

# GIWINNING IN am Wins First Home Meet

Ten meet records fell as the Stratford girls ran up 136 points to win their home meet of the season Friday, March 19.

Diann Riffe broke three of the records with individual wins in the triple jump (34'3"), the long jump (16'6 1/2"), and the 100-meter run (12.77). She also anchored the record setting 800-meter relay team (1:52.73, along with Risa Adams, Carol Chesher, and ViAnn Ferguson).

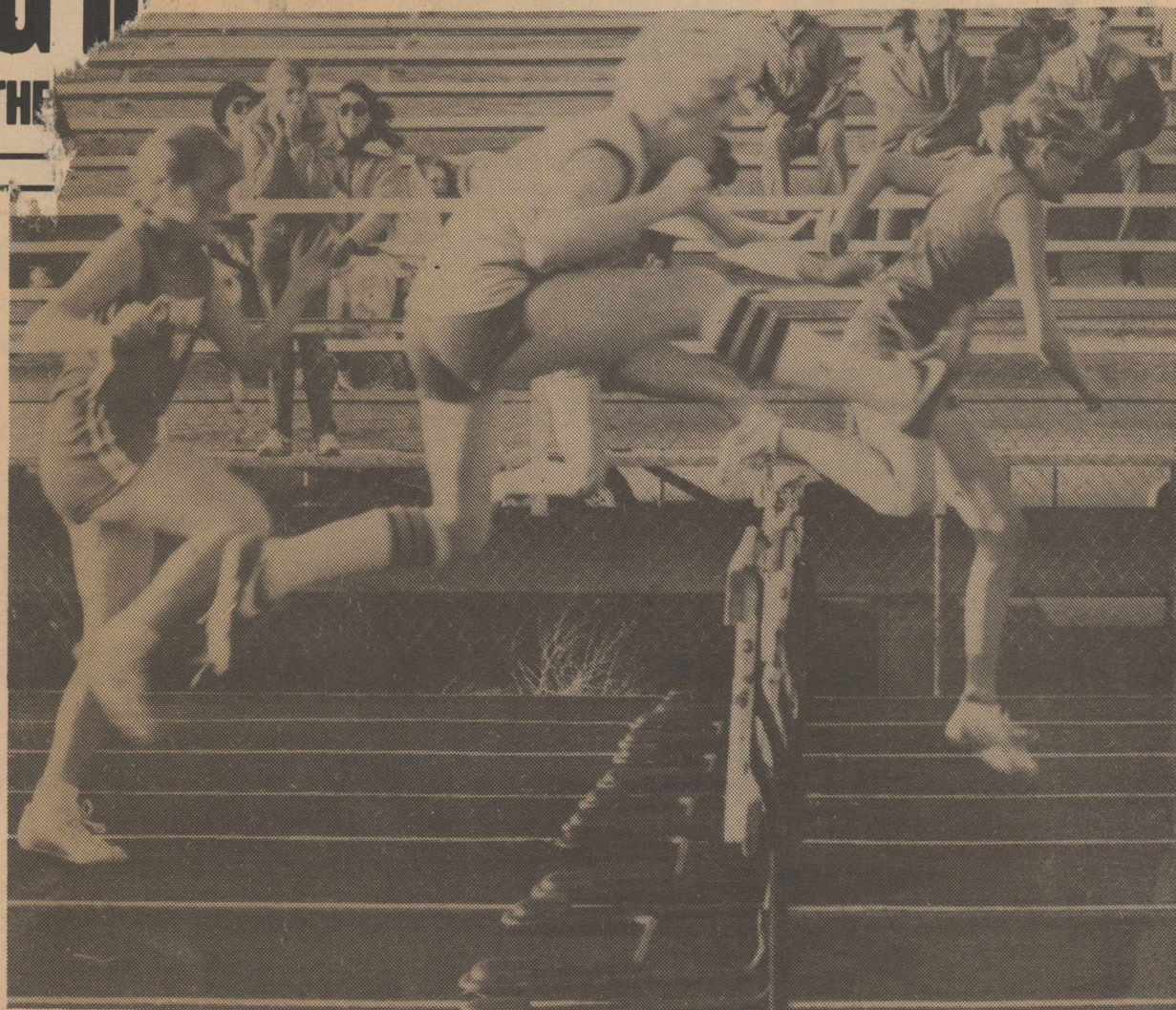
Stratford's other first place finish was also meet record as Lisa Zak recorded a 6:18.84 in the 1600-meter relay.

Other Elkettes to finish in the top four were Cherie Brown, 32'11", in the shot put for second place; Lisa Zak, 2:42.22, in the 800-meter for second place; 400-meter relay team 53.68 for third; Christi Lancaster, 28.37, in the 200-meter for third; Leah Brown, 89'9 1/2", in the discus for fourth; Carrie Brown, 17.55, in the 100-meter hurdles for fourth; Christi Lancaster, 13.42, in the 100-meter for fourth; ViAnn Ferguson, 28.64, in the 200-meter for fourth.

Despite winds that gusted to about 50 miles per hour by the evening finals, all but six of the 16 events featured record breaking performances.

Point totals for the event were as follows: Stratford 136, Spearman 120, Fritch 100, Perryton 88.5, Sunray 88, Stinnett 24.5.

Stratford will travel to Spearman March 26 and 27.

## Five Accidents in County for February

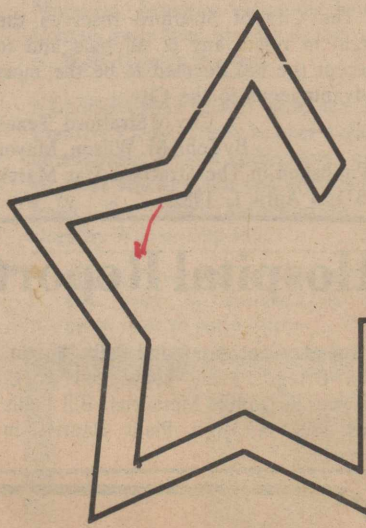
Sergeant John L. Hood, Area Supervisor of Sherman County, reports that for the month of February the Texas Highway Patrol Troopers investigated a total of five accidents in this county. There were no fatal accidents with a total of no persons killed, four injury accidents with a total of six persons injured, and one property damage accident. In District 5B, which includes

the top 31 counties of Texas Panhandle, there were 322 accidents investigated by the Texas Highway Patrol. Highway Patrol Captain Bob Russell reports that the Texas Highway Patrol Troopers investigated two fatal accidents with a total of three persons killed, 110 injury accidents with a total of 166 persons injured, and 210 property damage accidents.

## Bikers Support A Healthier Life for Americans with Cystic Fibrosis

Everyday, every five hours, a child is born with Cystic Fibrosis. And everyday, every eight hours, someone dies from cystic fibrosis. Here in Stratford, bikers can bike their way to help support a healthier life for the 30,000 Americans who suffer from cystic fibrosis (CF), the number one genetic killer of young people in the United States.

Cystic fibrosis is an incurable lung-damaging and digestive disease, according to the Stratford Chapter of the CF Foundation, sponsor of the CF Bike-A-Thon on Sunday, April 25.

Geneticists estimate that one in every 20 Americans is an unknowing and symptomless carrier of the gene which can cause CF in a child. If a child receives a CF gene from each of two unsuspecting gene carriers, the child has a 25 percent chance of being born with cystic fibrosis.

Because carriers don't show any signs of CF, and because a reliable carrier test is not yet available, a person's carrier

status isn't recognized until he or she becomes the parent of a child with CF. The foundation is funding research to find an effective carrier test and to find a cure for CF.

It's a complicated process involving basic research to understand the exact nature of the alteration caused by the CF gene. When this defect is pinpointed, it will enable scientists to determine the sequence of physical and chemical events which occur with CF. It will also help develop a screening tool for newborns and a better means to combat the complications of CF and other similar respiratory and digestive disorders affecting children.

Although there is yet no cure for CF, earlier diagnosis and more effective treatment now means that about half of the children born today with CF can be expected to live past the age of 20--where once such children died early in life.

Accurate early diagnosis is sometimes difficult. CF symptoms mimic other lung

and digestive disorders such as chronic bronchitis, allergy and asthma. Because of this, the Foundation estimates that only one of every two to three individuals with CF is accurately diagnosed in any given year.

The signs of CF include a salty taste of the skin, recurrent wheezing, persistent coughing with excessive mucus,

pneumonia more than once, excessive appetite with poor weight gain, and enlargement of the fingertips. Additional signs include persistent, bulky diarrhea and nasal polyps.

The CF Foundation is a 26-year-old voluntary non-profit health agency which supports research to find the means for the prevention, control and

effective treatment of CF. In addition, the Foundation carries out education programs to increase knowledge of CF among the public and medical profession.

Stratford JV track team took second in a field of 12 teams at Dalhart recently with a school record being broken and two records being tied.

Kent Harrington set the JV school record with a 55.82 in the 400-meter dash to take one of five second place finishes for Stratford.

Brett Cummings tied the 110-meter school record with a time of 16.01 in the preliminaries and the 1600-meter relay team (Harrington 55.9, Bobby Schertler 58.2, Cummings 55.4, and David Naugle 57.4) tied the school record in that event at 3:46.33 for second place.

Stratford finished one-two-three in the 110-meter hurdles with Chris Baker, Brett Cummings and Bobby Schertler sweeping the event.

David Naugle recorded a 2:11 in the 800-meter. Brett Cummings had a 42.71 in the 300-meter intermediate hurdle and Brent Spurlock pole vaulted 10'6", all good for second place.

Other third place finishes were: Bobby Schertler 43.4 in 300-meter intermediate hurdles, and Brett Cummings 5'6" in the high jump.

Final results for the JV meet were as follows:

Dumas 144.67, Stratford 106, Boys Ranch 93, Dalhart 69, Borger 17, Fritch 15.5, Guymon 14, Perryton 12, Sunray 11, Panhandle 6, Gruver 5, River Road 2.

The Stratford boys' track team finished 6th in a field of 13 at the recent Dalhart track meet. The Elks recorded 37 points.

In the 3200-meter run, Gonzalo Torres broke the school record in a time of 11:04 for 6th place.

The highest finishes by Stratford were a pair of 3rd place medals taken by Kevin Stanley (15.55) in the 110-meter high hurdles, and Steve Phillips 138'7" in the discus.

The 1600-meter relay team took one of four 4th place finishes (Danny Barrett 54.4, Todd Thurman 52.23, Buddy Schertler 54.2, and Rodney Roberson 55.4) with a time of 3:35.9.

Other 4ths were recorded by Craig Sladek (6'0") in the high jump, Buddy Schertler (4.28) in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles, and Rodney Roberson (2:04.55) in the 800-meter dash.

Final varsity results were: Dalhart 122, River Road 94.5, Panhandle 79, Perryton 56, Boys Ranch 53.5, Stratford 37, Fritch 30, Dumas 25, Sunray 14, Guymon 8, Channing 6, Dimmitt 2, Gruver 0.

After college he went east to spend two years at the Harvard Divinity School on a Rockefeller Foundation grant, then returned to west Texas.

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In my distress I called upon the Lord, and he heard my voice. Psalm 18

"For Which of these (good deeds) do you stone me?"...Across the Jordan...many came to believe in him --Jn. 10:32, 40, 42. People lined up against and for Jesus, according to their attitudes, expectations and standards of judgment. All saw the same person and witnessed the same good works, but the reactions were different. Some, with faith in the works, came to believe in Him. Others, more concerned about their preconceived ideas of blasphemy than about acknowledging the good before them, sought to destroy him; their only response was violence.

Jesus, like prophets before and after His time, was a sign of contradiction to the people around Him. Jeremiah, for example, as recalled in the book of Jeremiah 20, 10-13, was a victim of those who watched him in order to find grounds for trapping, denouncing and disgracing him. (Jer. 20:1-13).

Those who perform the Father's work, as Jesus did, have to expect the same kinds of reaction He encountered--applause and jeers.

During the remainder of Lent let us pray frequently with the publican in the parable: God be merciful to me a sinner. Thus purified we will be better prepared to celebrate the Light of Christ at Easter.

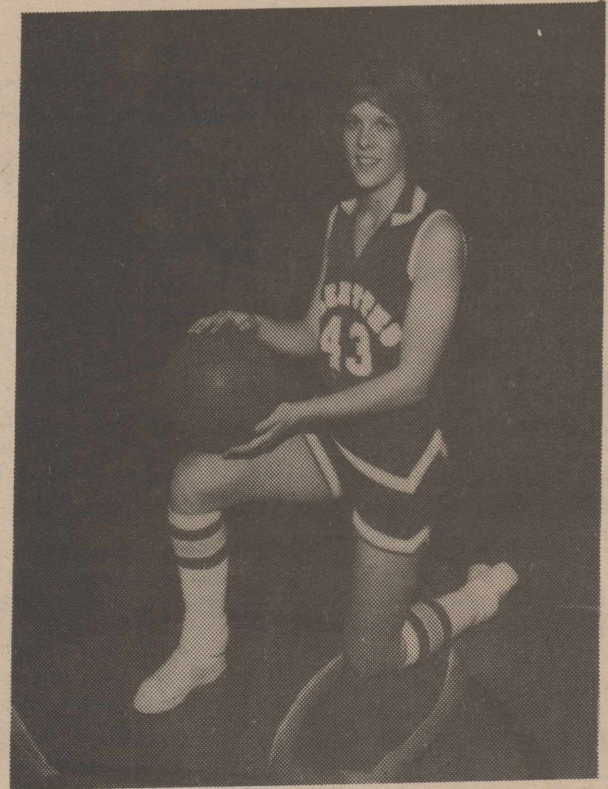


Nannette Boardman jumping hurdles Friday, March 19, at the Stratford Track Meet.

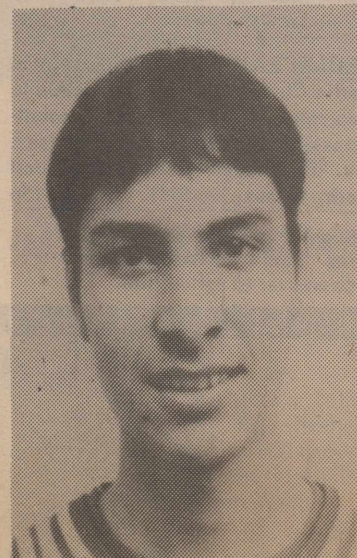

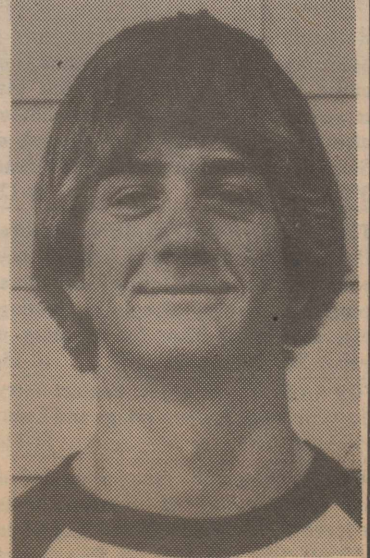
Left to right, Jennifer Wells, Lisa Zak, and Mari K Engelbrecht beginning the 800-meter event.
