Ten Years Ago In Jayton Was A Day To Be Remembered

Ten years ago this Saturday, Aug. 12, 1962 was a big day in Jayton. This was the day when the bank at the Rest Home and the post office were formally opened.

Earlier in the year, as people worked to get the bank going, they said it couldn't be done, but it was, and the bank has done a volume of business far beyond the expectations of anyone, and has rendered a great financial service to the county and community. The bank was chartered

with now Jayton Mayor Herbert Lewis as the president. The first directors were Lewis, his son II, Charles Lewis, Bill Jones, Thos. Fowler and Thos. Johnston. Jones is the only present member of the board of directors.

Leona Kidd, who began as a bookkeeper at the bank when it opened, is the only employee with the bank that started on Aug. 12, 1962.

New Grass Recommended For Rolling Plains

A new grass selection adapted to the Jayton area-Mason sandhill lovegrass-has been released jointly by the U. S. Soil Conservation Service and the Texas Agriculture Experiment Station, a local conservation leader said today.

Rhett Johnson, district conservativist for SCS at Jayton, said the new selection greens up earlier in the spring and produces more forage than sand lovegrass now available from commercial sources.

Certified seed should be available for planting in 1973, Johnson said. Mason sandhill lovegrass is a strain of native sand lovegrass. It starts growing three to four weeks earlier than most native warm season grasses and two to three weeks earlier than common sand lovegrass. Grazing trials show it is very palatable to livestock, especially in the late winter and early spring when it is making rapid growth.

Johnson said it is less palatable when seed heads form in the late summer and fall.

The grass frequently has short leaves near the base which stay green during the winter. This trait, combined with its ability to green up early, makes it highly desirable for use in range seeding mixtures.

The plant is adapted to sandy and medium textured soils in the Southern High Plains, Rolling Red Plains, Cross Timbers, and Edwards Plateau.

Johnson said stockmen south of Lubbock need a grass such as sand lovegrass to include in range seeding mixtures. However, sand lovegrass seed available from commercial sources is usually seed combined from native stands in the Northern Texas Panhandle or New Mexico. Native sand lovegrass from this region is not adapted to areas south of Lubbock so Mason sandhill lovegrass was selected to fill this need.

The grass was first found growing near Mason, Texas by SCS employees who noticed it has more vigor than other sand lovegrass plants. The seed were sent to the SCS plant materials center at Knox City where they were grown for observation and comparison with other sand lovegrass selections.

After SCS range conservationists and plant specialists agreed the strain appeared superior to other sand lovegrass selections, it was grown under irrigation for maximum seed production. When sufficient seed were available, the grass was field tested by several soil and water conservation district cooperators at widely scattered locations.

The new selection should normally be planted in mixtures with other adapted grasses such as indiangrass, sideoats grama, and little bluestem.

At the time of the first financial call of the bank, Sept. 28, 1962, the bank showed deposits of \$306,203.04. The total loans were \$158,818.50.

The bank was chartered with capital assets of \$150,000.00. Of this amount half of it was subscribed by local people.

In the last financial Statement of the bank, dated June 30th this year, the deposits amounted to \$1,749,022.73. Total loans were \$922,199.26.

Total capital accounts were \$201,502.14. In addition to this, the bank has been declaring dividends of 5% each six months

for several years. A few years ago two local men, Bearl Murdoch and Robert Hall purchased controlling interest in the bank. Later Hall sold some of his stock, and Beryl Murdoch, Jr. bought into the bank, and is now a vice-president, and has been doing a great lot of the executive work of the bank, during his father's illness.

In the January 11, 1962 edition of the Chronicle, the editor of the paper, made a strong appeal for the people to get together and get the charter for the bank.

The closing paragraph of the page one editorial read like this: "If the merchants of Jayton and the people of Kent County turn thumbs down on the effort to get a bank, and this new capital to be invested in our community, we might as well go to the city limits and erect a large monument, and put on it a large inscription: HERE YOU WILL FIND THE FEW REMAINS OF A DEAD CITY."

Big Program Planned For Lubbock Fair

LUBBOCK--The "Sensational Leighs" will be performing on the giant space wheel as a free attraction during the 55th annual renewal of the Panhandle South Plains Fair here Sept. 25-30.

The pair will perform the aerial act adjacent to the Merchant's Building at 4, 6 and 8 p. m. on Monday and Saturday and at 6 p. m. and 8 p. m. Tuesday through Friday of fair week.

A second free attraction, Tony, the organ grinder and Chris, the wonder monkey, also will be on hand to delight the young and old.

The space wheel is a new aerial act, highlighted by a breath-taking wind-up called the death-defying "run in space". The couple propels the space wheel without the aid of motors, gimmicks or hidden wires. The only movement of the wheel is caused by the actions of the two aerialists in or outside of two circular "cages".

The act has been shown nationally on television, has thrilled Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey circus audiences and has been in West Berlin, New Zealand, Calgary, Alberta, Canada, as well as throughout the country. Their largest live audience was 90,000 crammed in Philadelphia's Kennedy Stadium.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER 7 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 16)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article I of the Texas Constitution be amended by adding a new section to be known as Section 3a, to read as follows:
"Section 3a. Equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed, or national origin. This amendment is self-operative."
Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide that equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed, or national origin."

Proposed
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER 12 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 29)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 33, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 33. The accounting officers in this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant or check on funds of the State of Texas, whether in the treasury or otherwise, to any person for salary or compensation who holds at the same time more than one civil office of emolument, in violation of Section 40."
Sec. 2. That Article XVI, Section 40, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise at the same time, more than one civil office of emolument, except that of Justice of the Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or enlisted men of the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, or retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and the officers and directors of soil and water conservation districts, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States, or retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and officers of the State soil and water conservation districts, from holding at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, or from voting at any election, general, special or primary in this State when otherwise qualified. State employees or other individuals who receive all or part of their compensation either directly or indirectly from the lands of the State of Texas and who are not State officers, shall not be barred from serving as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts; provided, however, that such State employees or other individuals shall receive no salary for serving as members of such governing bodies. It is further provided that a nonselective State officer may hold other nonselective offices under the State or the United States, if the other office is of benefit to the State of Texas or is required by the State or Federal Government and there is no conflict with the original office for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold any other office or position of profit under this State, or the United States, except as a notary public if qualified by law."
Sec. 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment permitting State employees, who are not State officers, to serve as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts, without forfeiting their State salary, and specifying exceptions to the constitutional prohibition against payment of State funds for compensation to any person who holds more than one civil office of emolument."

NUMBER 5 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 35)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 2. (a) All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general law, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; actual places of religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to such church or religious society, provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land, places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a State or National organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity, and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property mentioned in this Section shall be null and void."
(b) The Legislature may, by general law, exempt property owned by a disabled veteran or by the surviving spouse and surviving minor children of a disabled veteran. A disabled veteran is a veteran of the

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER 10 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 68)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 1. The Legislature, at any regular session, or at any special session when the matter is included within the purposes for which the session is convened, may propose amendments revising the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for statewide offices and propositions, as defined in the Constitution and statutes of this State. The date of the elections shall be specified by the Legislature. The number of the amendments shall be approved by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, entered by year and days on the journals. A brief explanatory statement of the nature of a proposed amendment, together with the date of the election and the wording of the proposition as it is to appear on the ballot, shall be published twice in each newspaper in the State which meets requirements set by the Legislature for the publication of notices of officers and departments of the state government. The explanatory statement shall be prepared by the Secretary of State and shall be approved by the Attorney General. The Secretary of State shall send a full and complete copy of the proposed amendment to the Secretary of State and the county clerk who shall post the same in a public place in the courthouse at least 30 days prior to the election on said amendment. The first notice shall be published not more than 60 days nor less than 50 days before the date of the election, and the second notice shall be published on the same day in the succeeding week. The Legislature shall fix the standards for the rate of charge for the publication, which may not be higher than the newspaper's published national rate for advertising per column inch."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state for the election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment revising provisions on the time and method of proposing amendments to the state constitution and the time and method of publishing notice of proposed amendments."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER 9 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 20)
General Election, November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 33, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State, except as prescribed in this Constitution as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, nor to Directors of Soil and Water Conservation Districts. A member of the Legislature shall not be eligible to serve as a Director of a Soil and Water Conservation District. It is further provided, until September 1, 1969, and thereafter, only if authorized by the Legislature by general law under such restrictions and limitations as the Legislature may prescribe that a nonselective State officer or employee may hold other nonselective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if the other office or position is of benefit to the State of Texas or is required by State or federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office or position for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold any other office or position of profit under this State, or the United States."

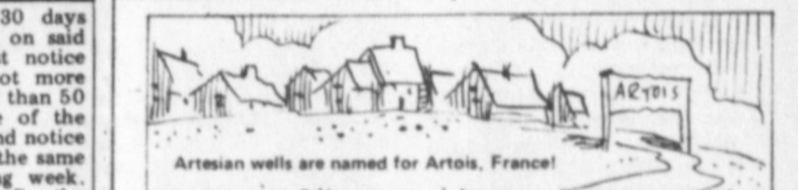

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER 14 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 57)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 6b, to read as follows:
"Section 6b. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 6, Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, any county, acting through the commissioners court, may reduce the county permanent school fund to pay ad valorem taxes on school lands or royalty interests owned at the time of the distribution. Nothing in this Section affects financial aid to any school district by the state."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to allow a county to reduce its county permanent school fund and distribute the money to independent and common school districts on a per scholastic basis."

Proposed
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER 8 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 23)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article VIII, Section 1-b, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 1-b. (a) Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes."
(b) From and after January 1, 1973, the governing body of any county, city, town, school district, or other political subdivision of the State may exempt by its own action not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed value of residence homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older from all ad valorem taxes thereafter levied by the political subdivision. As an alternative, upon receipt of a petition signed by twenty percent (20%) of the voters who voted in the last preceding election held by the political subdivision, the governing body of the subdivision shall call an election to determine by majority vote whether an amount not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) as provided in the petition, of the assessed value of residence homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or over shall be exempt from ad valorem taxes thereafter levied by the political subdivision. Where any ad valorem tax has theretofore been pledged for the payment of any debt, the taxing officers of the political subdivision shall have authority to continue to levy and collect the tax against the homestead property at the same rate as the tax so pledged until the debt is discharged, if the cessation of the levy would impair the obligation of the contract by which the debt was created."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the various political subdivisions of the State may exempt not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the value of residence homesteads of all persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older from ad valorem taxes under certain conditions."

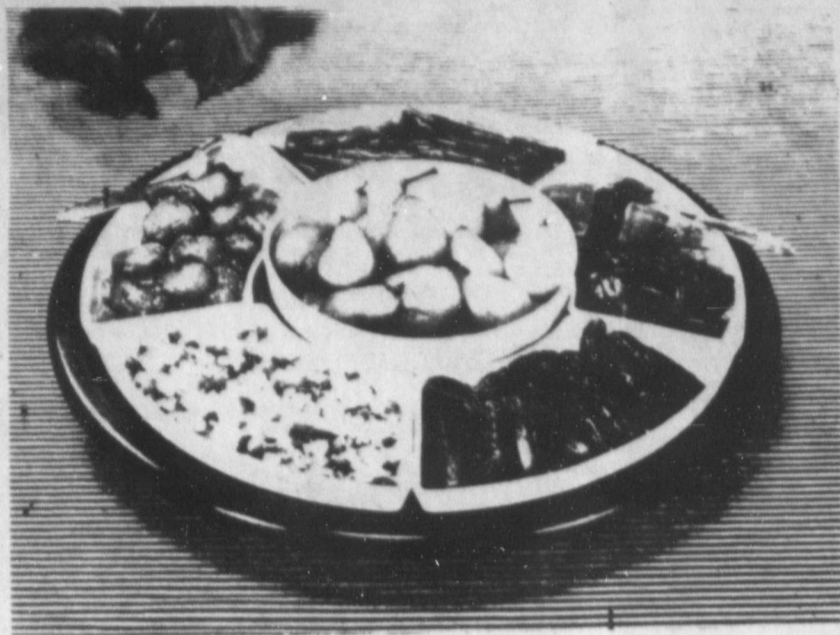

BREAD AND BUTTER PICKLES

Combine... 12 large or 15 medium cucumbers, sliced... 5 cups sliced onion... Sprinkle with... 2 t. salt... Let stand 1 hour. Drain and place in deep pan with 4 C. sugar... 1 qt. vinegar... 2 1/2 t. turmeric... 1 red pepper... chopped fine or 1/4 t. cayenne... 4 sticks cinnamon... Cook over low flame (200-225 F. dial setting on controlled burner) until sugar is dissolved. Turn flame to full and boil rapidly until slices begin to glisten (about 30 minutes). Pack slices into hot jars and cover with hot syrup leaving 1/4 inch head space. Close jars and process in boiling water bath 5 minutes. Start to count processing time as soon as water returns to boiling. Makes approximately 8 pints.

PICKLED OKRA

Wash and trim leaving stems Small whole okra pods. Pack into hot jars. To each pint add... 1 clove garlic... 1/2 t. salt... Bring to boil over full flame... vinegar... Cover okra with boiling-hot vinegar leaving 1/4-inch head space. Close jars and process in boiling water bath 20 minutes. Start to count processing time as soon as jars are placed in actively boiling water. Let stand several weeks. Chill several days before serving.

SWEET CUCUMBER PICKLES BY THE SHORT PROCESS

Wash... 10 pounds (about 8 quarts) cucumbers, 2 to 3 inches long... Cover with solution made of 3/4 cup salt to 1 gallon water. Let stand 24 hours. Drain discarding solution. Combine in large deep pan and bring to boil over full flame... 6 cups sugar... 3 tps. vinegar... 1 quart water... 2 T. mixed pickling spice, tied in a bag... Add cucumbers and simmer over low flame (200-225 F. dial setting on controlled burner) 45 minutes. Remove from flame. Covered and let stand 2 or 3 days. Drain, returning liquid to pan. Add to liquid and bring to boil 4 cups sugar... Add cucumbers. Reduce flame to low (200-225 F. dial setting on controlled burner) and simmer 10 minutes. Remove from flame. Cover and let stand 2 or 3 days. Drain, reserving liquid. Pack cucumbers into hot jars. Bring liquid to boil over full flame. Cover cucumbers with boiling-hot liquid leaving 1/4-inch head space. Close jars and process in boiling water bath 5 minutes. Start to count processing time as soon as water returns to boiling. Make approximately 14 pints.

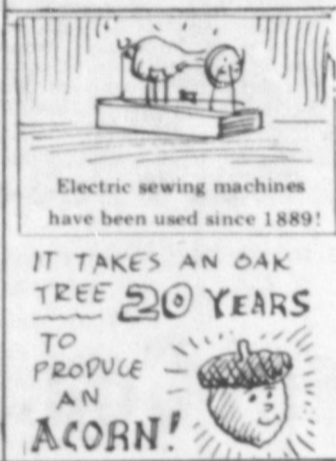

excessive wheat production. "The announcement of voluntary set aside is being made much earlier than last year so the winter wheat producer can plan his wheat operation before investing any money in his 1973 crop", Secretary Butz said in outlining the 1973 program. "Provisions of the 1973 wheat program are aimed at achieving a reduction of stocks so that producers can obtain fair rates of return on their capital and labor in the marketplace," Secretary Butz said. "Goals also include allowing each farmer greater freedom of choice to plant the commodities that best fit his individual operation and managerial talents." Loan rate for 1973 will be \$1.25 per bushel national average--the same as in 1972 --and farm-stored and warehouse-stored loans are available to producers who participate in the program. As in past years, producers who elect to set aside only the acreage required for participation will be eligible for certificates on their allotment acres and for loans on all wheat produced on the farm. Farmers who elect to participate in the voluntary option may set aside additional acreage up to 150 percent of their domestic wheat allotment. Payment rate for this additional set aside will be 88 cents per bushel, times the farm's established yield, times the acres set aside. In 1972 the voluntary option was limited to 75 percent of their domestic allotment with a payment of 94 cents per bushel. Producers who choose this option must agree to limit their total 1973 wheat program acreage planted for harvest. The limit will be their 1972 spring and winter wheat program acreages plus the 1972 voluntary set aside minus the 1973 voluntary set-aside acreage. Program acreages are those reported and accepted for compliance in 1972. Substitution provisions of the 1973 wheat program are identical to those in 1972 with corn, grain sorghum, barley or soybeans allowed for preservation of allotment history. The USDA also announced that the 1973 feed grain program will have a mandatory set aside for barley of not less than 25 percent of the farm's barley base, with other details of the feed grain program to be announced later. Loan discounts for undesirable varieties of wheat have been discontinued. Undesirable varieties listed in the past were those deemed

Provisions of 1973 Wheat Program Given

Major provisions of the 1973 wheat program were announced today by Secretary of Agriculture Earl L. Butz. They include the set aside required for participation, an option to voluntarily set aside additional acreage and the payment rate for the additional set aside. To participate in the wheat program, a producer must set aside an acreage equal to 86 percent of the farm's domestic wheat allotment -- the maximum provided by law. Producers will again be allowed to substitute feed grains or

soybeans for wheat to preserve allotment history. The Secretary further announced that barley will again be included in the 1973 feed grain program. In addition to the set aside required for participation, a producer may earn payment for setting aside additional acreage up to 150 percent of his 1973 domestic wheat allotment--twice the amount of additional acreage allowed in the 1972 program--at a payment rate of 88 cents per bushel. This option is aimed at encouraging retirement of additional land to prevent

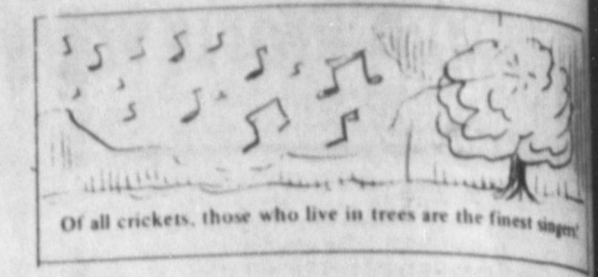

**PUBLIC NOTICE
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER 1 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 98)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 24. Representatives receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding four thousand, four hundred dollars. Senators shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding three thousand, four hundred dollars. All Members of the Legislature, including the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives, shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding one thousand, four hundred dollars (\$1,400) per day for the first one hundred days of each session and for thirty days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No session shall be of longer duration than one hundred forty (140) days. This session shall be self-enacting appropriations heretofore made for the biennium ending August 31, 1973, for the salaries of the Members of the Senate and House of Representatives shall not be invalid because of the anticipatory nature of the legislation. "In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller of Public Accounts, to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER 2 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 31)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 6 of Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and is hereby amended so as follows: "Section 6. On the effective date of this Amendment, the County Hospital District, the County of Lamar County, shall be dissolved. The County of Lamar County shall be transferred for the disposal of the assets of Lamar County Hospital District."

**PUBLIC NOTICE
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER 3 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 41)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 61, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "All district officers of the State of Texas and city officers in counties having a population of twenty (20,000) or more, as of the then last preceding general census, shall be compensated on a salary basis. In counties having a population of less than twenty (20,000), according to the then last preceding census, the Commissioners shall also have authority to determine the compensation of county officers on a fee basis or salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory for the Commissioners to compensate all justices of the peace, constables, and precinct election officers on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1974, and in counties having a population of less than twenty (20,000), according to the then last preceding census, the Commissioners shall also have authority to determine the compensation of county officers on a fee basis or salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory for the Commissioners to compensate all justices of the peace, constables, and precinct election officers on a salary basis."

**PUBLIC NOTICE
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER 4 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 61)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article I, Section 2, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 2. (a) When the convention in regular session in January, 1973, it shall provide by concurrent resolution for the establishment of a constitutional revision commission. The legislature shall appropriate money to an adequate staff, office, equipment, and supplies for the commission. The commission shall report its recommendations to the legislature not later than November 1, 1973. The members of the commission shall be appointed by the legislature on the second day of January, 1974. The commission shall elect a chairman of the commission. The commission shall elect other officers as may be necessary, adopt permanent rules, and publish a journal of proceedings. A person elected to a vacancy in the 63rd Legislature shall be appointed by the convention on the second day of January, 1974. The convention shall be composed of the Speaker of the House, the Lieutenant Governor, and the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. The convention shall be held in conjunction with the Texas Constitution Convention. The convention may provide for the employment of a secretary for the convention, and for the purpose of soliciting appropriate money from the general revenue fund for the treasury. Warrants shall be drawn pursuant to vouchers signed by the chairman or by a person authorized by him in writing to sign them. (c) The convention, by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members, may submit for a vote of the qualified electors of this state a new constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections. Each resolution shall specify the date of the election, the form of the ballots, and the method of publicizing the proposals to be voted on. To be adopted, each proposal must receive the favorable vote of the majority of those voting on the proposal. The conduct of the election, the canvassing of the votes, and the reporting of the returns shall be as provided for elections under Section 1 of this article. (f) The convention may be dissolved by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members, but it is automatically dissolved at 11:59 p.m. on May 31, 1974, unless its duration is extended for a period not to exceed 60 days by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members. (g) The Bill of Rights of the present Texas Constitution shall be retained in full." Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing for a constitutional revision commission which precedes the convening of the members of the 63rd Legislature as a constitutional convention in January, 1974, for the purpose of submitting to the voters a new constitution or revisions of the existing state constitution."

As It Looks From Here
By Rep. Omar Burleson
Member of Congress, Texas



There's an old saying (if it isn't an old saying, we'll start one) that "give me the power to select a Congress and you can have the Presidency." Actually, this has been repeated many times over the years by those with political wisdom and knowledge of the governing process. Even a few Members of Congress—enough to provide a needed responsible majority—can, at any given time, change the trend of things. After all, it is the Congress which passes the laws and holds the purse strings. The President and his appointees administer the laws and spend the money. True enough, he has the power of veto over actions of the Congress but the veto can also be overridden. It is, of course, a matter of the electorate's judgment as to the makeup of the Congress and we differ in our opinions as to what constitutes proper qualifications for the office. Primarily it is assumed that the Congressman's stand on issues is determining. Quite naturally, we differ on basic philosophies of government, which direct the course of our Nation. We can all agree that any Member of Congress should be able to read and write but beyond that, differences of opinion set in as to other qualifying attributes. Descriptive words such as "intelligence, dedication and integrity" and so forth, have meaning but are sometimes difficult to define. Like the zeal of Saul, it depends on the direction these attributes may take. A dedication of purpose can be anywhere around the 360 degrees of the compass. The fact remains that there are obvious truths which, at this time and place in our history, need to be critically observed. It seems that number one should be the re-establishment of complete integrity of our dollar's value. Many other issues are related to this rather simple proposition—inflation, the erosion of people's savings, investments, pensions or whatever. It relates to the crime and our standing with other nations of the world. Given a Congress which is deeply conscious and thoroughly dedicated to preserving a government which can serve the need of its people and at the same time preserve its integrity, then the Presidency is not the most vital office. It is, of course, the highest office and has tremendous authority in making appointments to the

NUMBER 11 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 96)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article IV, Section 17 of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 17. If, during the vacancy in the office of Governor, the Lieutenant Governor should die, resign, refuse to serve, or be removed from office, or be unable to serve, or if he shall be impeached or absent from the State, the President of the Senate, for the time being, shall, in like manner, administer the Government until he shall be succeeded by a Governor or Lieutenant Governor. During the time the Lieutenant Governor administers the Government, as Governor, he shall receive in like manner the same compensation which the Governor would have received had he been employed in the duties of his office." Section 2. That Article III of the Texas Constitution, be amended to add a new Section 24a to read as follows: "Section 24a. The Lieutenant Governor, while he acts as President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the public treasury an annual salary of \$22,500." Section 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide a salary of \$22,500 for the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER 13 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 82)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 13, of the Texas Constitution, be amended by adding a new Section 65 to read as follows: "Section 65. Wherever the Constitution authorizes an agency, instrumentality, or subdivision of the State to issue bonds and specifies the maximum rate of interest which may be paid on such bonds issued pursuant to such constitutional authority, such bonds may bear interest at rates not to exceed a weighted average annual interest rate of 6%. All Constitutional provisions specifically setting rates in conflict with this provision are hereby repealed." This amendment shall become effective upon its adoption. Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "To set a six percent (6%) weighted average annual interest rate for bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority presently having a specified interest ceiling."

**PUBLIC NOTICE
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER 8 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 1)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article IV, Section 4, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 4. The Governor elected at the general election in 1974 and thereafter, shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this State at least five years immediately preceding his election." Section 2. That Article IV, Section 23, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 23. The Attorney General elected at the general election in 1974 and thereafter, shall hold office for four years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and cases in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor, other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature." Section 3. That Article IV, Section 23, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution, shall each hold office for the term of four years and until his successor is qualified. The four-year term applies to these officers who are elected at the general election in 1974 or thereafter. Each shall receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, reside at the Capital of the State during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive for their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this section or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury." Section 4. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State and certain statutory State officers."

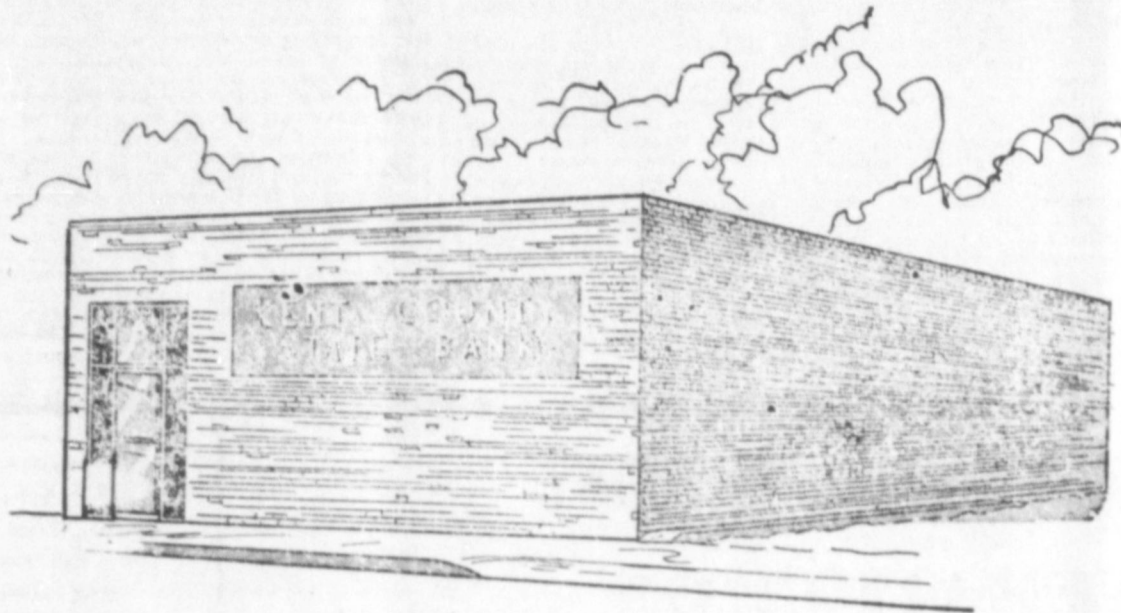
