Bishop Lawrence M. DeFalco, bishop of the Catholic Diocese Amarillo, will formally bless and dedicate to christian wor ship the new Catholic Church of the Epiphany in Jayton Saturday, November 24, at 7:30 p. m. The pastor Fr. Larry Hemp, will assist the bishop in the dedication ceremony and solemn mass of thanksgiving. Refreshments will be served following Refreshments the ceremony and mass. The new facility in-

cludes a chapel with seating capacity of 75, as well as a combination hall and classrooms for religious instruction, and will pastered as a mission church by the pastor of St. Mary's in Spur. The first elected members of the church council are Mr. and Mrs. Frank Garcia, and Mr. and Mrs. Mike Owen.

Formerly the spot Grocery, the structure was purchased in October of last year through a substantial grant by the Catholic Church Ex-Society of Chicago. The remodel was contracted by Joe Latham of Spur, and Garcia Electric and Refrigeration, also of Spur. Commenting on the name of the church, Fr. Hemp said, "Epiphany is the twelfth day of Christmas. Celebrated each year or the 6th of January, commemorates the com-

ing of the wise men to Bethlehem. But there is a deeper theological significance to this event recorded in Matthew's Gospel. It is that of see-God in man. God came to us in human flesh and the faith of the three kings enabled them to penetrate beyond the senses to recognize this. Not a disinterested God content to dwell in the high heavens, God is still among us through the power of his Spirit, poured out on all flesh at the great Pentecost. Thus Jesus could say, What so ever you do to the least of my brothers,


that you do unto me. Epiphany, seeing God as neighbor, is a mystery first perceived by the three wise kings, and it is a mystery that has been perceived by wise men ever since. The Catholic Church is

no new-comer to Jayton for a turbulent and fluid history lies behind the present structure. January of 1929 the first Catholic Church in Jayton St. Mary's was completed Fr. J. H. Krukkert, was dedicated by Bishop Gerken of Amarillo in April. Envisioning Jayton as a major population center for this area, the bishop then authorized purchase of an adjacent residence as a rectory. From this headquarters, Fr. Krukbuilt the Sacred kert Heart Catholic Church in Aspermont, and St. Joseph's in Rotan.

Later population shifts caused Rotan to become the center of the Catholic population in the area, and in 1935 the pricet, then Fr. R. M. Schindler

moved to Rotan and served Jayton as a mission church, living part of the month in Rotan and the other part in Jayton. As Jayton decreased in

size, its neighbor to the north, Spur, became a major population center with a sizeable Catholic opulation. Thus, in 1948, Fr. Hartigan moved St. Mary's Church, Jayton, to Spur, and the properties in Jayton were sold. In 1954 the present St. Mary's was built in Spur, adjacent to the old Jayton church, which was then used as a parish hall. Remodeled in 1970 the solid frame structure of old St. Mary's is still very much in use, and may be seen located on So. 6th street in Spur, next to the present church.

Following the removal St. Mary's in 1948, there was no Catholic Church in Kent County until the mission church of St. John was dedicated by Bishop John Morkovsky at Clairemont on April 9, 1961. The oil boom and consequent population shift relegated the Clairemont church to history in, a very short time, and the church was closed in 1969. The abandoned structure still stands south of highway 380 in Clairemont.

"After almost fifty rears of remarked fluctuation," remarked an area area. Fr, Hemp, "and after an absence of 25 years, a Catholic Church again stands in Jayton to serve the needs of the Catholics of Kent County, and to contribute whatever it can to making Jayton and Kent county a finer place to live. The response of entire community here has been one of great kindness and cooperation. You might say that the dedication on Saturday is really a big Home'--and

it's good to be nome! Though the facilities are small, everyone is cordially invited to the dedication, or to stop by and see the new church at any time. Both Frank Garcia and Mike Owen have keys. Mass is celebrated each Saturday at 7:30 p. m. and anyone is most welcome to at-



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

The Texas Department of Public Safety is activerecruiting applicants fill the ranks of its uniformed services. Major'C. W. Bell, Regional Commander of the DPS, announced that the trainging school for new uniformed law enforce ment personnel is tentatively scheduled to begin February 1, 1974.

The Major noted that the DPS has been increasingly successful in recruiting persons from minority groups to these positions and said efforts in this direction will con-

Also in keeping with the current trend, female applicants will be considered for these rewarding careers in law enforce-

Major Bell said general qualifications for DPS officers are these: applicants must be through 35 years of age; height not less than inches; weight not less than two pounds per inch of height; visual acuity of 20/40 correctable 20/20 and a minimum of 45 semester hours of college credit, of which six hours may be obtained

while in training. Applications may obtained by contacting any DPS employee or any DPS office. The completed application form should be taken to offices in Lubbock, Amarillo or Wichita Falls where the competitive examination given each Tuesday Wednesday at 9:00

Major Bell said persons selected as cadets will be assigned to Austin for training at the DPS Academy. The salary during training will be \$630.00 per month. Upon being commissioned the salary is raised to \$779. mo : fly with the opportunity to advance to \$848. per month.

Uniformed personnel receive additional longevity pay for each five years of service to 25 They are also granted a monthly uniform cleaning allowance, and receive travel expenses when away from their station.

Uniforms, vehicles, weapons, ammunition and related equipment are furnished. Group life and hospitalization are paid for the employee and decoverage is available at reasonable rates. Officers participate in the Employees Retirement System Texas as well as Social Security. Vacation, holi-days and sick leave are as provided for all State employees.

Successful graduates will be assigned to the Highway Patrol, License and Weight Service, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service, or Drivers License Service accord-Drivers ing to the needs of the DPS and consideration of personal preference.

All officers are eligible to compete for promotions after two years of service. Experienced uniformed DPS personnel interested in criminal investigation may apply for appointment to positions in the Criminal Law Enforce ment Division, which includes Narcotics, Intell-igence, Motor Vehicle Theft and Texas Ranger services as vacancies

Hobby Feels State Employees Are Underpaid

By Bill Hobby AUSTIN--It goes without saying----that state government in
Texas could not function without the dedicated ef-forts of some 65,000

public employees.

With this in mind, it disturbs me that Texas ranks 37th among the states in average pay scales for our public emplovees.

And the fact that some workers are so paid that they qualify for welfare assistance is shocking.

Obviously, we must work to rectify these inequities, to insure that Texas does not continue to lag so far behind other public and private employers in benefits.

A major force in guid-Texas to parity in public employment is the Texas Public Employees Association.

More than 38,000 state workers are now members of TPEA. With the cooperation of

the Legislature, I expect TPEA's efforts will do much to raise the pay and benefit levels of state employees.

record of this organization during the 63rd Legislature was impressive--higher salaries, improved vacation time, accumulated sick leave, better retirement benefits, broadened insurance coverage or inclusion under the Workman's Compensation law.

In recent months, the organization has expanded its functions. Included among these is the creation of Empact, the Employees Political Action Council of Texas.
