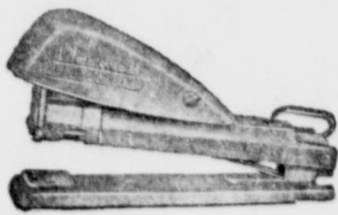

**Recipe of the Week BY MARY LEE TAYLOR**  
**Apricot Upside Down Cake**  
1/4 cup butter or margarine  
1 cup brown sugar  
18 drained apricot halves, canned  
1 1/2 cups sifted cake flour  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/4 cup white sugar  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 unbroken egg  
1/4 cup soft shortening  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1/2 cup Fat Milk  
1/4 cup water  
Melt butter over very low heat in skillet or deep cake pan about 9 in. across the bottom. Sprinkle brown sugar in bottom. Arrange apricot halves on sugar. Let stand while preparing batter. Turn on oven; set at moderately slow (350° F.). Sift flour with baking powder, sugar and salt. Add remaining ingredients all at once. Beat vigorously 2 minutes with spoon or electric beater at medium speed. Pour batter over apricots. Bake about 40 minutes, or until cake shrinks from sides of skillet. Turn out; serve warm.

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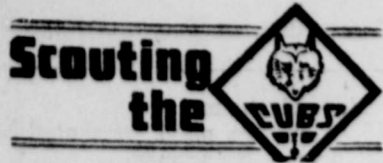
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**HANDICRAFT AND HOBBIES EXHIBITED AT CUB SCOUT PACK 81 MONTHLY MEETING**

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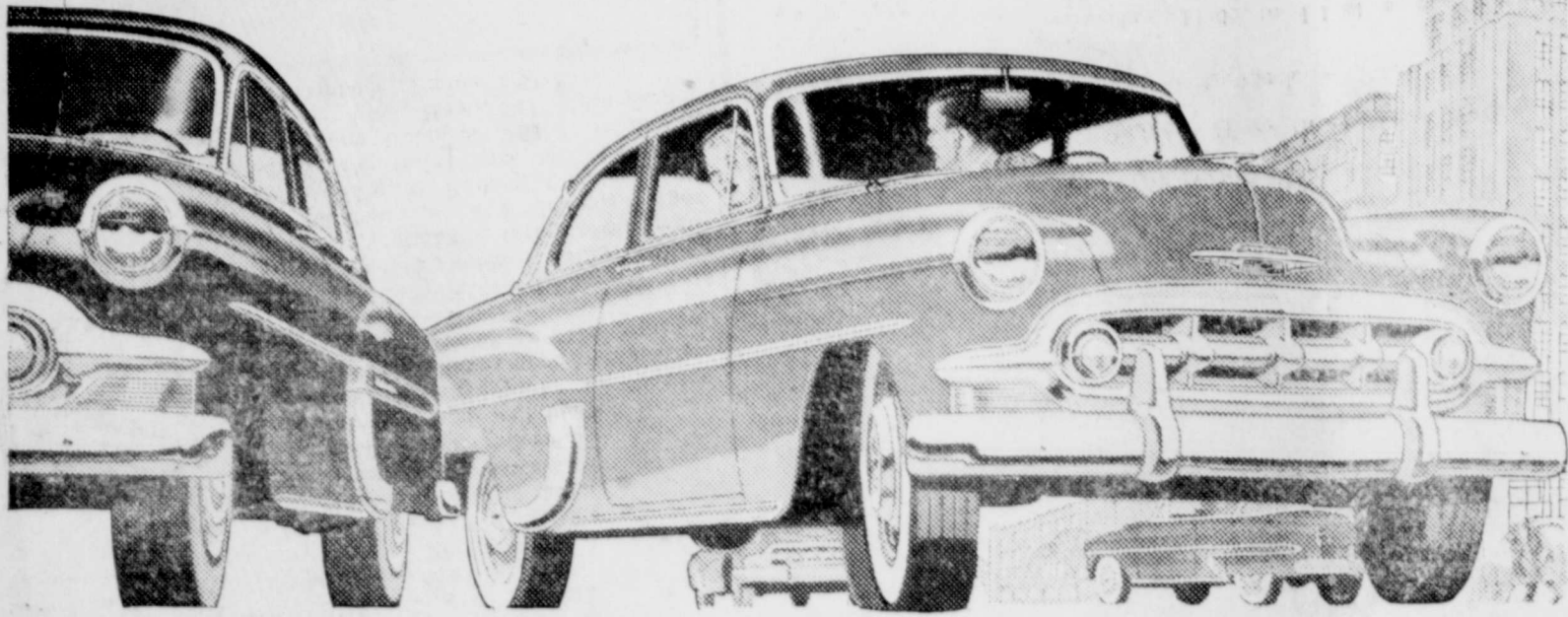

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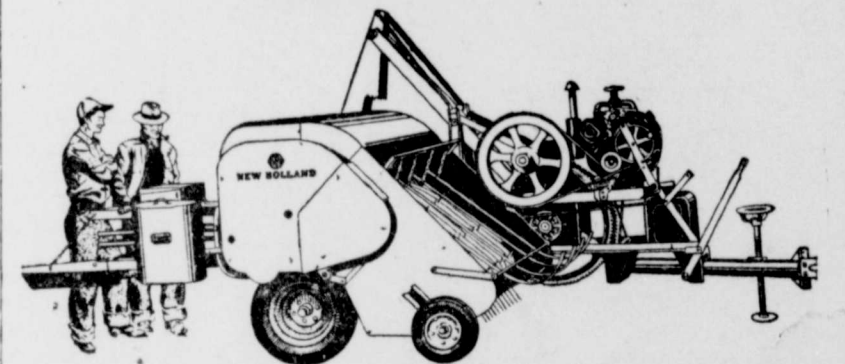
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
