Grant Of \$42,764

Governor Dolph Briscoe today announced his approval of a community action grant of \$42,764 in new federal funds to Community Action Council of Floyd, Crosby, Dickens and Kent Counties in Crosbyton for continuing operation of the agency's ongoing General Community Programming and

Family Planning programs. Funded under Title II of the Economic Opportunity Act, the grant includes phase-out funding of \$22,764 for General Community Programming, effective May 1, 1973, through Oct. 31, 1973. Funds totaling \$20,000 are authorized for continuing the agency's Family Planning program for one year, effective May 1, 1973.

General Community Programming funds will be used during the six-month phaseout period to continue the agency's programs of information and assistance to low-income persons in economic development, manpower, education and neighborhood services.

The Family Planning program will provide counseling and contraceptives to some 350 communities of Lockney,
