Albert wins Demo. runoff

Mary "Shorty" Albert received the nomination for Sherman County District and County Clerk in the Democratic runoff election held Saturday, June 5.

Albert received 358 votes while her opponent, Ernestine Almquist received 221 votes. The clerks race was the only runoff held on the local level, but four other runoffs were held at the state level.

County Library Now Offers Books-by-Mail Service

Catalogs for a tax-supported books-by-mail service are available at the Sherman County Library.

Books by mail service is again being offered to all twenty-five counties of the Texas Panhandle. The popular service was discontinued two years ago due to decreasing federal funding; it is being made possible at this time because of an increase in state funding for libraries appropriated last year.

The program is provided by the Texas Panhandle Library System and is intended as a supplement to regular library service for people unable to use a library on a regular basis, due to illness, lack of transportation, or distance to the library. People who are geographically isolated, homebound, or otherwise unable to visit their libraries regularly will be served by mail during the next year.

The service is provided without charge to the user. Books are sent to individuals from the Texas Panhandle Library System office in Amarillo and

return postage for the books is included.

Five hundred paperback book titles are listed in the Mail-a-Book catalog. The choice of books include mysteries, romances, adventure stories, westerns, how-to-books, and recent best sellers, as well as a variety of books for children and youth.

The catalogs are available now at the Sherman County Library. Persons interested in receiving books-by-mail service need to contact the library and ask the librarian if they are eligible to receive a catalog.

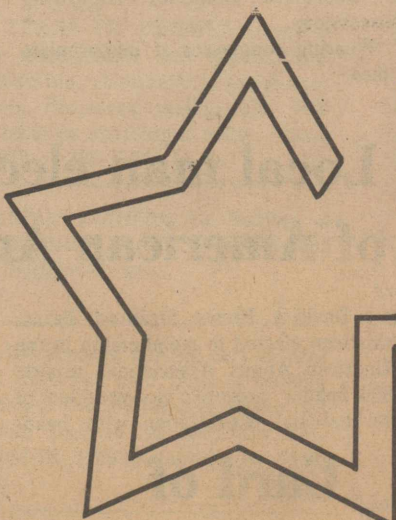

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Gross Sales Up Locally During Final Quarter

Gross sales in Sherman County increased by 43 percent during the last quarter of 1981, as compared to the final quarter of 1980, it was announced by the state comptroller's office.

The 107 reporting outlets in the county reported sales of \$13,129,648 for the final three months of 1981 as

compared to \$9,183,767 over the same period in 1980.

Total gross sales for 1981 came to \$337 billion in the state. Comparisons of fourth quarter returns showed Texas as a whole reported \$18 billion more in sales this year than last. That represented an increase of 19.9 percent.

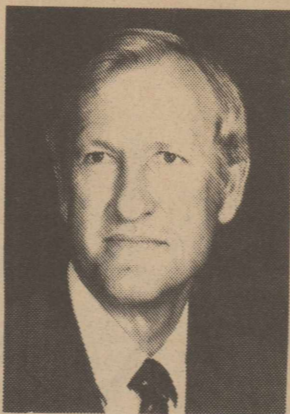

County Attorney reports:

Drug Abuse symptoms

The following article is a public service of the Stratford Star though the cooperation of David G. Lewis County Attorney and The Prosecutor Council. Its purpose is to make you aware of a prosecutor's role, of your responsibility as a resident of Sherman County and how we can work together to alleviate some of society's problems.

The problems of identifying alcohol and drug abuse and what to do if serious involvement is suspected should be of special interest of parents. Early detection of such a problem is vital to preventing serious damage to the emotional well-being of the abuser and those close to him. Drug or alcohol abuse is often a symptom of deeper problem. With the advent of summer months, the temptation and available time for use or abuse of drugs, including alcohol, is much greater.

Chronic abusers often exhibit three traits. First, they have low self-esteem. They don't feel good about themselves and are dependent on others for their self-worth. Second, they lack emotional control. They allow negative feelings to drag them along and feel chronically miserable. Third, they have difficulty establishing close relationships.

Some common physical symptoms of young abusers are:

- Changes in school or work attendance, discipline and grades.
- Change in character of homework turned in.
- Unusual flare-ups or outbreaks of temper.
- Poor physical appearance.
- Secretive behavior regarding possessions.
- Wearing sunglasses at inappropriate times.

- Long-sleeved shirts worn constantly to hide needle marks.
- Association with known drug abusers.
- Borrowing money from friends to purchase drugs.
- Stealing small items.
- Finding the student in odd places, such as closets and storage rooms.

If you discover a young person is using drugs or alcohol, calling the police usually isn't the answer. You may be relinquishing responsibility when the child needs your support the most. Also remember that some young people experiment with drugs and alcohol in response to peer pressure without developing a serious problem. But don't ignore the situation. Get outside help quickly.

Check with your local mental health and mental retardation center or family service center for drug problems. For problems with alcohol, Al-Anon Family Groups are listed in most telephone directories.

Call (800) 2525-9642, a toll-free number of the Abuse Prevention Division of the Texas Department of Community Affairs if you don't know the location of a treatment service in your area. In addition to directing you to help in your area they publish over 200 informative pamphlets, booklets and posters suitable for Junior and High School students and parents, in addition to highly technical research on alcohol and drug abuse. They also have films available for free loan to groups and individuals. You may write the Abuse Prevention Division at: P.O. Box 13155, Capital Station-Austin, TX 78711. 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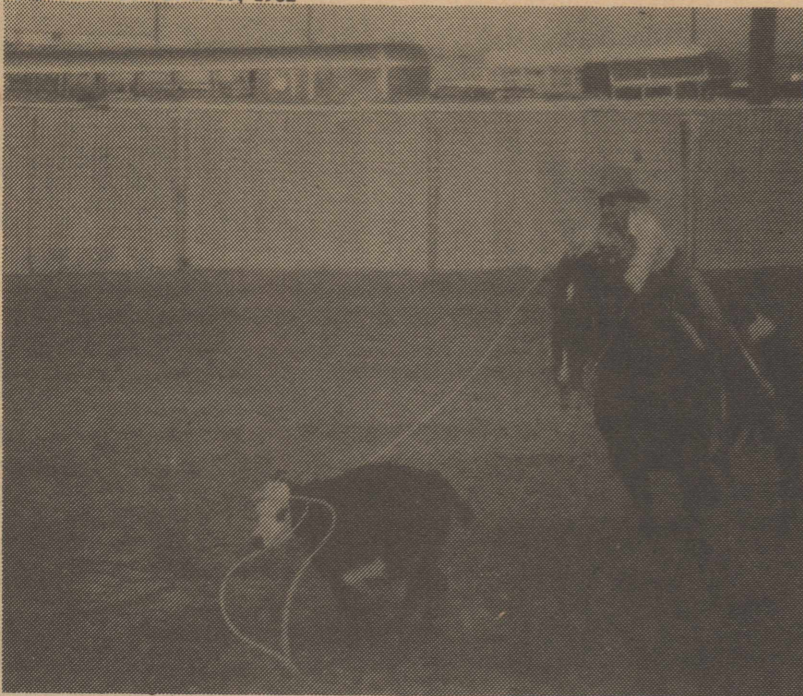

Harris was graduated cum laude in May from the College of Agricultural Science of Texas Tech University. He received his Bachelor of Science degree in Animal Science-Pre-Vet and will begin work at A&M in late August toward a Doctorate of Veterinary Medicine degree.

Upon completion of his high school education Kurt was a recipient of the Frank M. Carter and Houston Livestock Show Scholarships.

marked by wide waistbands. They carried lavender parasols decorated with corsages of deep lavender roses, white daisies, violets and lavender ribbons.

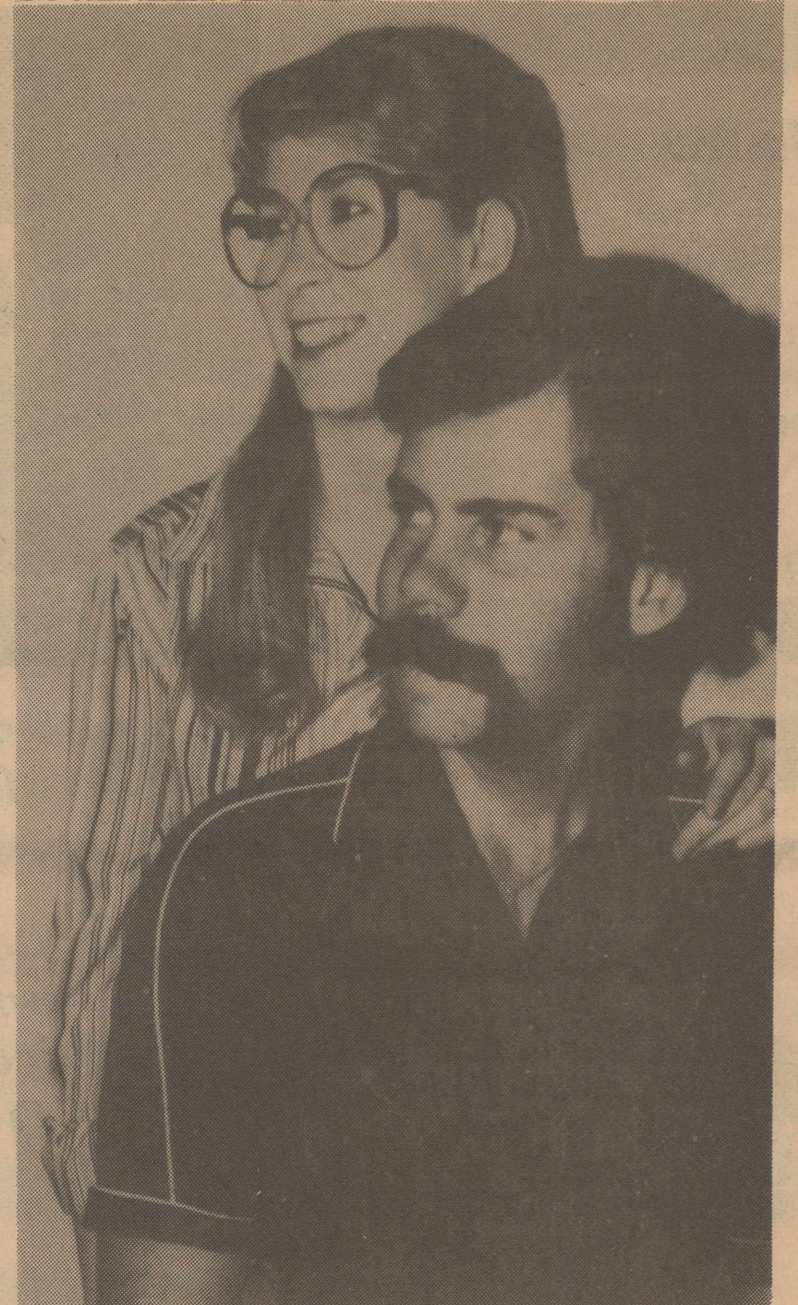

Legal Notice

An ordinance prohibiting any person driving a motor vehicle from turning left across double yellow stripes in order to park the motor vehicle in a parking space on the opposite side of the street; providing a penalty not exceeding \$200.00 for violation of this ordinance; and declaring an emergency

Whereas, the Chief of Police of the City of Stratford has indicated a problem with drivers of motor vehicles crossing the double stripes to park on the opposite side of the streets of the City in that persons leaving parking spaces on the streets are not aware of the possibility of danger from said drivers;

Whereas, the current practice results or could result in accidents and injury to the people of the City of Stratford and others; and

Whereas, it is in the public interest to regulate and prohibit such driving conduct;

Now Therefore: Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Stratford:

Section 1. No driver of a motor vehicle shall at anytime turn the motor vehicle left across double yellow stripes now existing or hereafter placed on any street in the City of Stratford in order to park the motor vehicle in a parking space on the opposite side of the street. Section 2. This ordinance shall not be construed to make it illegal to turn left across any double yellow stripes into alleyways, streets, private driveways or public parking lots.

Section 3. Any person who shall violate the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$200.00.

Section 4. An emergency is apparent for the immediate preservation of order and public safety that requires this ordinance to come effective at once. Upon passage of this ordinance by a majority vote of the Council, it shall become effective.

Sherman County to be included in two highway programs

Two projects in Sherman County are included in the 1983 State Highway Safety and Betterment Program recently approved by the Texas State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

The program provides \$10,500 to seal coat 1.5 miles of Farm to Market Road 520 from FM 1060 east to the Hansford County line.

The program also provides \$69,800 to seal coat 10.9 miles of FM 1573, from US Highway 287 east to FM 119.

The seal coating helps preserve and protect the riding surface as well as improving the skid resistance and riding

qualities. District Engineer A.L. McKee said the work is part of a continuing effort to modernize and increase the safety characteristics of roads and highways which are worn out or inadequate for today's traffic.

Statewide, the program provides improvements to 3,908 miles of highways. The program includes 656 projects 198 counties in the state.

About 61 per cent of the financing included in the program is on U.S. and State-numbered highways, 37 per cent is for FM and RM roads and two per cent is held in reserve.

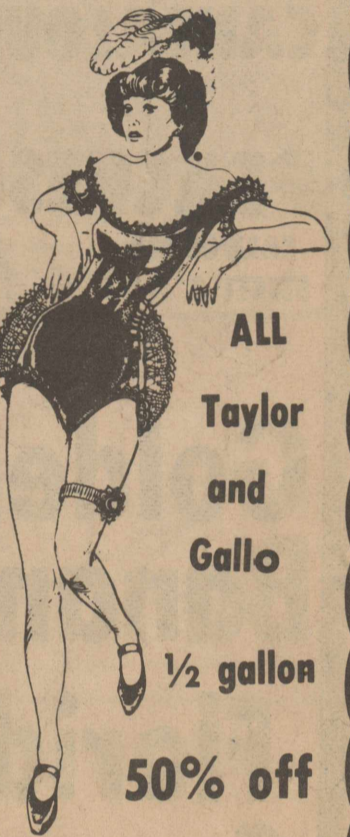
