Commendation Medals Presented



COL. JOHN B. PARKER of Louisiana Tech's Air Force Reserved officers Training Corps is presenting S. Sgt. Carlton W. Clayton of Memphis, Tex., an Air Force Commendation Medal. Sgt. Clayton distinguished himself by meritorious service as an Administrative Supervisor, Special Intelligence Communications Automatic Relay Center at Fuchu Air Station, Japan, from Nov. 13, 1968 to May 1, 1972. According to the citation, Sgt. Clayton's outstanding professional skill, knowledge, and leadership aided in providing superior administrative support for one of the largest special intelligence communications activities in the Far East.

SSGT. CLAYTON JOINS DETACHMENT

Sergeant Clayton, the new Cadet Administrative Supervisor, was born and reared in Plains of West Texas. He entered the AF in November 1955. After completion of basic training at Lackland AFB, Texas, he was sent to Chanute AFB, Illinois, as a postal clerk. After 14 months at Chanute, he was transferred to Amarillo AF Base, Texas, and remained there until discharged from the AF, August 1959. Sergeant Clayton worked for Martin Missile in Denver, Colorado, until he returned to the AF in February of 1961. He was then sent to Athens, Greece, and he served 22 months and then was transferred to Iraklion Air Station, serving 8 months before transferring to Forbes AFB in Topeka, Kansas (was married 8 February 1963 while on leave). After 16 months at Forbes, he left for Viet Nam for one year. Upon returning from V.N., he was stationed at Ent AFB, Colorado, 11 months and Kincheloe AFB, Michigan, 18 months. In July of 1968 he left for Japan where he served as Administrative Supervisor for a special intelligence communications center until June 3, 1972. Shirley Milton (Clayton is a son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Johnson of Abernathy.)
