### County Commissioners Grant Tax Waiver To Cross Plains Housing Authority

The Callahan County Commissioner's Court met in regular session in the County Court House in Baird on Monday, June 8, 1998 at 9:30 a.m. During the session the commissioners reviewed and approved the minutes of the previous meeting. They discussed the 1998-99 preliminary budget figures with elected officials. They appointed a Health Insurance

Committee and placed Charles Grider, Diane Alexander, and Bun Barry on the committee. They also considered the set contribution rate and plan option for the retirement system and moved to make no change to the present arrangements. A tax waiver for the City of Cross Plains Housing authority was considered and approved. Discussion then fol-

lowed about the open bids that had been received on the 1985 dump truck needed for Precinct #3. Only one bid had been received and that was from Wes-Tex of Abilene for \$7,200. The bid however had been already rejected by Precinct 3 commissioner, Tommy Holland. After this there was a review of bills and the payment thereof was approved.

### American Cancer Society Promotes Father's Day Campaign Against Cancer

The American Cancer Society is focusing on Father's Day as an opportunity to urge men age 50 and over to learn about prostate cancer and get annual physical examinations. This public awareness campaign focuses on the importance of awareness and informed decision-making, and will coincide with Father's Day, a time when families are focused on the well-being of the men in their lives. The American Cancer Society recommends that health care

providers follow the following early detection guideline: Both Prostate-Specific Antigen (PSA) blood test and Digital Rectal Examination (DRE) of the prostate gland should be offered annually, beginning at age 50 years, to men who have at least a 10 year life expectancy, and to younger men who are at high risk. Information should be provided to patients regarding potential risks and benefits of intervention. "11,900 Texas men will be diagnosed with

prostate cancer this year, and 2500 will die from this disease", stated San Antonio oncologist Greg Guzley, MD, FACP, Chair of the American Cancer Society's Prostate Cancer Committee in Texas. "We must increase our efforts to help people understand how they can take an active role in the fight against prostate cancer. The awareness campaign of the American Cancer Society is designed to provide unbiased information about all aspects of

prostate cancer including early detection and treatment, as well as to support advocacy efforts to increase national funding for prostate cancer research. Information on risk factors, questions you should ask your physician, treatments options, and family support groups, is available 24 hours a day by calling the American Cancer Society at 1-800-ACS-2345, and by going to the American Cancer Society's Texas website at www.acs-tx.org.

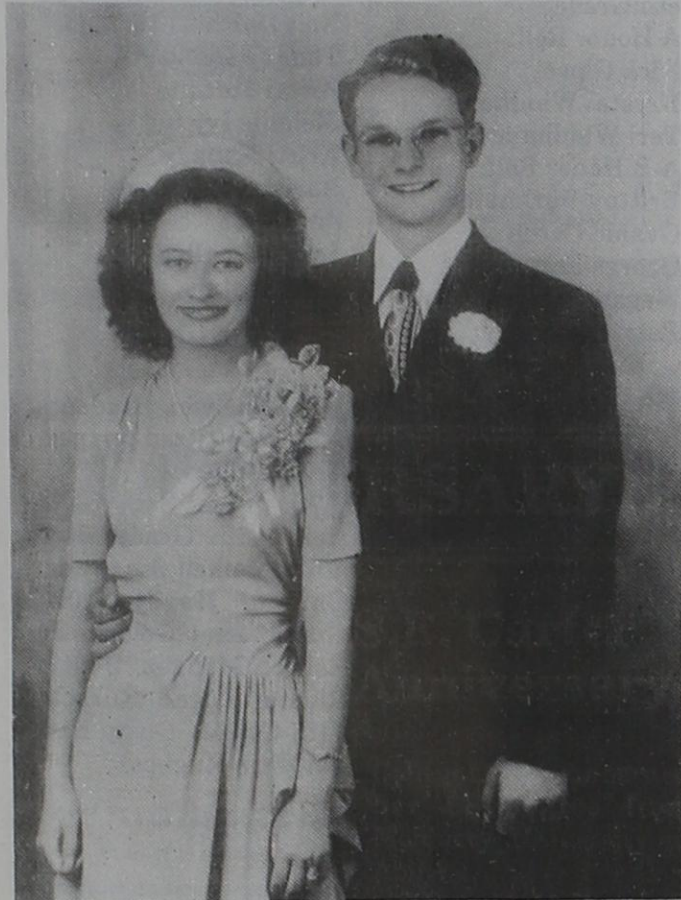

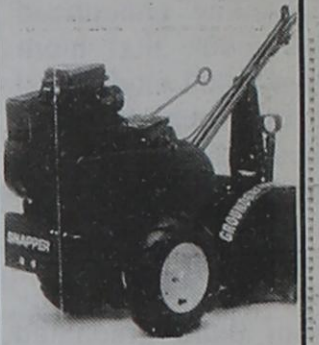

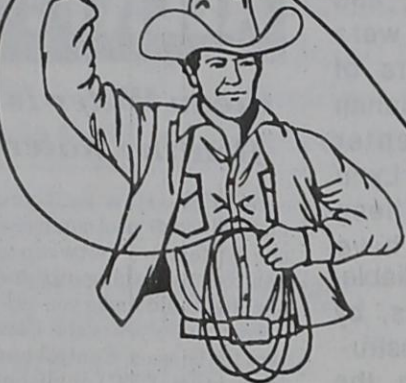

### MISPLACED ROYALTIES

Crude oil prices this year dropped to some of the lowest real-dollar prices since 1986. With profit margins already low, a significant number of Texas' — and America's — oil producers have been unable to withstand continuing depressed prices and have shut down production.

Many of these shut down wells will never be returned to the market, meaning a permanent loss of jobs. This is a real blow to our state's economy.

Such a situation is desperate for producers, but it is equally harmful to America's long-term economic health and national security.

Against this backdrop, an attempt by the Minerals Management Service (an agency of the Interior Department) earlier this month to raise the valuation of royalties on public lands — a virtual tax increase — came at the worst possible time. With prices at historic lows, a royalty increase had the potential to cause even more wells to shut down. This, in turn, could reduce the royalty revenue stream to a trickle. And more jobs could disappear.

What the Minerals Management Service had in mind would have had a drastic effect on the industry and the tens

of thousands of Texas and American families who rely on it for their livelihoods. Congress should make these decisions, rather than an agency that doesn't answer to the people.

So I introduced and passed an amendment to prevent the agency from, in effect, raising taxes on the oil industry.

This amendment's requirements should have come as no surprise to the Minerals Management Service. In the fall of 1997, the Senate Interior Appropriation Subcommittee specifically admonished the agency, and required it to "...continue to consult with industry and the states and report back to the committees prior to finalizing these regulations."

The agency deliberately ignored the subcommittee's directions and was prepared to go ahead with the new royalties regulation despite what Congress had required.

To this day, it has not reported to the relevant committees.

Aside from the constitutional issues raised, the Minerals Management Service unfortunately forgot to ask the critical question: Who would pay the added taxes? Ultimately, American consumers would be forced to absorb them, in higher prices at the gas pump and higher utility bills.

I believe that the best and fairest way to exact royalty payments is the royalty-in-kind system rather than the complicated valuation system we currently use. This would simplify greatly how the government is paid, saving money for both taxpayers and the government. I am a co-sponsor of legislation that would establish the royalty-in-kind system on the federal level. As Texans are well aware, this system has proven a success in our state.

Bottom line is, higher royalty rates make oil and gas wells less productive. When marginal wells shut down, people lose jobs. This country needs a strong oil and gas industry. We're now importing more than half of the energy we consume. I want those energy jobs for America.

### Clean Water Is Healthy Water

(NAPS)—How well you maintain your pool can make the difference between a healthy, refreshing dip, and one that could make you sick. • Look for one that is both an oxidizer and sanitizer. A sanitizer kills bacteria and algae. An oxidizer removes organic contaminants.  
• You want a product that gives the most available chlorine (strength).  
• If the shock product is granular, it should have uniform sized particles to dissolve quickly and evenly.

Three popular products are Sock It®, SUPER SOCK It®, and HTH Super Shock®. They can be broadcast over the surface of your pool while the pump and filter are in operation. Once you've chosen the shock product to use, decide when to use it. Many people prefer the evening. After sundown, the chlorine can do its job without fighting off the sun's ultraviolet rays.

Regular testing of your pool water will alert you to changes in the water chemistry. This will let you know if another shock treatment is needed. Make one evening a week your regular shock night, and be consistent. 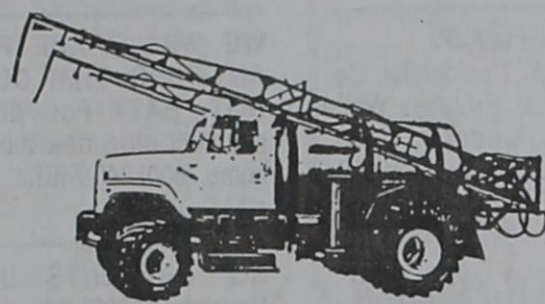

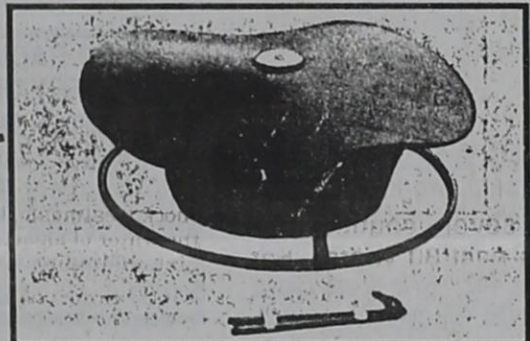

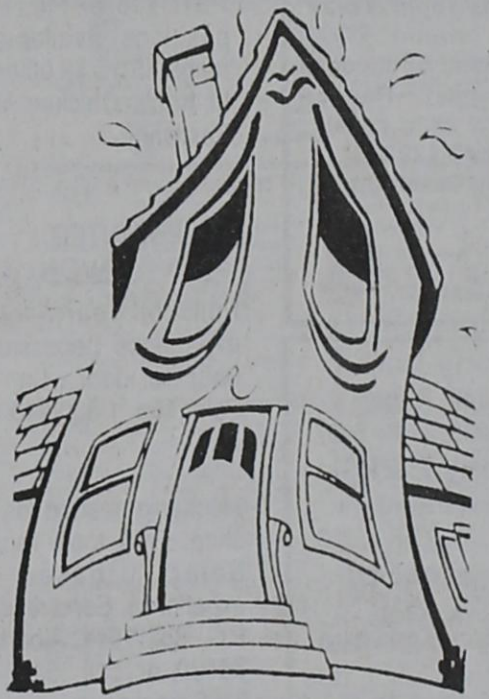

### Cong. Stenholm Votes To Rein In Government Mandates

Washington, D.C.—  
Congressman Charlie  
Stenholm joined a strong,  
bipartisan majority of his  
colleagues to approve a bill  
that would require a report  
on any bill that imposes  
a new federal mandate  
on the private sector  
without providing the  
funds to pay for it, a situation  
referred to as an  
"unfunded mandate." The  
bill, H.R. 3534, was approved  
by the House of  
Representatives by a vote  
of 279-132 on Tuesday  
evening.

"Small businesses are  
the backbone of the economy  
in my District and, in fact,  
across the Country,"  
Stenholm commented. "It  
always has been my practice  
to take the impact on small  
businesses into account when  
legislation is being considered,  
and it is for this reason that  
I was pleased to help in  
passing this bill."

The legislation would  
extend to the private sector  
comparable procedural  
limitations already placed  
on federal mandates on state  
or local governments. H.R.  
3534 would require that  
Congressional committees  
include in their legislative  
reports detailed information  
on potential private sector  
mandates in excess of \$100  
million that would result  
from the legislation. H.R.  
3534 also requires that the  
Committee reports provide  
information on a proposed  
bill's effect on consumer  
prices and the supply of  
goods and services in  
consumer markets, as well  
as on matters relating to  
workers.

"This legislation will not  
put a complete end to  
private sector mandates,  
but it will force Congress  
to honestly examine and  
announce publicly the  
consequences of its actions,"  
Stenholm noted. "Congress  
would fully retain its right  
to pass whatever legislation  
it chooses but we would be  
forced to face the truth  
about the effects of these  
mandates on consumers,  
workers and small businesses."

Organizations such as  
the National Federation of  
Independent Businesses,  
the American Farm Bureau  
Federation, and Citizens for  
a Sound Economy endorsed  
the legislation.

"Reducing the burden  
imposed on small business  
by the federal government  
is one of my highest  
priorities in Congress,"  
Stenholm concluded. "I will  
continue to do whatever I  
can to encourage and  
promote a business climate  
which is conducive to  
maintaining and expanding  
small business opportunities."

The Senate has not yet  
considered the legislation.  
(ED. NOTE: This matter  
should be on the State  
Legislative Agenda).

DEAR DOCTOR  
DONOHUE: I have heard  
that red wine is good for  
someone with high cholesterol.  
Is there any truth to that?

DEAR READER:  
There's truth to the statement  
that red wine raises levels  
of good cholesterol — high-density  
lipoproteins. HDLs, the kind  
of cholesterol that doesn't  
stick to your arteries, can  
prevent heart attacks.

For that matter, all forms  
of alcohol seem to have the  
same protective effect.  
The suggested amount is  
one drink a day for women  
and two for men. A "drink"  
is four ounces of wine, 12  
ounces of beer, or 1.5  
ounces of distilled spirits.  
Those who need or prefer  
to shun alcohol don't have  
to feel they are without a  
life preserver. They can  
take other preventive steps  
to lower their risk of heart  
disease — watching their  
fat and cholesterol intake,  
exercising and maintaining  
normal blood pressure. If  
they smoke, they can quit.

Furthermore, there  
appears to be a protective  
effect from drinking three  
glasses of purple grape  
juice every day. Some as  
yet undiscovered substance  
in grape juice keeps blood

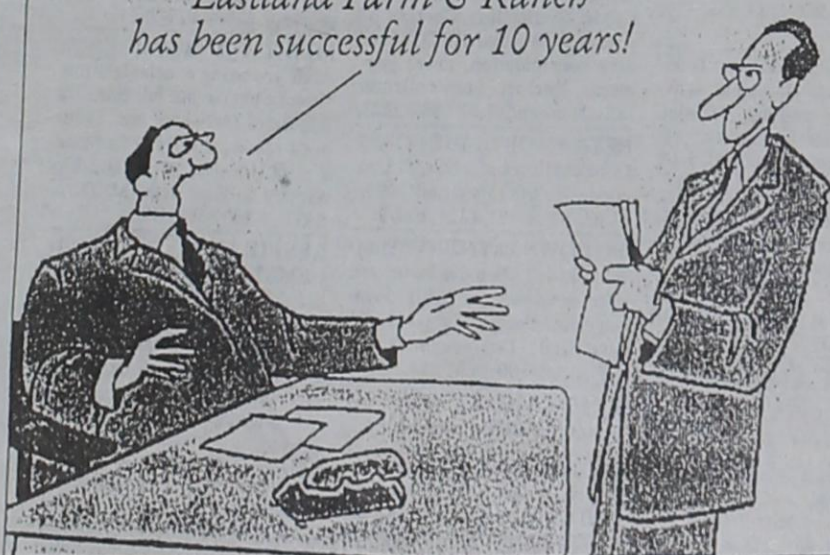

**Violators Will Be Ticketed**  
Buckle up, Texans. If you don't, you're more likely than ever to get a \$25 to \$50 ticket for violating the state seat belt law.

"There's no excuse for Texas drivers not to know about the law and not buckle up, so there's really no need for warnings," Department of Public Safety Director Col. Dudley Thomas said last week.

A 1985 law made it mandatory for drivers and front-seat passengers in all vehicles to wear seat belts, but the DPS recommends that all occupants wear seat belts.

Children under age 2 must ride in safety seats, and children ages 2 through 4 must be secured in safety seats or seat belts.

"Seat belt use is one thing all motorists can do to protect themselves from injuries in the event of a crash," Thomas told *The Dallas Morning News*. "About half the vehicle occupants killed in Texas traffic accidents aren't buckled up. Seat belts could save many of these lives."

DPS spokesman Mike Cox told the *Austin American-Statesman* an estimated 15 percent of Texans buckled up before the mandatory seat belt law came into effect, and current estimates put compliance at 75 percent.

"We're going after that other 25 percent who should be buckling up but still think they are bullet-proof," Cox said.

**More Minority Admissions Offered**

Data released last week by the University of Texas School of Law show the institution has offered admission to nearly twice as many blacks and more Mexican-Americans than last year.

Despite the increase in offers, however, fewer minorities are applying at UT in the wake of the federal court's 1996 Hopwood decision that banned a race-based admissions policy.

And although the number of the law school's offers has increased, those to blacks and Mexican-Americans represent just 6.4 percent of the

1,081 offers made, as of last week.

Gary Bledsoe, president of the Texas NAACP, said UT is making progress, but offers to minorities are far below figures from the mid-1980s.

**Insurance Complaints on Internet**

Beginning June 2, Texas joined the first states in the nation to give the public Internet access to detailed information on complaints against insurance companies and HMOs.

An Internet Complaint System (ICIS) that lists certain individual complaints by company and provides statistical analyses by insurance type and geographic region is available at the Texas Department of Insurance web site, [www.tdi.state.tx.us](http://www.tdi.state.tx.us). ICIS data can be downloaded for further study.

"Most of the information we collect at TDI is open to the public, but access to detailed data can be cumbersome at times," Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer said. "Our decision to provide complaint data routinely over the Internet is one more way to make important information available to more people."

In general, the analyses show claim delays as the reason given most often for filing a complaint.

**Other Capital Highlights**

President Clinton's signing of a waiver to continue China's most-favored nation status increases opportunities for an already burgeoning Texas-China commerce. Texas exports to China include agricultural products, electronics and oil exploration equipment.

Players bought \$6.1 million worth of tickets in the first week of the Texas Lottery's new "Texas Million" game, but four \$1 million winners and other payouts totaled \$6.37 million, resulting in a net loss.

Texas Railroad Commissioner Carole Keeton Rylander, the Republican nominee for state comptroller, last week was voted chairman of the commission by fellow members Barry Williamson and Charles Matthews.

AUSTIN — Seven state legislators continue standing with Gov. George W. Bush in opposing legal fees in Texas' \$15.3 billion tobacco settlement.

Bush and the legislators oppose the \$2.3 billion in legal fees U.S. District Judge David Folsom awarded in the largest settlement in a civil lawsuit in U.S. history.

Last week, the seven told Folsom, who is overseeing the settlement, that Attorney General Dan Morales is wrong in saying the governor refuses to mediate the dispute. They say Bush has even proposed mediators as alternatives to federal appellate judges he rejected on the advice of his general counsel, Margaret Wilson.

"The facts are that the governor has not refused to negotiate or mediate," the lawmakers' Austin lawyer Pete Schenkkan told the judge.

Morales said Bush refused mediation after rejecting two federal appellate judges proposed by Folsom to work out a compromise over attorneys' fees. Morales' spokesman Ward Tisdale said, however, "The governor wanted to pick some of his own people. That simply is not acting in good faith."

But Bush said the judges, who sit on the New Orleans-based 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, cannot mediate because they are on the court that may hear an appeal in the case.

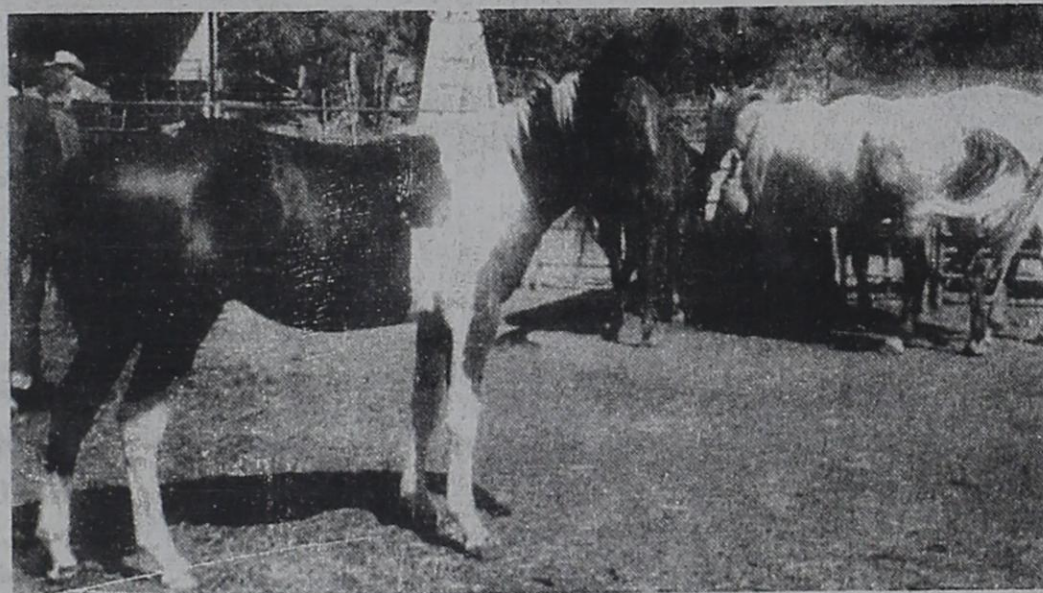
