



Kathy has served her FHA Chapter as Fourth and Third Vice President, and is now serving as an Area officer.



For Homestead **Exemption Filing**

April 30 will be the last day for property owners to rende their property for taxation and apply for a residence homestead exemption for 1967 at the

county tax office. Under provisions of the Texas Constitution, a property owner may claim up to \$3,000 of the valuation for tax purpose of a residence homestead as an exemption from state ad valor em property taxes. The exemption does not apply to county or special water district taxes, according to Russell S. Hardin. county tax assessor-collector. Applies For Year

The rendition for taxation and the application for the homestead exemption must be made each year by the property own er himself. This applies to persons who

pay their taxes as part of their monthly payments to a loan agency or bank on a mortgage as well as to persons whose property is clear of debt. "Banks or loan agencies can

pay the taxes on a piece of property on which they hold a mortgage and add the taxes to the monthly payments, but they cannot render the property for taxation or make an application for a homestead exemption Only the owner can do that. Hardin said. Hardin also pointed out that,

If the state maintains its present property tax rate of 47 cents on each \$100 of valuation for 1967, a property owner, by applying for the homestead exemption, can save up to \$14.10 in state taxes on the \$3,000 exemption





Safety Rules

TO KNOW WHAT TO DO WHEN A TORNADO IS APPROACHING MAY MEAN THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN LIFE AND DEATH!

If you are near a tornado cellar:

When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave or underground excavation which should have an air outlet to help equalize the air pressure. It should be kept fit for use, free from water, gas or debris; and preferably equipped with pick and shovel. THERE IS NO UNIVERSAL PROTECTION AGAINST TORNADOES EXCEPT UNDERGROUND EXCAVATIONS.

. If you are in open country:

- 1. Move at right angles to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually move ahead at about 25 to 40 miles per hour.
- 2. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.

111 If in a city or town.

- 1. Seek inside shelter, preferably in a strongly reinforced building. STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS!
- 2. In homes: The corner of the basement toward the tornado usually offers greatest safety, particularly in frame houses. People in houses without basements can sometimes be protected by taking cover under heavy furniture against inside walls. Doors and windows on the sides of the house away from the tornado may be opened to help reduce damage to the building.
- 3. Standing against the inside wall on a lower floor of an office building offers some protection.

IV If in schools:

- 1. In city areas: If school building is of strongly reinforced construction, stay inside, away from windows, remain near an inside wall on the lower floors when possible. AVOID AUDITORIUMS AND GYM-NASIUMS with large, poorly-supported roofs!
- 2. In rural schools that do not have strongly reinforced construction, remove children and teachers to a ravine or difch if storm shelter is not available

V If in factories and industrial plants:

On receiving a tornado warning, a lookout should be posted to keep safety officials advised of the tornado's approach. Advance preparation should be made for moving workers to sections of the plant offering the greatest protection.

- VI Keep calm. It will not help to get excited. People have been killed by running out into streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado. Even though a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slight. Tornadoes cover such a small zone, as a rule, that relatively only a few places in a warned area are directly affected. You should know about tornadoes though, "just in case."
- Keep tuned to your radio or television station for latest tornado advisory information. Do not call the VII Weather Bureau, except to report a tornado, as your individual request may tieup telephone lines urgently needed to receive special reports or to relay advisories to radio and television stations for dissemination to thousands in the critical area.



UKNADU Safety Rules

TO KNOW WHAT TO DO WHEN A TORNADO IS APPROACHING MAY MEAN THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN LIFE AND DEATH!

If you are near a tornado cellar:

When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave or underground excavation which should have an air outlet to help equalize the air pressure. It should be kept fit for use, free from water, gas or debris; and preferably equipped with pick and shovel. THERE IS NO UNIVERSAL PROTECTION AGAINST TORNADOES EXCEPT UNDERGROUND EXCAVATIONS.

. If you are in open country:

- 1. Move at right angles to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually move ahead at about 25 to 40 miles per hour.
- 2. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.

111 If in a city or town.

- 1. Seek inside shelter, preferably in a strongly reinforced building. STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS!
- 2. In homes: The corner of the basement toward the tornado usually offers greatest safety, particularly in frame houses. People in houses without basements can sometimes be protected by taking cover under heavy furniture against inside walls. Doors and windows on the sides of the house away from the tornado may be opened to help reduce damage to the building.
- 3. Standing against the inside wall on a lower floor of an office building offers some protection.

IV If in schools:

- 1. In city areas: If school building is of strongly reinforced construction, stay inside, away from windows, remain near an inside wall on the lower floors when possible. AVOID AUDITORIUMS AND GYM-NASIUMS with large, poorly-supported roofs!
- 2. In rural schools that do not have strongly reinforced construction, remove children and teachers to a ravine or difch if storm shelter is not available.

V If in factories and industrial plants:

On receiving a tornado warning, a lookout should be posted to keep safety officials advised of the tornado's approach. Advance preparation should be made for moving workers to sections of the plant offering the greatest protection.

- VI Keep calm. It will not help to get excited. People have been killed by running out into streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado. Even though a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slight. Tornadoes cover such a small zone, as a rule, that relatively only a few places in a warned area are directly affected. You should know about tornadoes though, "just in case."
- VII Keep tuned to your radio or television station for latest tornado advisory information. Do not call the Weather Bureau, except to report a tornado, as your individual request may tieup telephone lines urgently needed to receive special reports or to relay advisories to radio and television stations for dissemination to thousands in the critical area.
