Two Teams Are Added To Football District

This Week In Jayton



The Jayton Jaybirds will be playing in an enlarged 3B district next fall, including two teams, an old foe Bronte, and Hawley. Most all Class B districts were enlarged to get the State down to 16 districts and set up a four game State Championship playoff.

The bi-district foes will be West and South of Jayton, same as last year. The Regional foe, would be those to the north.

In a district organizational meeting held this week, new schedules were drawn up, and Jayton lacks one game having the new schedule. They will take on the new conference teams of Bronte and Hawley, and will probably drop Spur and Matador, Supt. R. N. Pierce said Wednesday. Supt. C. B. Barbee of Bronte is the new district chairman.

The Commissioners court last week was informed that the State of Texas has earmarked more than \$10,000,000 additional funds to be used on the airstrip near Jayton. This, in addition to the original grant.

The city of Lubbock has gained much of its financial strength and growth down through the years from Texas Tech, its students and the people associated with the institution of higher learning.

The students come in, spend for or five years there, and move on. They have very little to do with directing the policies of the community, to which they add so much.

Now this situation may be changed. The new law allowing 18 year old students to vote in Lubbock, if they live there, has some of the politicians looking upon them with a different light.

This means about 15,000 more Tech students may vote in the local elections. Just what this could do to the political affairs of Lubbock,

The U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, with headquarters in Fort Worth, has made an extensive study of the Brazos River Water basin. They have recommended a series of dams, cut off certain streams that add to the pollution problems of the Brazos.

The map above shows one project that would build a series of four dams impounding polluting waters, in Kent, Stonewall, Dickens and King Counties.

It will be noted in the map, Jayton is located on a direct line between two of the proposed lakes. A proposed pipeline would send water in a lake

straddling the Kent-Stonewall County line, into a lake straddling the King-Stonewall County line, and on to a lake farther east which straddles the King-Stonewall line near their eastern edge. This lake No. 19, known as the Bascom Dam project, has been under study for more than 20 years. At one time it was under study as a municipal water supply, but was later abandoned because of polluting streams pouring into it.

A meeting will be held in deep south Texas in December to further study this project.

FALL IS PICKLE TIME

STARD PICKLES
 1/2 cup coarse salt
 1/2-inch crosswise slices of very small cucumbers
 1/2 cups small cauliflower florettes
 1/4 cups coarsely chopped seeded green pepper
 1/2 cups coarsely chopped seeded red pepper
 1/2 cups medium-sized green tomatoes, cut into 3/4-inch wedges
 1/4 cup thinly sliced onion
 1/4 cup sugar
 1/4 cup flour
 1/2 teaspoons ground turmeric
 1/4 cup water
 1/2 cups vinegar
 1 cup prepared mustard
 Heat 1 cup of the water and salt together until salt is dissolved. Add remaining 7/8 cup water and cool. Combine cucumbers, cauliflower, green pepper, red pepper, tomatoes and onion in a large bowl; pour in salt water and chill in refrigerator 12 to 24 hours. Drain and rinse off water. Combine sugar, flour, turmeric in a bowl; gradually add the 1/4 cup water, stirring until smooth. Gradually add vinegar and mustard, stirring until blended. Pour in large pot and cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Reduce heat to a steady simmer and cook 15 minutes, stirring frequently. Pack into sterilized jars, leaving 1/8 inch head space. Work out bubbles in jars with a rubber spatula. Add more liquid to fill jars to proper level. Adjust caps. Makes 3 1/2 to 4 pints.

to make a bag. Heat vinegar and sugar to boiling in a large pot; add vegetables and spice bag. Bring mixture to full boil; reduce heat slightly to a steady boil and cook 45 mins. stirring very frequently to prevent sticking. Remove spice bag. Pack into sterilized jars, leaving 1/8 inch head space. Work out bubbles in jars with a rubber spatula. Add more liquid if necessary to fill jars to proper level. Adjust caps. Makes 5 pints.

GREEN-TOMATO RELISH
 2 quarts chopped green tomatoes (about 8)
 3/4 cup coarse salt
 1 quart vinegar
 2 cups sugar
 1 1/2 teaspoons dry mustard
 1 1/2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
 1 1/2 teaspoons ground allspice
 1 1/2 teaspoons ground cloves
 1/4 cup mustard seed
 1 teaspoon pepper
 2 medium-sized green peppers, seeded and sliced
 1 medium-sized onion, chopped
 Place tomatoes in a bowl; sprinkle with salt and chill in refrigerator overnight. Drain and wash off salt. Place vinegar, sugar, mustard, cinnamon, allspice, cloves, mustard seed and pepper in a large pot; bring to a boil. Add tomatoes, green pepper and onion and bring to a boil; reduce heat to a steady boil and cook 15 minutes, stirring frequently. Spoon into sterilized jars, leaving 1/8 inch head space. Work out bubbles in jars with a rubber spatula. Add more relish if necessary to fill jars to proper level. Adjust caps. Makes 3 pints.

DILL PICKLES
 2 cups white vinegar
 2 cups water
 6 tablespoons sugar
 1/4 cup coarse salt
 1 1/2 tablespoons mixed pickling spice
 15 medium-sized cucumbers (about 6 inches long), washed and cut into halves lengthwise
 Fresh dill heads
 Wash cucumbers and thinly slice. Heat 1 cup of the water and salt together until salt is dissolved; and the remaining cups water and cool. Pour cooled water over cucumbers. Drain and let chill 3 hours. Drain and rinse cucumbers in cold water. Bring vinegar, sugar, celery seed, mustard seed, turmeric, ginger and pepper to a boil; add cucumbers and onion and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and cook 15 minutes. Pack immediately into sterilized jars, leaving 1/8 inch head space. Work out bubbles in jars with a rubber spatula. Add more liquid if necessary to fill jars to proper level. Adjust caps. Makes 4 pints.

MIXED PEPPER RELISH
 1/2 cups diced seeded red pepper
 1/2 cups diced seeded green pepper
 1/2 cups finely chopped onion
 1/2 cups finely chopped watermelon rind
 1/4 cup coarse salt
 1/2 teaspoons mixed pickling spice
 1/2 cups vinegar
 1/4 cup sugar
 Mixed pepper, green pepper, onion and watermelon in large bowl; stir in salt. Chill in refrigerator 3 to 4 hours. Drain and rinse with cold water. Place mixed pickling material on a 5-inch square of cheesecloth; tie ends together

Mix vinegar, water, sugar and salt in a large pot. Place pickling spices on a 5-inch square piece of cheesecloth; tie ends together to make a bag. Place spice bag in vinegar mixture; bring to boil and simmer 15 minutes. Pack cucumbers in quart jars; trim if necessary to leave 1/4 inch head space. Work out bubbles in jars with a rubber spatula. Add additional liquid if necessary to fill jars to proper level. Adjust caps. Heat water in a large pot with a large pot with a rack. Place sealed jars on rack in the hot water to cover them 1 to 2 inches. Quickly bring water to a boil, then reduce heat to hold water at a steady, gentle boil. Boil 10 minutes. Remove jars and cool on a wire rack. Makes 4 quarts.

DILLED BEANS
 2 pounds green beans
 1 teaspoon celery seed
 1 teaspoon mustard seed
 4 small cloves garlic, cut into halves
 Cayenne pepper
 8 heads fresh dill
 2 1/2 cups water
 2 1/2 cups white vinegar
 1/4 cup coarse salt
 Wash beans and cut off ends. Pack beans lengthwise in half-pint jars, trimming if necessary to fit into jars with 1/4 inch head space. To each jar add 1/8 teaspoon celery seed, 1/8 teaspoon mustard seed, a half clove garlic, dash of cayenne and a head of dill. Heat the 2 1/2 cups water, vinegar and salt to boiling; pour over beans, allowing 1/4 inch head space. Work out bubbles in jars with a rubber spatula. Add additional liquid if necessary to fill jars to proper level. Adjust caps. Heat water in a large pot with a rack. Place sealed jars on rack in the hot water and add enough hot water to cover them 1 to 2 inches. Quickly bring water to a boil, then reduce heat to hold water at a steady, gently boil. Boil 10 minutes. Remove jars and cool on a wire rack away from drafts. Makes 8 half-pint jars.

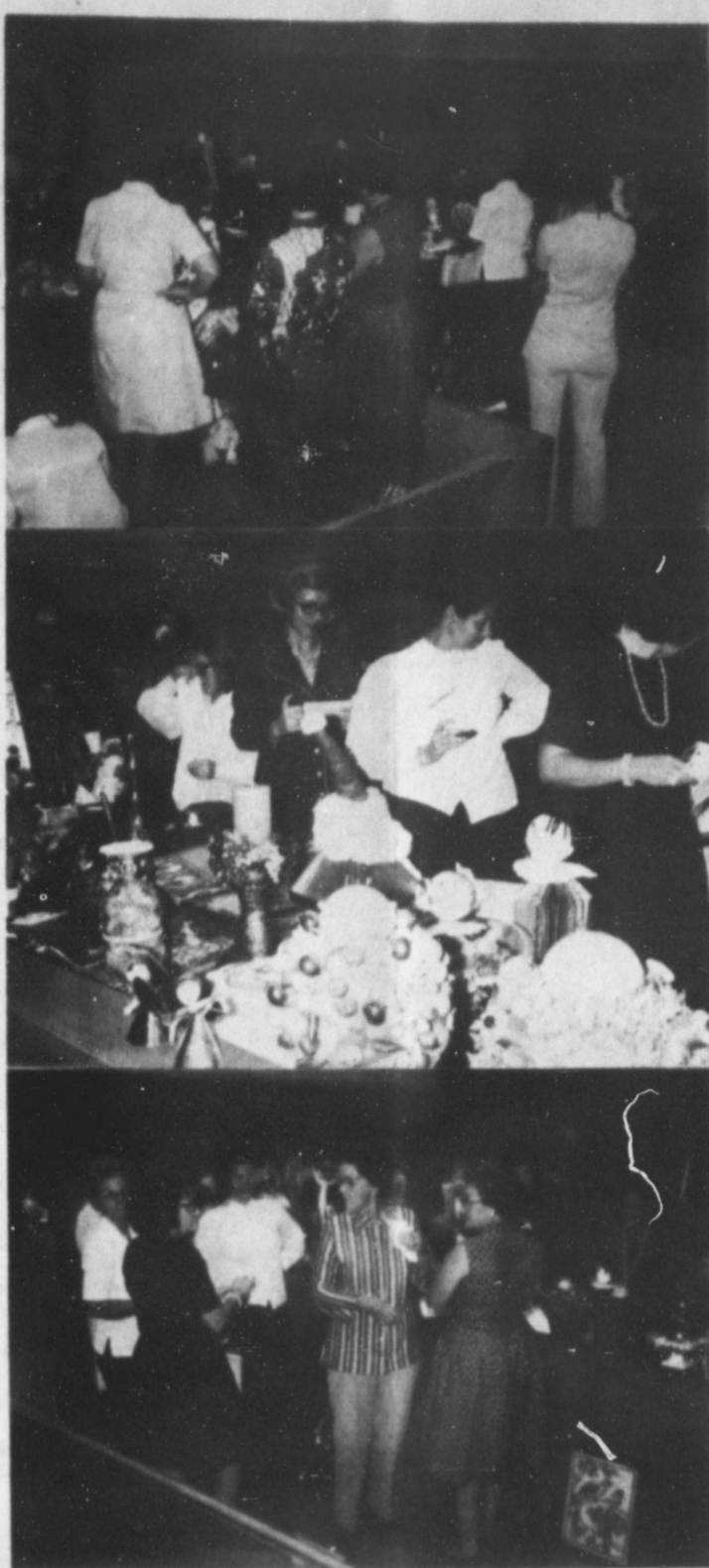

One Kent Co. Accident Checked In September

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated one accident on rural highways in Kent County during the month of September, according to Sergeant Frank Jrcik, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area. These crashes resulted in one person killed and three persons injured. The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first nine months of 1971 shows a total of five accidents resulting in one person killed and six persons injured. The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for September, 1971, shows a total of 499 accidents resulting in 33 persons killed and 268 persons injured. This was 83 less accidents, eight more fatalities, and 132 more injured than during August. The 33 traffic deaths for the month of September, 1971, occurred in the following counties: Potter, seven; Lubbock, four; Parker and Childress, two each; Archer, Clay, Garza, Kent, Lynn, Montague, Palo Pinto, Wise, Yoakum, Carson, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Gray, Hansford, Moore, Farmer, Swisher, and Wilbarger, one each.

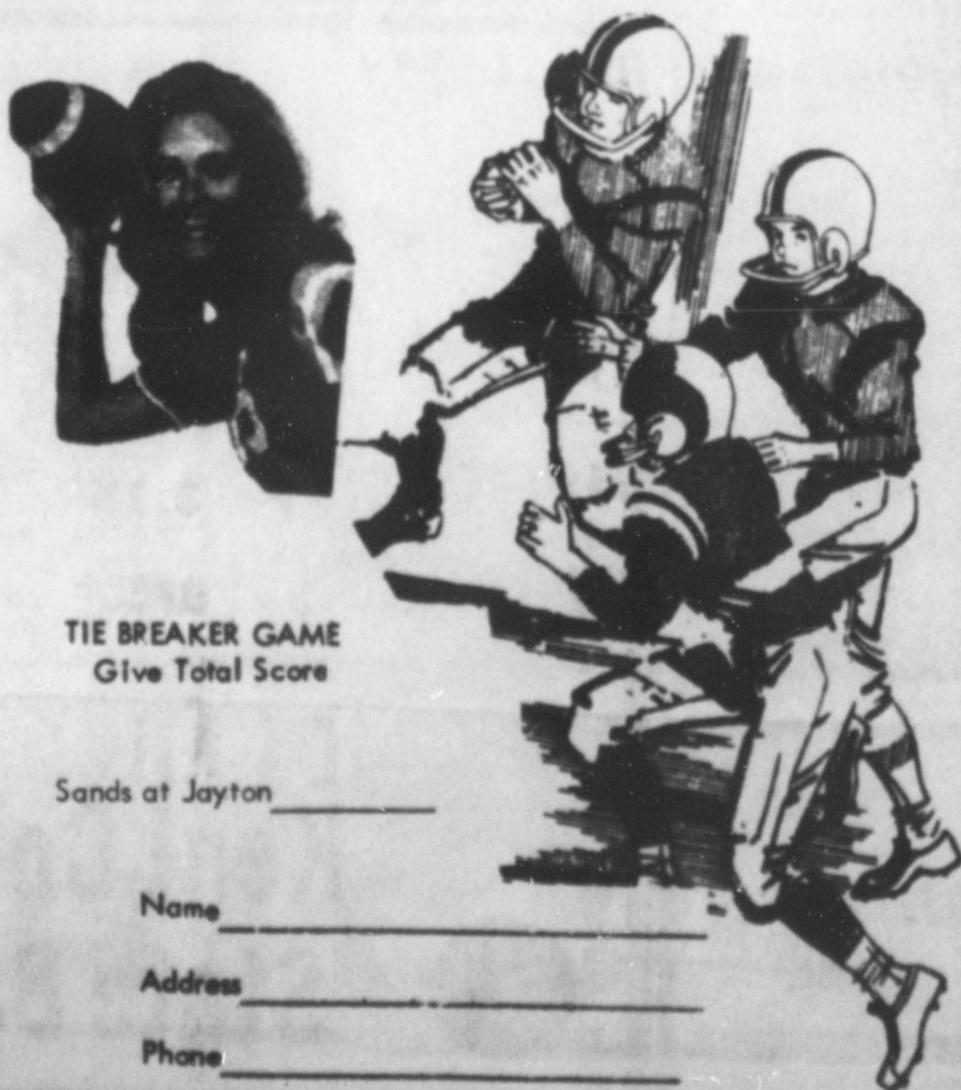

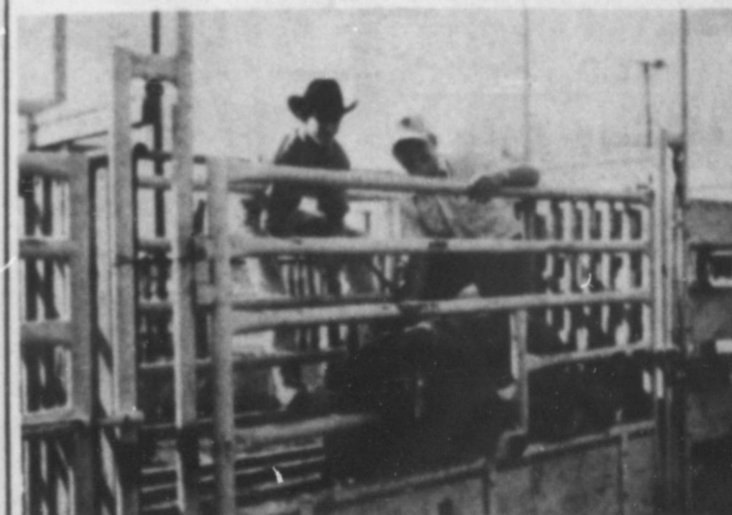
