keeps on happening.

TO ADMIT RED CHINA into the United Nations is about like accepting an unconfessed and unrepentant bank robber in full and participating membership in the church.

ARTICLE 4 OF THE U.N. CHARTER, conceived in San Francisco in 1945 reads: "Membership in the United Nations is open to all other peace-loving States which accept the obligations contained in the present Charter and, in the judgment of the organization, are able and willing to carry out these obligations."

COMMUNIST CHINA HAS NEVER, nor does it now, indicate acceptance of the principles and obligations required by the U.N. Charter.

CHAPTER I, ARTICLE 2, SECTION 4, of the Charter provides: "All members shall refrain in their international relations from the threat or use of force against the territorial integrity or political independence of any state, or in any manner inconsistent with the purposes of the United Nations."

THE QUESTION IS BEING ASKED our policy makers in the State Department: Does the sending of troops into Korea in support of naked aggression, invasion of India, exporting "revolution" throughout the world, constitute "peace loving" or the restraint of force against others? If further proof was needed...

"We waited until the last possible minute before making the decision to delay the sale," Morris said, "but it's just one of those things that couldn't be helped. Maybe this will just give us more time to arrange for more cattle to come in."

"Weather always seems to be a problem as far as the sale is concerned," Morris said, "but usually we have to fight the dust--not the rain."

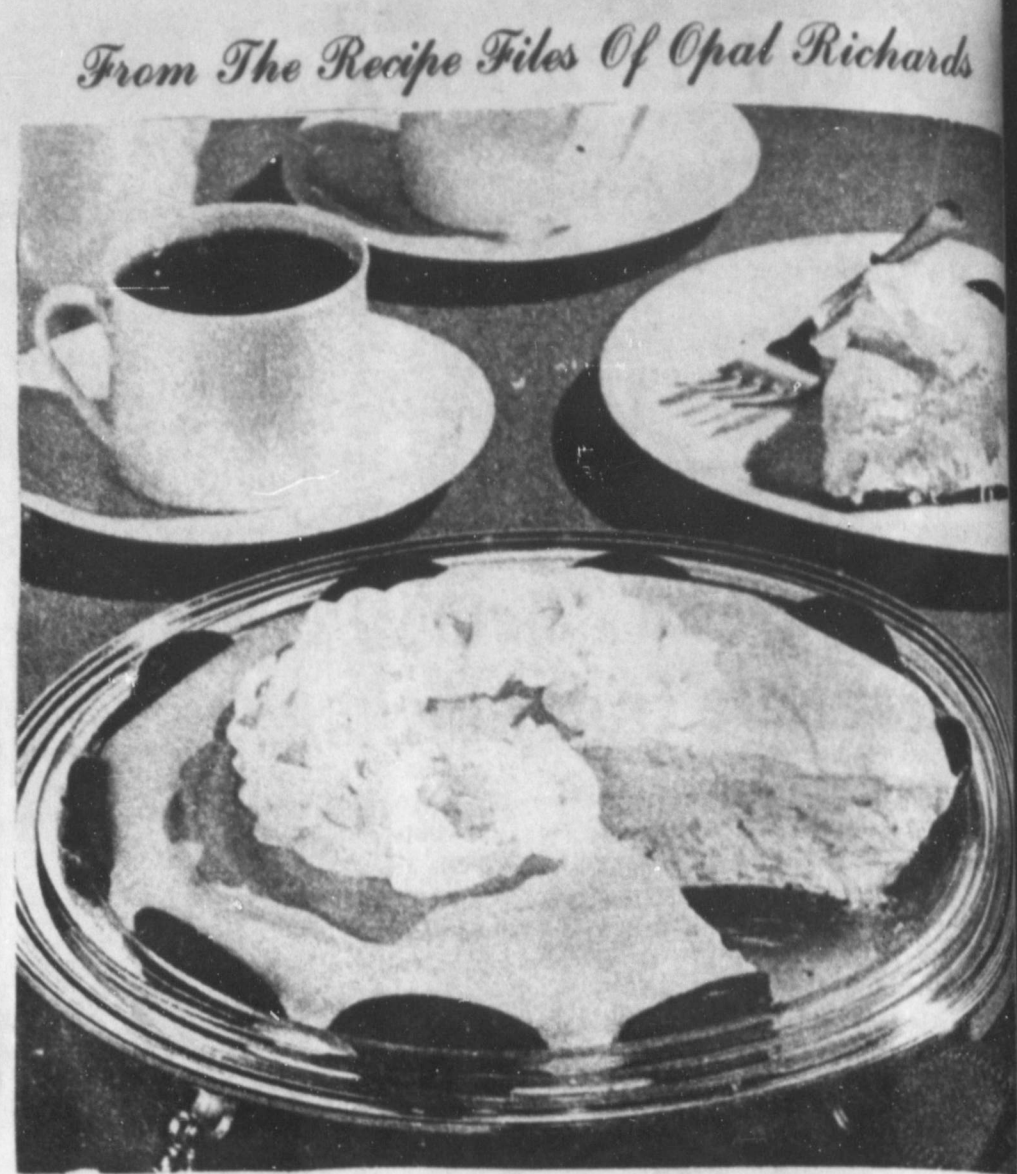

Lazy - Day Grasshopper Pie

- Chocolate wafer cookies
- 1 1-pint jar marshmallow creme
- 1/4 cup peppermint
- 4 drops peppermint extract
- 6 or 7 drops green food coloring
- 1 cup whipping cream, whipped
- Line bottom of 9-inch pie plate with chocolate wafer cookies, filling in spaces between with pieces of cookies.
- Line sides of the pie plate with half-cookies. In mixer bowl, combine marshmallow creme, milk, peppermint extract, and food coloring; whip till fluffy. Fold in whipped cream. Spoon filling into cookie crust. Freeze till firm, 8 hours or overnight. Makes 6 to 8 servings. Garnish with additional whipped cream, if desired.
- FROZEN PARTY SALAD
- 1 cup Salad Dressing
- 1 8-oz. pkg. Cream Cheese
- 1 cup (13 1/2-oz. can) drained pineapple tidbits
- 1 cup (1lb. can) chopped, drained apricots
- 1/2 cup chopped maraschino cherries
- 2 tablespoons confectioner's sugar
- Few drops red food coloring
- 2 cups miniature marshmallows
- 1 cup heavy cream, whipped
- Gradually add salad dressing to softened cream cheese, mixing until well blended. Stir in fruit, sugar and food coloring. Fold in marshmallows and whipped cream. Pour into 9 x 5-inch loaf pan; freeze. Unmold on platter. 10 to 12 servings.
- CHERRY CREAM SQUARES
- 2 3-oz. pkg. cherry flavored gelatin
- 3 bananas, sliced
- 2 cups miniature marshmallows
- 1 cup dairy sour cream
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts
- Prepare cherry gelatin as directed on package; chill until almost firm. Fold in bananas; pour into 8-inch square pan. Chill until firm. Combine marshmallows and sour cream; spread on gelatin. Top with nuts. Chill 6 servings.
- MARSHMALLOW CHEESE DELIGHT
- 1 3-oz. pkg. lemon flavored gelatin
- 1 3-oz. pkg. orange flavored gelatin
- 2 cups boiling water
- 1 cup cold water
- 1 cup syrup from apricots
- 2 cups (1-lb. 14 oz. can) drained apricots, quartered
- 1 cup (13 1/2 oz. can) drained pineapple tidbits
- 3 cups miniature marshmallows
- Lettuce
- Fruit Cheese Dressing
- 3/4 cup shredded Cheddar Cheese
- Dissolve lemon and orange gelatin in boiling water; add cold water and syrup. Chill until almost firm; fold in fruit and marshmallows. Pour into 2 1/2-quart mold. Chill until firm. Unmold on lettuce. Top with Fruit Cheese Dressing; sprinkle with cheese.
- FRUIT CHEESE DRESSING
- Gradually add 2/3 cup syrup from pineapple to 1 tbsp. flour; stir in 1 beaten egg. Cook over low heat until thickened; chill.

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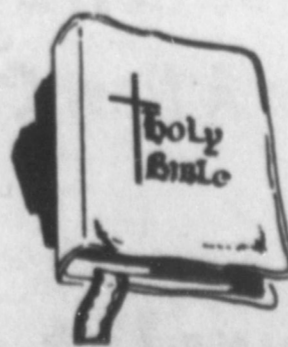

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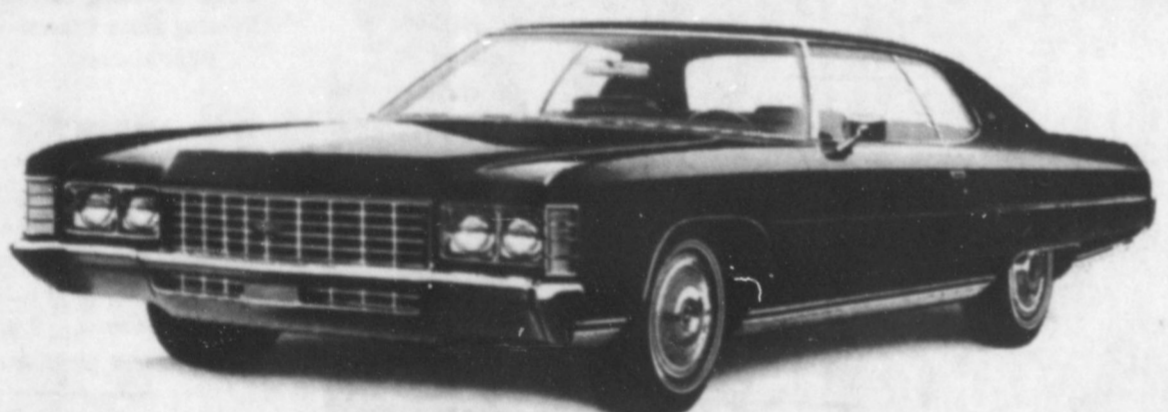

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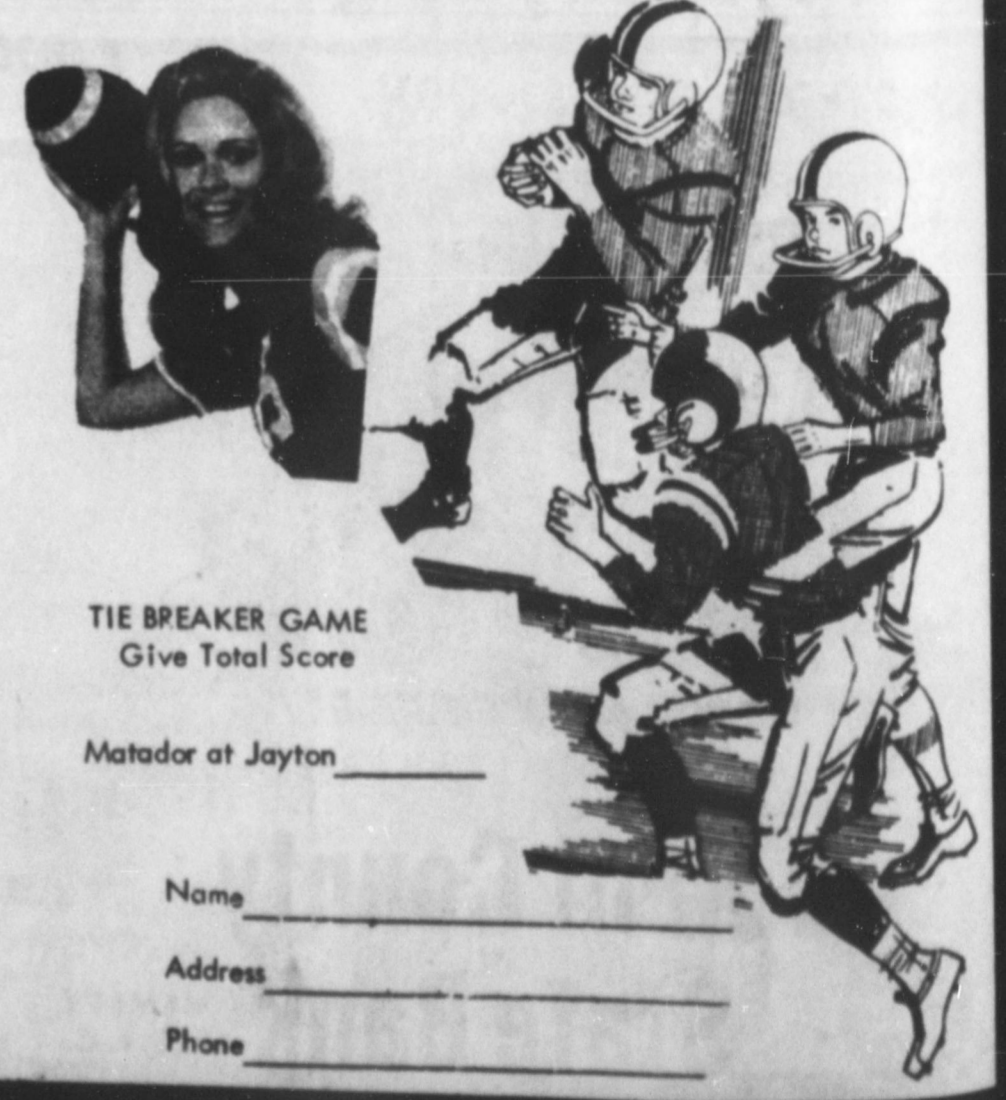
