The Unemployed
Milton Friedman, who recently won the Nobel prize
for his work in economics, startled many when he told a national television audience recently that the number of unemployed no longer indicated the state of the
economy. economy.
He said one way to reduce unemployment rolls was to get the government out of the unemployment com-
pensation business! Few politicians will be so bol as to embrace this principle. But Friedman has a
point. point.
He notes that baseball players making more than He notes that baseball players making more than
$\$ 100,000$ a year are now eligible for unemployment compensation in their off months, that the wife of a
friend of his during a year's study abroad is currently friend of his during a year's study, abroad is currently
