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

Vacation shall be ten (10) work days per year to be cumulative to twentyworking hard in five (25) days. Vacation shall accrue at the rate of one (1) day per month for all months except July of Representatives and August.

When employment terminates any accrued vacation time shall be paid ertainly there is none for the rate of 1/40th of the employees' monthly salary per day.

Sick leave shall be ten (10) work days per year cumulative to one hundred twenty (120) days. Sick leave shall accrue five(5) day September 1st and five (5) days March 1st of each yer.

Sick leave is defined as absence from work for illness of employee or spouse, his children, grandchildren, parents, brothers, sisters, spouses parents and grandparents and funerals of friends and Substitues may not be

hired by employees. Absence from work of more than one (1) hour of morning or afternoon shall be counted as one-half(1/2)

Recycle Your Old Jeans

Jeans reaching the unwearable state may be retired or recycled. Stitch them into belts, extra big totes or watch bands.

Belts-Cut off one leg, leaving the fabric double. Cut in half length-wise. With right sides together, stitich a seam down cut side, trim, turn and press. Measure waist and add five to six inches. Turn in seam allowance on each end and baste. Top stitch all around the belt with bright colorful thread. Attach buckle, Punch holes in opposite end of belt with ice pick. Button hole stitch around eye to prevent fraying

Moon Rock To Be On Display At The Fail

A fragment of moon rock collection on America's first moon landing mission will be on display during the 55th annual Panhandle South Plains Fair here Sept. 25-30.

The sample, weighing 31 grams, was collected by former astronauts Neil A. Armstrong and Edwin E. Aldrin, Jr. during extravehicular activity on the Apollo Il flight.

The rock was secured from the Narional Aeronautics and Space Administration through the cooperation of U.S. Rep. George H. Mahon of Lubbock.

The sample is a freshappearing vesicular lava, similar in many respects to terrestrial basalts formed by extrusion of a hot gaseous magma onto the earth's surface. The vesicles represent

bubbles formed by the escaping gases within the magma, and they occupy about 15 percent of the sample by volume, accorto NASA scientists.

The shininess of the ves-

icle walls is due to welldeveloped crystal faces of the constituent minerals (feldspar and prorene). Mineralogy was said to

50 percent pyroxene, percent ilmenite and 20 percent plagioclase. The moon rock will be

on display daily throughout the fair run in the Agriculture Building. A guard will be posted with it during all periods of display. At 10 p. m. each night, it will be placed in a vault in keeping with NASA security requirements, fair offi-

Quality Set Aside Provisions Strengthened For 1973 Wheat Provi

tions for-less-than-average-quality set-aside land are being increased for the 1973 programs, producers can be better assured of equitable application of set-aside program provisions in the 1973 wheat, feed grain, and cotton programs, the U.S. Department of Agriculture announced today.

For wheat and feed grain farms, when low quality acreage is offered for setaside -- that is acreage not representative of land on which the farm's crops are grown -- the entire payment will be based on the productivity of the setaside land.

For cotton, the reduction will be computed in the same manner as in 1972, except, that the deduction rate will be 13 cents per pound instead of the 1972 rate of 6 cents.

The deductions were not enough to offset the monetary advantage gained by producting crops on the quality acreage rather than setting it aside from production.

The great majority of participants in the setaside programs have offered quality set-aside acreages in both 1971 and 1972, and the increased deduction rates for 1973 will affect relatively few producers.

In both 1971 and 1972, quality of set-aside has been emphasized, with a requirement that set-aside acreage be representative of cropland acreage on a participating farm. Deductions of set-aside payments are made in cases where set-aside land is not

County ASCS offices will land, diverting it into conmake available set-aside inspection and measurement service to 1973 program participants. This service, which is offered at cost, can provide assurance to farmers that

their set-aside acreage is acceptable for quality and quantity. The set-aside inspection service was first offered in 1972. It is available now to any farmer who wants an early determination and will continue as long as needed. Set-aside land repre-

sentative of cropland on which crops are normally produced is needed to assure achievement of effective production adjustment, according to officials of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service which administers set- aside programs.

Under the Agricultural Act of 1970, participating wheat, feed grain, and cotton producers set aside

a percentage of their cropserving uses, and generally are free to produce as they choose on their remaining cropland. Under this program more decision-making has been returned to farmers. The program provides freedom to plant crops water are to their economic advantage. This has enabled them to make the most efficient use of their land, labor and machinery and has resulted in increased

farm income The recently announced 1973 wheat program offers wheat farmers an even greater degree flexibility in planning their 1973 cropping operations. They will have the added choice of voluntarily setting aside additional acreage for payment and agreeing to limit 1973 wheat acreage or of setting aside only the minimum acreage

without restrictions on their wheat planting.
