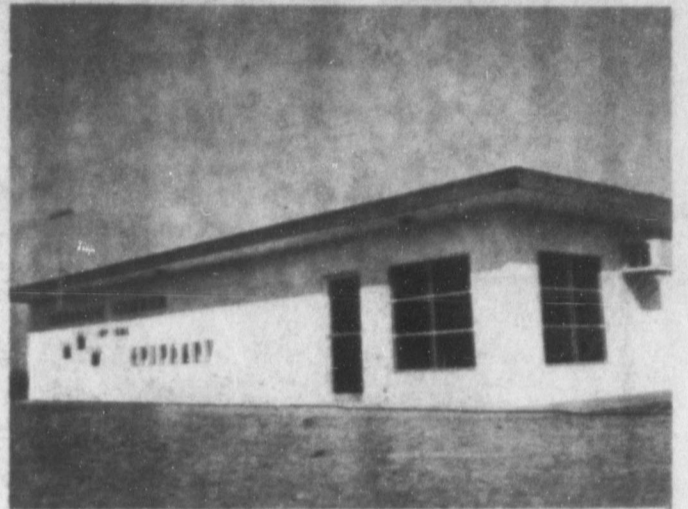

Church Dedication Saturday

REV. LAWRENCE HEMP To Dedicate Jayton Catholic Church

Bishop Lawrence M. DeFalco, bishop of the Catholic Diocese of Amarillo, will formally bless and dedicate to Christian worship the new Catholic Church of the Epiphany in Jayton on Saturday, November 24, at 7:30 p. m. The pastor Fr. Larry Hemp, will assist the bishop in the dedication ceremony and solemn mass of thanksgiving. Refreshments will be served following the ceremony and mass.

The new facility includes a chapel with seating capacity of 75, as well as a combination hall and classrooms for religious instruction, and will be pastored as a mission church by the pastor of St. Mary's in Spur. The first elected members of the church council are Mr. and Mrs. Frank Garcia, and Mr. and Mrs. Mike Owen.

Formerly the Spout Grocery, the structure was purchased in October of last year through a substantial grant by the Catholic Church Extension Society of Chicago. The remodeling was contracted by Joe Latham of Spur, and Garcia Electric and Refrigeration, also of Spur. Commenting on the name of the church, Fr. Hemp said, "Epiphany is the twelfth day of Christmas. Celebrated each year on the 6th of January, it commemorates the coming of the wise men to Bethlehem. But there is a deeper theological significance to this event recorded in Matthew's Gospel. It is that of seeing God in man. God came to us in human flesh and the faith of the three kings enabled them to penetrate beyond the senses to recognize this. Not a disinterested God content to dwell in the high heavens, God is still among us through the power of his Spirit, poured out on all flesh at the great Pentecost. Thus Jesus could say, 'What so ever you do to the least of my brothers, that you do unto me.' Epiphany, seeing God as my neighbor, is a mystery first perceived by the three wise kings, and it is a mystery that has been perceived by wise men ever since."

The Catholic Church is no new-comer to Jayton for a turbulent and fluid history lies behind the present structure. In January of 1929 the first Catholic Church in Jayton St. Mary's was completed by Fr. J. H. Krukkert, and was dedicated by Bishop Gerken of Amarillo in April. Envisioning Jayton as a major population center for this area, the bishop then authorized purchase of an adjacent residence as a rectory. From this headquarters, Fr. Krukkert built the Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Aspermont, and St. Joseph's in Rotan.

Later population shifts caused Rotan to become the center of the Catholic population in the area, and in 1935 the priest, then Fr. R. M. Schindler

moved to Rotan and served Jayton as a mission church, living part of the month in Rotan and the other part in Jayton. As Jayton decreased in size, its neighbor to the north, Spur, became a major population center with a sizeable Catholic population. Thus, in 1948, Fr. Hartigan moved St. Mary's Church, Jayton, to Spur, and the properties in Jayton were sold. In 1954 the present St. Mary's was built in Spur, adjacent to the old Jayton church, which was then used as a parish hall. Remodeled in 1970 the solid frame structure of old St. Mary's is still very much in use, and may be seen located on So. 6th street in Spur, next to the present church.

Following the removal of St. Mary's in 1948, there was no Catholic Church in Kent County until the mission church of St. John was dedicated by Bishop John Morkovsky at Clairmont on April 9, 1961. The oil boom and consequent population shift relegated the Clairmont church to history in a very short time, and the church was closed in 1969. The abandoned structure still stands south of highway 380 in Clairmont.

Nine members of the Jayton Student Council attended the annual convention for the South Plains Association of Student Councils Nov. 17 at Denver City High School.

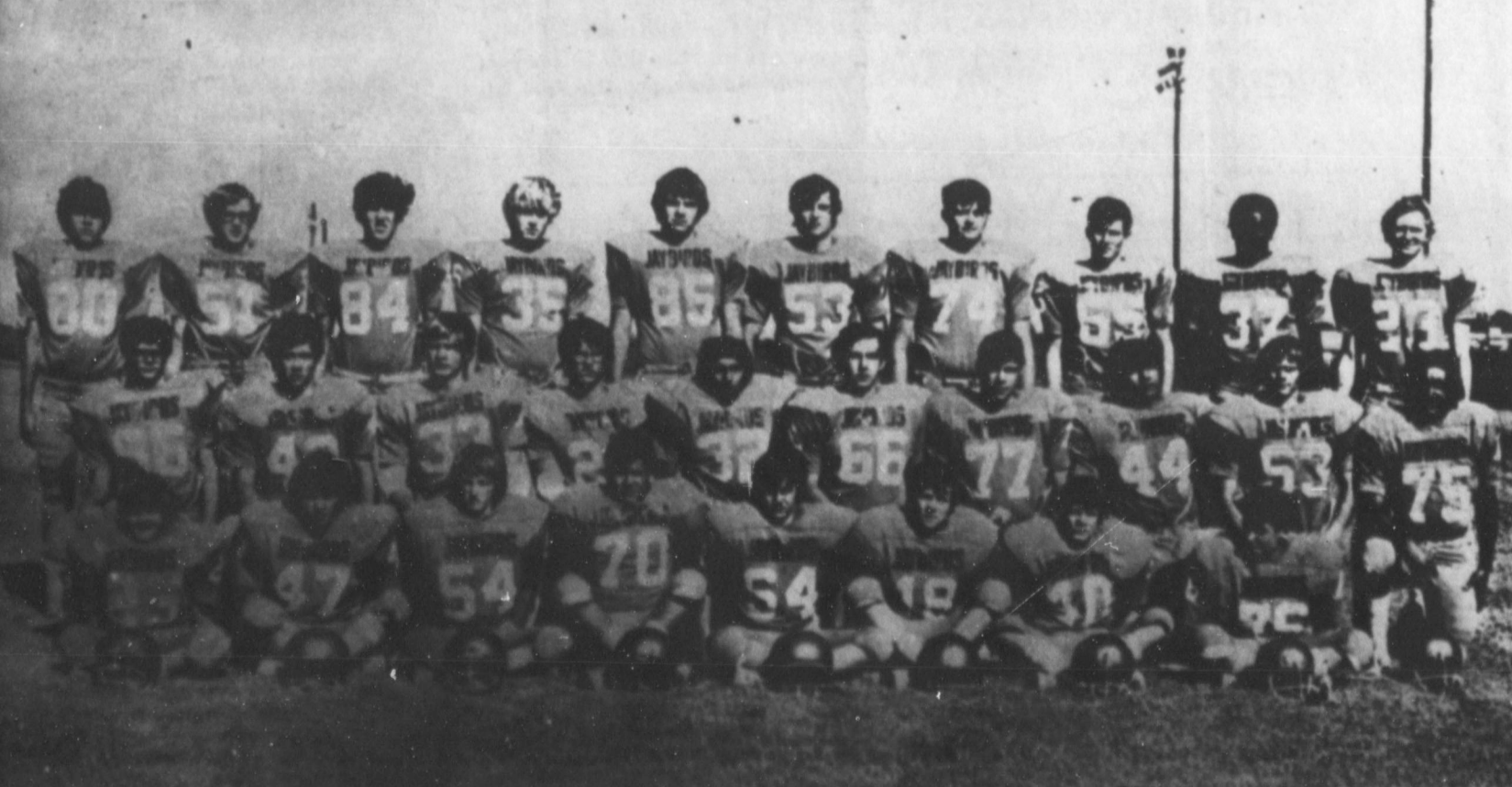

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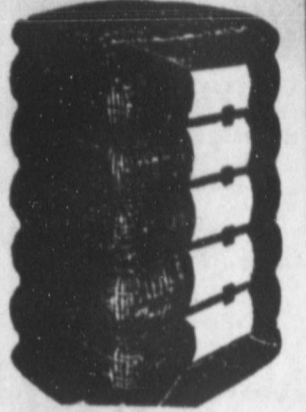

Christmas Comet

Sky watchers are being offered a rare sight in the night skies the end of this year and in January. By the third week of the month the comet Kohoutek will be visible in the November sky and will increase in brilliance until Christmas.

By then, it will be visible as bright as a moon at dawn, with a long tail, thus offering a specially decorated sky for the major ecclesiastical event of the year.

The comet is now headed toward the sun, will be only 13 million miles away at Christmas time (coming from hundreds of millions of miles

out in the solar system); it will then pass within 75 million miles of the earth on January 5th, when it will again be visible to the naked eye.

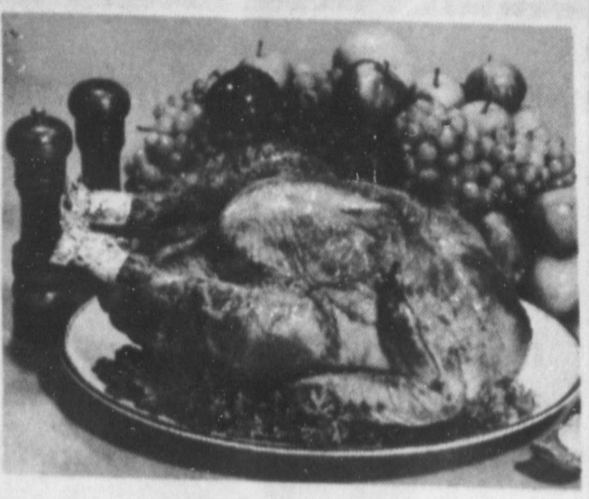

The DPS Is Recruiting For Highway Patrolmen

The Texas Department of Public Safety is actively recruiting applicants to fill the ranks of its uniformed services. Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander of the DPS, announced that the training school for new uniformed law enforcement personnel is tentatively scheduled to begin February 1, 1974.

Arrangements will be made for a physical examination. A character investigation will be conducted and those persons who are accepted for employment will be notified prior to the beginning of the February recruit school.

The Major noted that the DPS has been increasingly successful in recruiting persons from minority groups to these positions and said efforts in this direction will continue. Also in keeping with the current trend, female applicants will be considered for these rewarding careers in law enforcement.

Applications may be obtained by contacting any DPS employee or any DPS office. The completed application form should be taken to offices in Lubbock, Amarillo or Wichita Falls where the competitive examination is given each Tuesday and Wednesday at 9:00 a. m.

Major Bell said persons selected as cadets will be assigned to Austin for training at the DPS Academy. The salary during training will be \$630.00 per month. Upon being commissioned the salary is raised to \$779. monthly with the opportunity to advance to \$848. per month.

Uniformed personnel receive additional longevity pay for each five years of service to 25 years. They are also granted a monthly uniform cleaning allowance, and receive travel expenses when away from their station.

Uniforms, vehicles, weapons, ammunition and related equipment are furnished. Group life and hospitalization are paid for the employee and dependent coverage is available at reasonable rates. Officers participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas as well as Social Security. Vacation, holidays and sick leave are as provided for all State employees. Successful graduates will be assigned to the Highway Patrol, License and Weight Service, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service, or Drivers License Service according to the needs of the DPS and consideration of personal preference. All officers are eligible to compete for promotions after two years of service. Experienced uniformed DPS personnel interested in criminal investigation may apply for appointment to positions in the Criminal Law Enforcement Division, which includes Narcotics, Intelligence, Motor Vehicle Theft and Texas Ranger services as vacancies occur.

Hobby Feels State Employees Are Underpaid

By Bill Hobby AUSTIN--It goes without saying-----that state government in Texas could not function without the dedicated efforts of some 65,000 public employees.

With this in mind, it disturbs me that Texas ranks 37th among the states in average pay scales for our public employees.

And the fact that some state workers are so poorly paid that they qualify for welfare assistance is shocking. Obviously, we must work to rectify these inequities, to insure that Texas does not continue to lag so far behind other public and private employers in benefits.

A major force in guiding Texas to parity in public employment is the Texas Public Employees Association.

More than 38,000 state workers are now members of TPEA.

With the cooperation of the Legislature, I expect TPEA's efforts will do much to raise the pay and benefit levels of state employees.

The record of this organization during the 63rd Legislature was impressive--higher salaries, improved vacation time, accumulated sick leave, better retirement benefits, broadened insurance coverage or inclusion under the Workman's Compensation law.

In recent months, the organization has expanded its functions. Included among these is the creation of Impact, the Employees Political Action Council of Texas.

This multi-partisan group is designed to assist public employees in expressing their concern for the general well being of state workers and their families. Impact doubtless will have a significant voice in the political processes of our state.

A survey of TPEA members showed that almost 50 per cent indicated an active interest in the organization's programs. More than half of them felt their pay is below acceptable levels.

The survey also disclosed dissatisfaction with varying personnel policies between depart-

ments. Many felt a need for improved relationships between management and employees.

It is apparent, then that much remains to be done. The job will not be finished until Texas is a model employer.

I am confident that the TPEA will continue its untiring efforts, working with the Legislature, to edge Texas closer to this enviable goal.

Golf Cart Accidents

Hanson and his wife were heading for the clubhouse in a golf cart when she had a sudden urge to stand up. But as she did so, she lost her balance and fell against the tiller. The cart lurched crazily, throwing Hanson to the ground.

Painfully injured, he determined to seek damages from the management of the club.

"Considering how unstable their carts are," he argued in a court hearing, "they should have posted a warning against anyone standing up. This they failed to do."

Generally speaking, claims for damages have not been too successful, often because the blame lies with the victim himself. But if the mechanism is faulty, compensation may indeed be collected from either the club management or the cart manufacturer.

In another case, the golf cart was missing the rubber pad that normally covers the brake pedal. When the driver tried to use the brake, his spiked shoe slid off the pedal and hit the accelerator, causing the cart to run into another golfer.

This time, the victim collected from the club management. Grounds: negligent maintenance of equipment.

One club tried to block any and all claims by including a "we are not responsible" clause in its rental form. But the clause was so well hidden in printed

verbiage that a court later found it to be null and void. The court said enforcing such a clause against an injured golfer, unaware of its existence, "would truly be unconscionable."

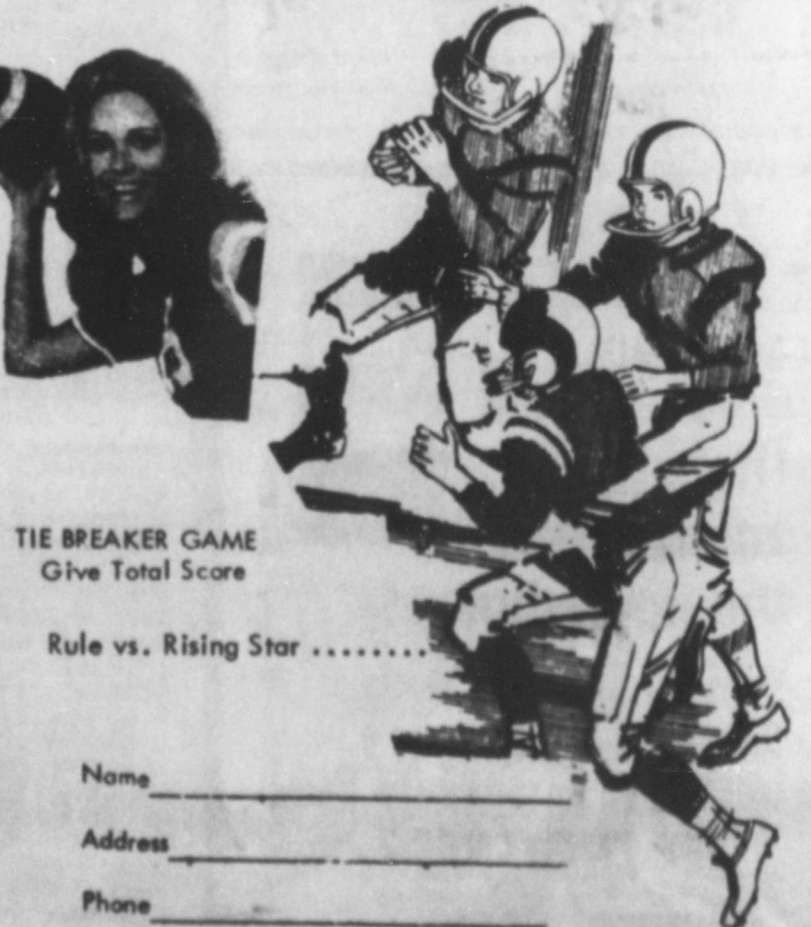
