



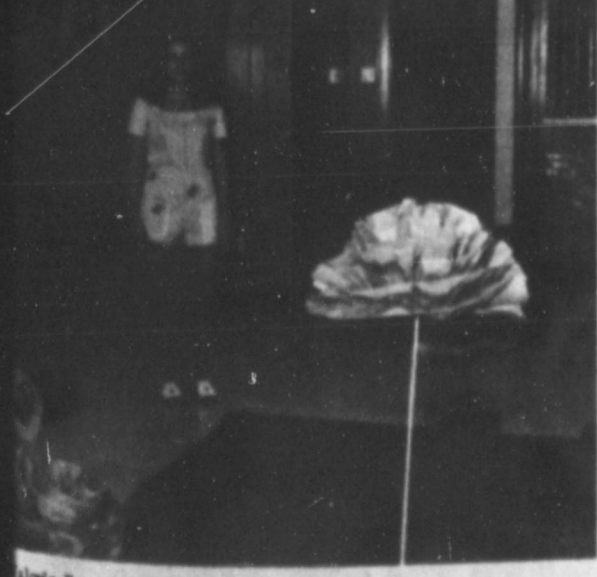

**The Patrol Checks One Co. Accident**

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated one accident on rural highway in Kent County during the month of June, according to Sgt. Frank Jircik, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area. These crashes resulted in no persons killed and no persons injured. The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1972 shows a total of three accidents resulting in no persons killed, and no persons injured. The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Department of Public Safety Region 5 for June, 1972 shows a total of 527 accidents resulting in 20 persons killed and 347 persons injured as compared to June, 1971 with 524 accidents resulting in 10 persons killed and 308 persons injured.

The 20 traffic deaths for the month of June, 1972 occurred in the following counties: Dallam and Lubbock, three each; Archer, Armstrong, Bailey, Childress, Floyd, Hale, Jack, Montague, Parker, Terry, Wichita, Wilbarger, Wise, and Young, one each.

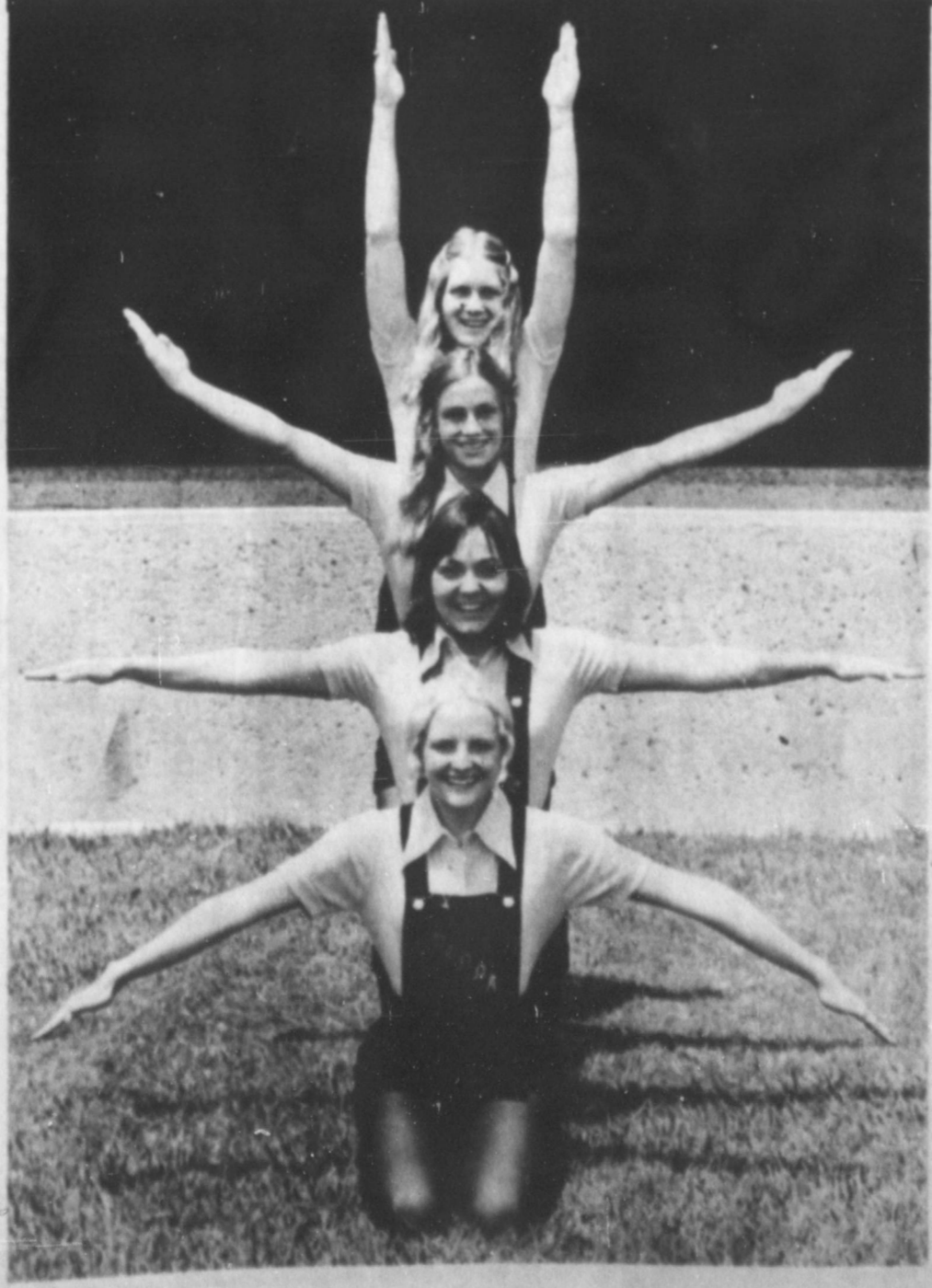

**The Jaybird Cheerleaders 72-73**



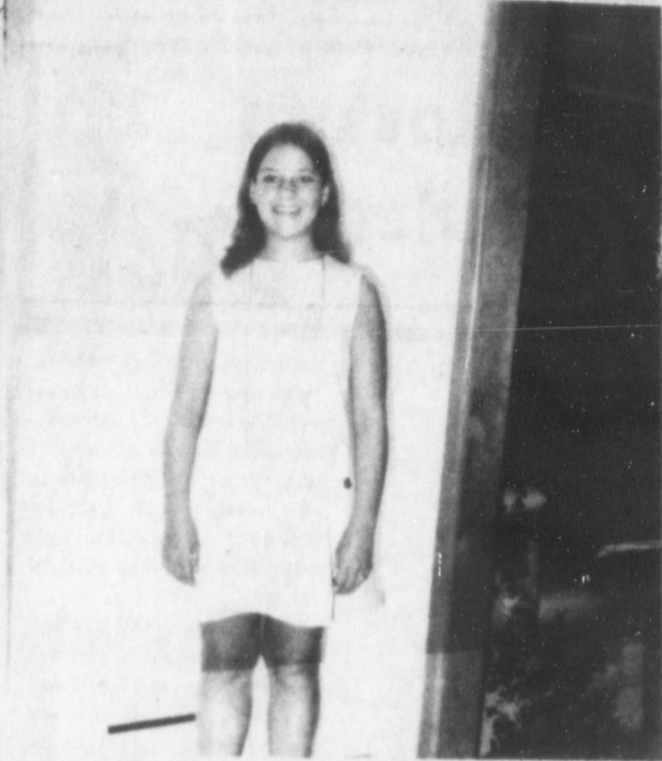

## As It Looks From Here

THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT has money to burn-- really it does!

OF TENTH VISITORS TOWASHINGTON are shown a small spiral of whitish smoke coming from a stack in the center of the Bureau of Printing and Engraving. They are told that it comes from the burning of old worn out bills. Actually, old currency is burned at each of the 12 Federal Reserve Banks and not returned to its source of printing for destruction as it usually is supposed.

SINCE THE COUNTRY HAS become so environmentally conscious, other methods of doing a way with unusable paper money are being investigated.

FEDERAL RESERVE BANKS are now beginning to grind up cash since the cities where they are located have anti-burning laws and, where en-

forced, are causing problems. Treasury officials say that grinding is the only way they know to dispose of old dollars. This, however, has its problems also. It is simply what to do with the fine, light green fluff left after it is pulverized.

ONE IDEA IS TO RECYCLE IT INTO stationery. This has been ruled out because of offset-service regulations. They say someone might get the idea that because the special type of paper is fortified with the finest of filament it could possibly be used to reconstruct bills for the benefit of counterfeiters.

THE FEDERAL RESERVE BANK in Dallas is reported to come up with a customer for ground-up greenbacks for a price of \$10 a ton. In that form, of course, it would make no difference whether it was a George Washington

\$1.00 or a Grover Cleveland \$1,000.00 bill--the intrinsic value would be the same. THUS FAR ONLY ONE SALES outlet has been developed to buy the finely chopped up cash. This customer is a well-drilling company in Kansas.

THE DAVID MUD AND CHEMICAL COMPANY is experimenting with using the ground-up currency, turned into a thick slush, as mud in well-drilling process.

ANOTHER IDEA NOT YET TESTED to the extent of approval, is converting old greenbacks into a roofing material. Offhand one would suppose that there would not be a supply adequate for commercial use but 2,500 tons a year could cover quite a few roofs and mud-seal quite a few wells. Incidentally, this amount destroyed represents about 2 Billion Federal Reserve notes with a face value of about \$12 Billion. This statistic doesn't particularly mean anything except that, to make a pun--it could become quite a slush fund and go quite a way to putting money on the roof for overhead protection.

THERE SEEM TO BE OTHER PROBLEMS connected with the disposal of old bills such as trying to get the ink out which affects other proposed uses. In the first place, it seems it is about impossible to wash it out and the color for whatever use remains money-green. There have been experiments in making ceramics. If this purpose were proved to be successful, the color might add to the value of the product.

THE DALLAS FEDERAL RESERVE BANK is the only one of the 12 Reserve Banks now grinding but in the next few months the banks at Cincinnati, Philadelphia, Cleveland and Minneapolis will shift from burning to this method of disposal.

IF OUR GOVERNMENT CONTINUES to crank out more money, there will probably be more to dispose of as time goes on. At most, the individual's worn out bills are replaced by new bills printed at the Bureau of Engraving and Printing here in Washington located at 14th and Independence Avenue and on down the street at 12th and Constitution Avenue is the Internal Revenue Service. An old joke still stands--"They issue it here and take it away down there."

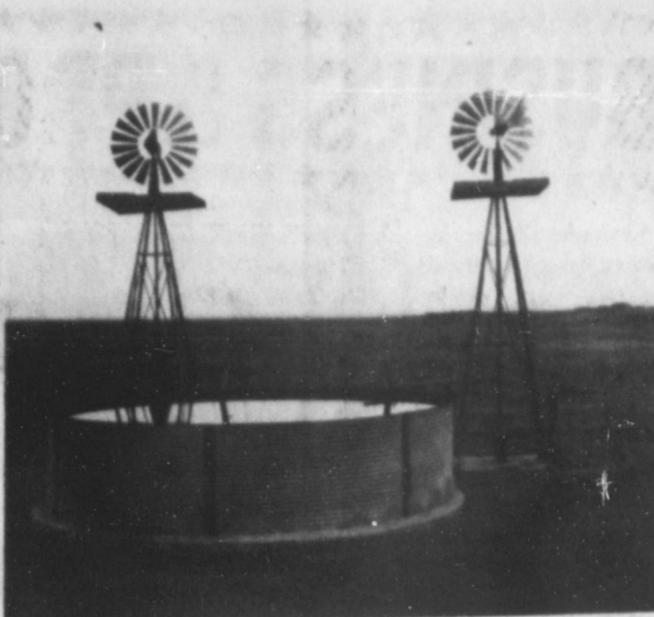

## Distribution of Grazing

It is a known fact to stockman in the Duck Creek Soil and Water Conservation District that cattle, graze the most convenient areas, or the type areas they prefer in a pasture. These areas are usually close to water, feed grounds, salt areas, loafing areas or areas of easy access. Livestock could be called "lary" in that they go no further from these areas than they need to in order to graze.

These grazing habits present a grazing management problem to the rancher. Livestock will overgraze these selected areas and possibly never graze other

areas in a pasture. Because of this one single fact, the rancher with this problem does not get full production from his rangeland.

There are a number of ways that this problem can be solved, depending on what has caused the problem in the individual pasture.

One major cause is the location of watering facilities. Some ranchers depend upon creeks, rivers, or a few ponds in large pastures for their supply of livestock water. This causes a concentration of grazing on probably the most productive land he has, and possibly no use at all a distance away from the supply.

This can be corrected by the location of watering supply as much as feasible. He may still have a grazing distribution problem caused by the distance between his watering facilities, or rough terrain that cattle do not prefer to graze when they have access to smoother terrain.

A rancher with this problem can change some of his everyday practices and help his situation. He can lure his livestock to the ungrazed areas by placing his salt and minerals, and supplemental feed in the ungrazed areas. This has been used to great advantage on a number of ranches in the area with good results.

In our area, we have some rough land mixed in with good deep soil in a large percentage of our pastures. Even though the pastures have water distributed well, and we spread our salt and supplemental feed out correctly, we still have a grazing distribution problem on some areas.

Over the past few years, a system of grazing has been developed that will eliminate this problem. The high intensity - low frequency rotation - deferred grazing system has been a great success where ranchers have adopted its use. In this system the cattle normally graze six or more pastures

are put into one pasture and rotated to the next pasture approximately every 30 days. In these systems we stock at a heavier stocking rate for a shorter period of time when they are grazed. This causes the livestock to go places to graze they normally wouldn't because of the competition for grazing among themselves. They also will eat grasses not usually grazed, giving the

more desirable grass a chance to overcome the less desirable grasses when the pasture is rested.

Grazing distribution is a serious problem, but can be corrected in most instances by the application of sound management practices.

The Soil Conservation Service personnel will be glad to assist you with your range management problems.

Water development is very important in a rancher's plan in grazing distribution. This water plan may call for a better distribution of watering facilities such as well, water storage facilities, pipelines, or earthen ponds.

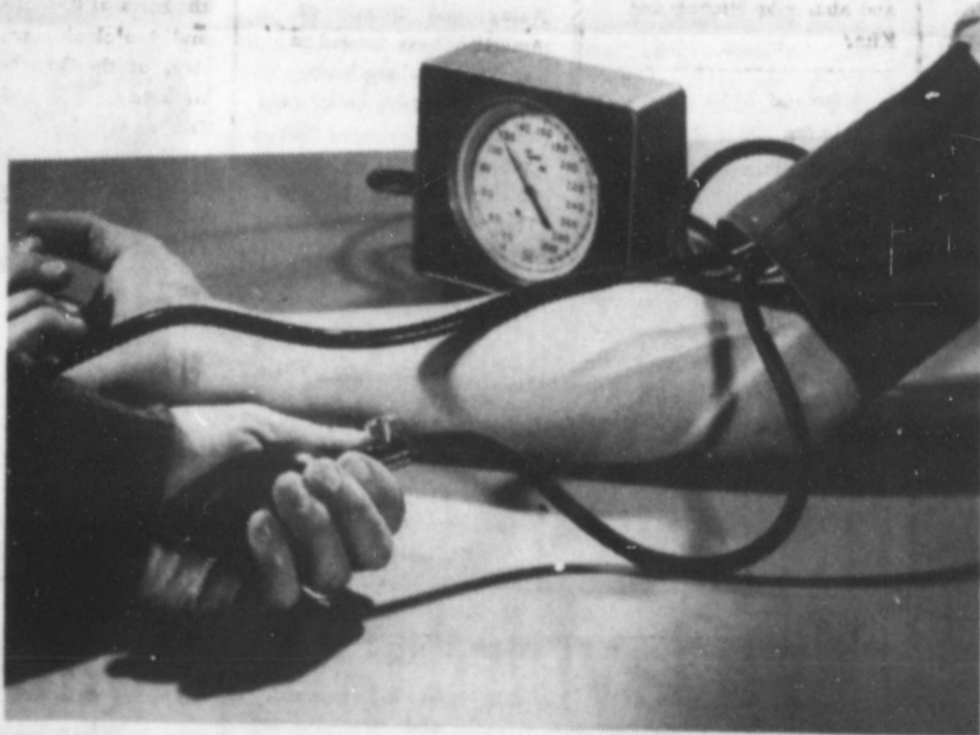

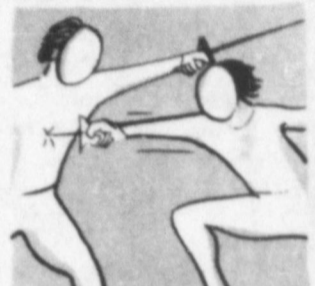
