Elks prepare for opener against Spearman

Sammy Gomez [number 41] eludes a would-be tackle as he makes a major gain in Friday's scrimmage against the Clovis junior team. The Elks face Spearman tomorrow night in the 1983 season opener.



The Stratford Elks finished the final scrimmage before the regular season against the Clovis junior team. The Elks made a strong showing when they racked up three touchdowns to Clovis's two.

The Elks were strong offensively in this pre-season trial. However, they had some trouble defensively.

"We played pretty shabby on defense," Head Coach Jack Needham said. "We just didn't play good defensively. Offensively, we played extremely well. This was just backward from Clarendon. We hope to get both together again."

The Elks out-gained the Clovis team as well as out-scoring them.

"Overall I am pleased with the team. The Clovis team was a large team. This will help us prepare for the teams we're playing against this season. Our offensive linemen have started to come around. Our passing game seems to be gaining."

"Spearman is a big and strong football team. They were extremely large a year ago and they are returning all of the offensive line again and they are bigger. However, their backs are not like last year. Last year they had one who weighed 210-215 and was extremely fast. He was in the top four in the 400 yard dash in their district.

Now both backs weigh 155-165 and

will be a little easier to tackle than the backs last year. Most of them out-weigh us by 40 pounds per man. They are going to try to use power over us. We're going to have to use finesse to overcome their power game."

An experienced, senior-strong offensive team for 1983 could clinch the 1983 district title. In all, the elks have seven defensive starters and five offensive starters returning from last year.

Last year Running backs Sammy Gomez and Albert Olivas and quarterback Kent Holman all were on the all-district team. Guard Brent Holman, tackle Richard Cloyd and end David Naugle were other key players. Also nose-guard Joe Olivas was included in the all district team.

In a pre-season article in the Amarillo Daily News, head coach Jack Needham said, "We're hoping to have a good team. We've got a lot of inexperienced linemen, but all our running backs and our quarterback are back. The kids are capable of coming along."

The Amarillo Daily News sports writer David Stevens cited the Elks as being "a head higher than its competition" and "Stratford is the team to beat".

The Elks return 15 lettermen this year, including their entire offensive backfield, from a -4 team that tied White Deer last year for the district title.

activities are planned on the parking lot of Duncan Chevrolet.

SCS plans major changes

Major changes will take place in the Great Plains Conservation Program effective September 1, announced Bill Sladek, local SCS District Conservator.

For years where the only need was irrigation pipeline and other irrigation practices, these proposed contracts were considered low priority and could not be funded, Sladek reported. "Now these are considered Priority I or high priority," he continued. This simply means that where a land user has a need of water conservation, a contract can be written on his unit. This should open the door for a number of interested individuals. Currently the maximum

allowable for irrigation practices is \$10,000. Plans are under way to try to get this increased; hopefully by Oct. 1 when funds become available the amount will be increased.

Another major change is the increasing of the percent of cost share paid on most practices to 75 percent. This is especially true on most irrigation practices, terraces, diversion terraces and grass seedings. Should you feel you have a need for such a program, contact any of the local SCS Technicians.

It should be pointed out that these changes are only for the counties in the "Targeted Area" of the State which includes most of the Panhandle. Sherman County is included in this area.
