Fuel Shortage Cleared For Agri. Products

The county ASCS has been informed by the Re-gional Director of the Federal Energy Office that farmers and ranchers and ranchers are to receive 100% of their fuel needs as they pertain

to agriculture. It was further stated that it will be the responsibility of the fuel distributor to furnish this fuel. However, the farmer or rancher should inform his dealer of the amount of each type fuel needed for the year on

a monthly bases. If the distributor does not have a sufficient allocation to handle the needs of the agriculture producer, then he may file a Form 17 requesting that his allocation be in-

Each agriculture pro-ducer needs to have a conservation fuel plan and certify that he will use the fuel for agriculture purposes only.

In extreme emergencies where the distributor is unable to furnish an agriculture producer his needed fuel, then the producer may file a Form 20 with the State Fuel Allocation Office in Austin and receive an emergency allocation.

It was urged that each producer try to work out his fuel problem with his dealer. The ASCS Office will be glad to help any agriculture producer if he finds that his dealer cannot furnish needed



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The moguls who make strategy decisions for big oil might be underestimating the little man in America. If it's true, as reported, that the major companies have cut back on imports because they are dissatisfied with federal oil policy, if the excessive profit reports of many firms in late 1973 are accurate and if the oil companies are, in general, maneuvering primarily in this time of crisis for millions to jack up prices rather than bring in, and refine, all the oil they can, they're inviting Congress to set up a permanent and stringent regulation of their industry.

That would in this case be in the national interest and would have been brought on by the short-sighted behavior of the industry itself. What industry leaders seem to be underestimating is the degree of disapproval of industry methods by the general public-and this, in the end, will translate itself into congressional action.

Ford's Seat

Vice President Gerald Ford's former congressional seat was won recently by a Democrat in a close contest in Michigan. Democrats immediately hailed the triumph as a signal November's national elections would produce a Democratic

That may be. But the Republican in the Michigan race predicted defeat, and in the final tally lost by the slimmest of margins, so nothing is certain, never is in politics. That being said, however, the result is unmistakably a sober warning to Republicans.

Michigan's G.O.P. party chief blamed Watergate for the defeat and national party chairman George Bush admitted concern. Traditionally, a Republican is favored in Michigan's 5th District, and no Democrat had held this seat since 1910. That is why the narrow Democratic victory is signifi-

In the past, Republican victors had often polled about sixty per cent of the total vote and Democrats less than forty per cent. In the recent election the Democratic victor received 51 per cent, apparently a voter switch of better than ten per cent. In politics ten per cent is a very substantial, usually decisive, shift-and thus the significance of the vote in Michigan's 5th District.

A Weekly Report Of Agri-Business News

Of The Texas Department of Agriculture John C. White, Commissioner

Now Is The Time . . . Cattle On Feed Resumes Upward Trend . . . Auction Sales Report Increases . . . Broiler, Egg-Type Chicks On The Rise.

The experimental predator control program for 44 Texas counties is now in operation. County agents are responsible for setting up training schools in approved counties.

To be elibible to participate in the program, your county must be approved; then you must attend a training school relating to use of the M-44 sodium cyanide spring

Counties in Texas eligible for the program are Cottle, King, Dickens, Borden, Scurry, Mitchell, Taylor, Callahan, Midland, Glasscock, Sterling, Coleman, Crane, Upton, Jeff Davis, Pecos, Presidio, Kinney, Uvalde, Medina, Bexar, McCulloch, San Saba, Mills, Stephens, Erath, Brown, Comanche, Hamilton, Bosque, Coryell, Lampasas, Bell, McLennan, Burnet, Williamson, Hood, Milam, Jim Wells, Nueces, Kleberg, Kenedy, Brooks, and Willacy.

The Texas Department of Agriculture is responsible

for the program on a state level. Other agencies cooperating include the Texas Agriculture Experiment Station, and The Texas Rodent and Predator Control Service as well as the Extension Service. The project is in cooperation with the Environmental Protection Agency.

Producers who participate in the experiment must keep records of all results with the M-44. Violation of the regulations can result in loss of eligibility for a county. The program will continue through June, 1975.

Further details may be obtained from the Texas Department of Agriculture or your county agent.

CATTLE feeding in Texas has shown a resumption of increasing numbers, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service notes. In Texas, there were 2,340,000 cattle and calves on feed for slaughter markets as of February 1. This is six per cent above a year ago and six per cent above the number on feed a month ago.

Placements into Texas feedlots during January totaled 467,000 head which is a gain of 44 per cent above January of 1973 and 69 per cent more than the previous

However, marketings of fat cattle during January totaled 332,000 head, which is six per cent below a year

Nationwide, the number of cattle on feed in the seven major cattle feeding states. Texas, Arizona, California, Colorado, Iowa, Nebraska and Kansas-totaled 9,632,000 head. This is a three per cent increase from a month ago but four per cent less than those on feed a year ago at this time.

SALES for all kinds of livestock at Texas auctions compared to a year ago and a month ago are higher. Cattle and calves marketed through auctions during January were



The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN--Every consumer has seen or heard advertisements that say something like "regularly \$10, now only \$8.99," or "Two for the price of one,"

These are types price comparison, widely used and effective method of advertising. In price comparison

advertising, the merchant compares his current prices for goods or services with past or future prices or the prices offered by others in order to show cost savings to consumers.

Accurately used price comparisons can assist consumers in making decisions, purchasing since they show exactly how much can be saved on a particular item during a special period. Most merchant use price comparison to advertise legitimate cost A few, reductions. though, may base their price comparison ad-vertising on inflated or arbitrary prices, which is misleading to

consumer. For example, an ad may say 'Lawn mowers reduced from \$129.95 to \$99.95--you save \$30 during our special pre-season sale!"

If the lawn mowers are normally priced at \$129.95 this is an accurate and helpful use of price comparison to advertise a sale. However, if the mowers always sell at \$99.95, this is misleading and llegal, according to lawyers in my Consumer Protection

Division. It is also misleading and illegal if the retailer boosted his price to \$129.95 for just a few days prior to the sale, because the former price at which an item is advertised must have been in effect for a reasonable time on a regular

basis before the sale. It may be deceptive if the merchandise advertised at the 'lower' current price differs from merchandise previously sold at the indic-



PRAISE THE PETUNIA



Petunias make excellent hanging baskets, as the picture above testifies. Best for this purpose are the hybrid grandiflora single varieties, especially pink, red and white.

Did you know that there was no such flower as a red petunia until 1950 when an American breeder developed one, and that double petunias did not exist until a Japanese breeder found the secret of creating double petunias? These breakthroughs in petunia breeding set off a furious activity among breeders to create new colors and forms so that today

by far exceeds any other class of annual flowers. Basically, petunias are classi-fied under four main groups single grandifloras (largest flow-ered), single multifloras (smaller

flowered, but more of them), double grandifloras, and double Single grandifloras are the cost popular and White Casade petunia is perhaps the cost spectacular example of most spectacular example of this class. It creates a magnifi-cent bedding effect and it is exceptional as a container planting as in hanging baskets. Individual flowers measure up to 4½ inches across. Apple-blossom, an All-America Winner, is

som, an All-America Winner, is another superb grandiflora.

Multifloras are small-flowered and not frilled, but their abundance of bloom gives a greater density of color than other petunias. Outstanding varieties recognized by All-America Selections, the national acad teich ctions, the national seed trials,

the list of new petunia varieties are Comanche and Coral Satin. Many good mixtures are also available.

Double grandifloras include a spectacular bi-color red-and-white called Circus, which won an All-America Award, and among the multifloras Sugar

Plum is especially good.

Petunia seed is tiny and must be handled with care, sowing seeds thinly in a seed starter six weeks before outdoor planting. The double-flowered need extra care, and a good way to get them started is to sprinkle the seed sparingly on a wad of paper tissue. Make the tissue into a loose roll, and keep moist until the tiny seedlings germi ate. Then you can carefully transfer them to individual peat pots until ready for transplant-ing outdoors. Alternatively, peat pellets are an excellent way to get petunias started.
