Abernathy Historical Markers Dedicated

ABERNATHY — "This is a momentous day in our history. I count it an honor to pay tribute to those who have given so much to this city," said Judge Henry Heck of Plainview in dedicating historical markers in Abernathy, one on the site of the Struve family business and one commemorating the founding of the town.

The markers were dedicated in a ceremony in Abernathy City Hall Sunday afternoon with Mrs. Orville Toler, granddaughter of Fritz W. Struve who founded the Struve business in 1912, presiding at the event.

Judge Heck said it would not be easy to separate the history of Abernathy from the story of the Struve family. "As we speak of Fritz Struve, the first mayor of Abernathy, we also include those who stood with him and shared the hardships of that day," Judge Heck stated.

He briefly outlined the town's history from the time Col. Mackenzie drove away the last of the Indian tribes from the area, to be followed by the buffalo hunters and then the settlers, with Horatio Graves, the first settler in Hale County, up to the birth of Abernathy in 1909.

"The Struve family lives on maintaining the Struve tradition," the speaker concluded, saying that the future offers a continuing challenge to a city with a priceless heritage.

Accepts Marker

Rudolph Struve, son of the Struve Store founder, accepted the marker on behalf of the family. Mrs. Toler recognized Mrs. Fritz Struve, 96, widow of the founder.

Glenn Metcalf, city manager, accepted the Abernathy marker for the City of Abernathy.

Mrs. Toler introduced Mrs. J. W. Walker of Plainview, president of Hale County Historical survey committee and Hale County Historical Society, who discussed briefly the functions of the historical groups which sponsored the marking of the two Abernathy sites.

The 18 by 28 inch official Texas Historical Marker placed on the Struve building, 318 Main Street, reads: Fritz W. Struve (1877-1959) came here from Burnet County in 1912, 3 years after city was founded, started a grocery store; was joined by Brother Ben F. (1879-1947) in 1918. Family operated wide variety of businesses vital to the early economic success of the community: grocery (1912-1962), hardware (1913-), implements (1913-), dry goods (1918-), tin shop (1923-), cheese factory (1929-1951). The cheese enterprise was unique to this region, producing an average of 1,800 pounds per day.

Fritz W. Struve was elected as first mayor in 1924, serving

Judy Speer Earns Scholarship At W. T. State U.

CANYON, Tex. -- West Texas State University graduate student Judy Speer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Brooks Speer of New Deal, is one of ten recipients of the L. F. Sheffy Scholarship in history.

The scholarships, in the amount of \$250 each, are named for Prof. L. F. Sheffy, head of the WTSU history department from 1918 until he retired in 1957. He died five years ago.

In his will, Sheffy left the history department \$50,000 with interest from its investment to go for scholarships and history materials for the university library. The scholarship program was initiated last spring.

The scholarships are awarded to history majors of at least junior standing on the basis of past scholastic achievement and recommendations by members of the history faculty, said Dr. Duane Guy, chairman of the history department.

The following is written on the marker to the City, placed in front of the modern City Hall: Town of Abernathy: Founded when Santa Fe Railroad was extended from Plainview to Lubbock, 1909, named for Monroe G. Abernathy (1888-1962), treasurer of South Plains Investment Co. firm which promoted the townsite. Community prospered becoming a major railroad for shipping of cattle. Several buildings from the defunct town of Bartonite were moved here and new ones built. Center of civic activities was the old tabernacle (1918-1947) located on the city square in the early days before roads were built. Broad plowed furrows marked the way to house of town doctor. Economy is agriculture based.

Larry Florence, a 1962 Abernathy High School graduate, has been appointed a research assistant at Stephen F. Austin University, Nacogdoches, Texas, beginning with this spring semester. He will be completing his graduate work on a Master's Degree in the School of Forestry. Other honors he has been given this past semester are to be elected president of the Student Council in the School of Forestry, and to be appointed student representative to the Faculty Club. He has also made the Dean's Honor List each semester.

COMPLETE WORK FOR DEGREES FROM TECH

LUBBOCK -- A total of 986 students in the six colleges and the Graduate School at Texas Tech University completed work for degrees at the conclusion of the fall semester.

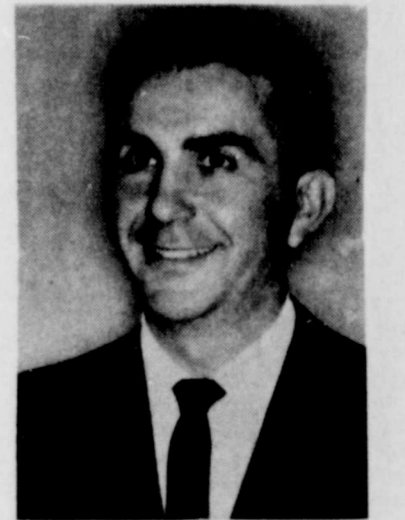
Of that total, 174 were graduate students, 25 qualifying for doctorates and 149 for masters degrees.

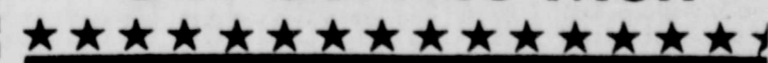

Another area of concern is in the parking of vehicles in the red zones (red curbs). Vehicles are not to be parked in these areas.

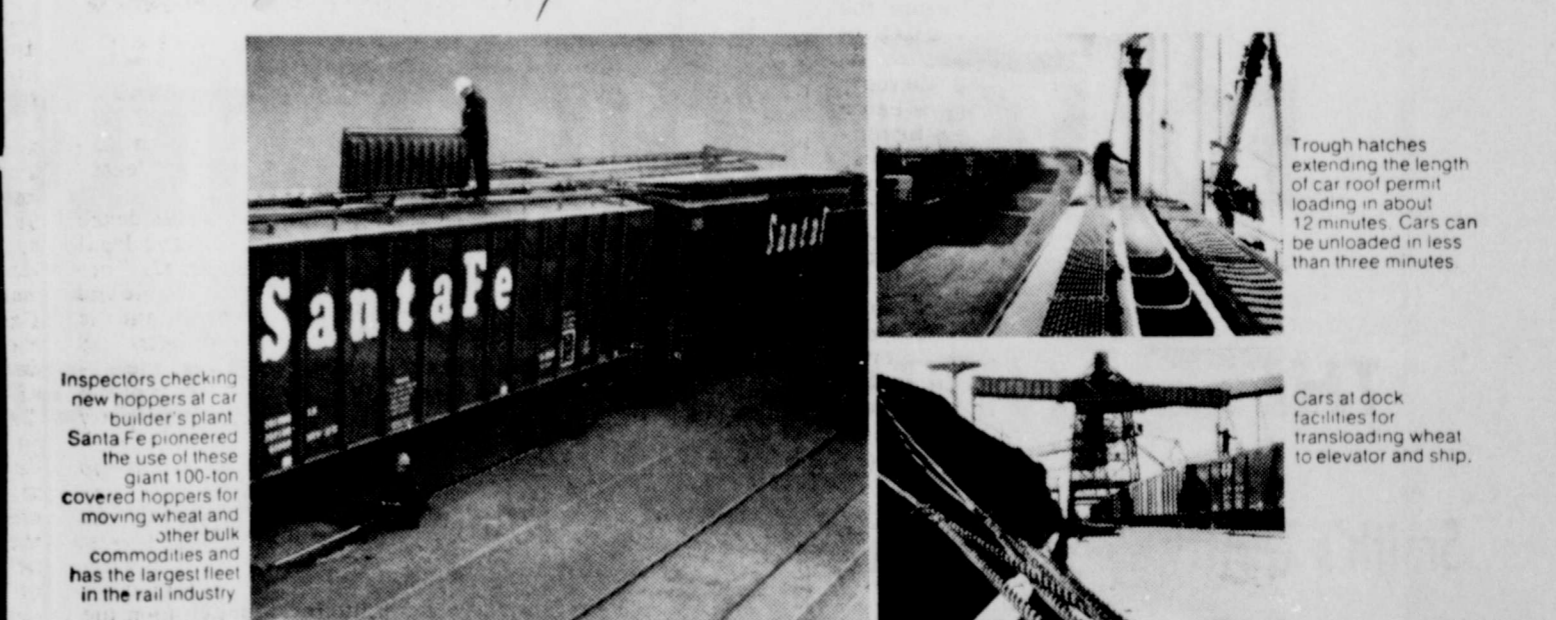
Safety is everyone's responsibility. We must ask for your cooperation in these matters. City patrolmen have been advised to see that double parking and parking in red zone are

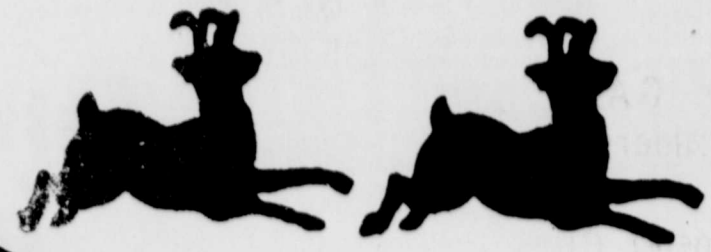
eliminated. With your cooperation we can eliminate these violations without problems. WITHOUT your cooperation we will be forced to issue citations to those found in violation.

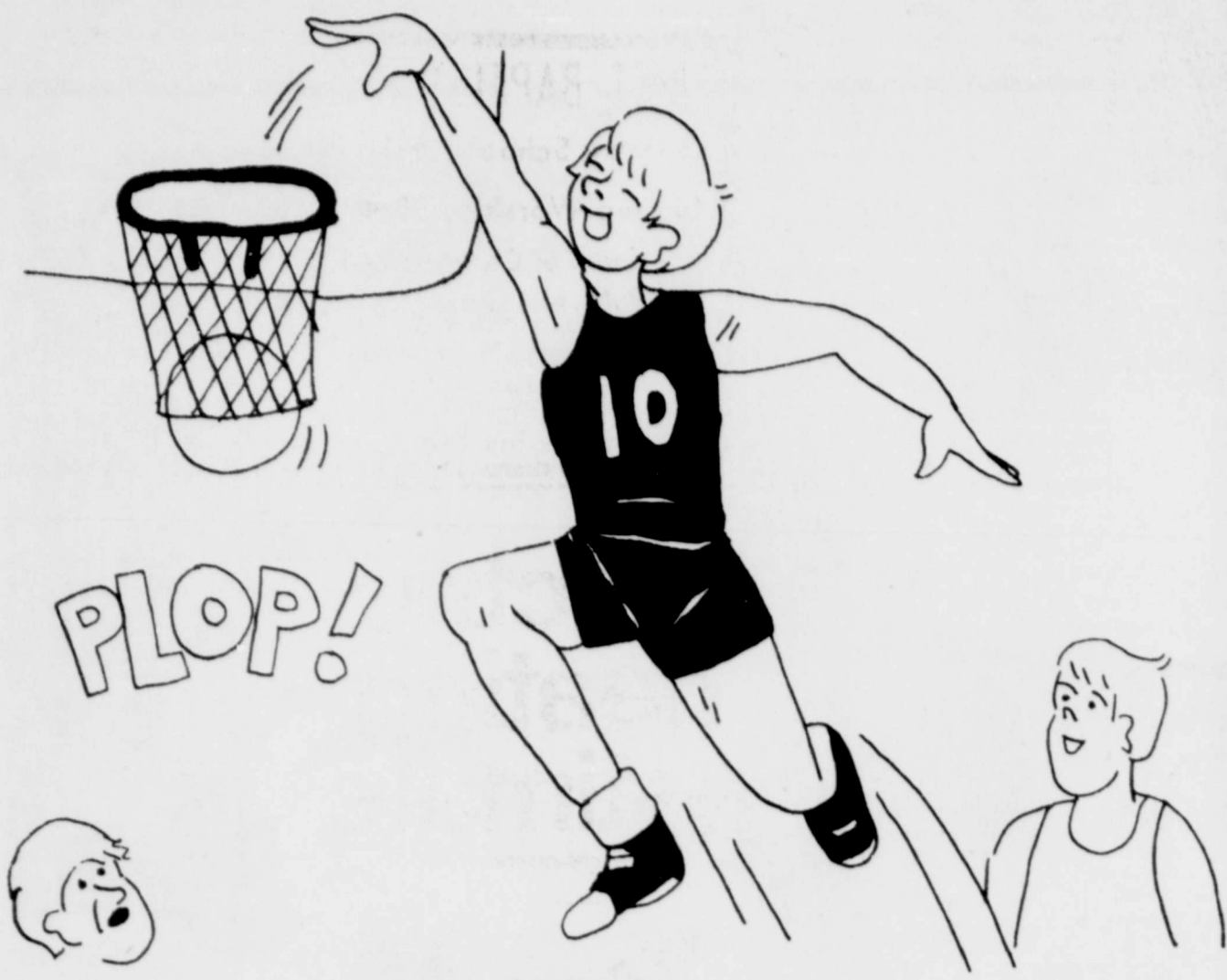

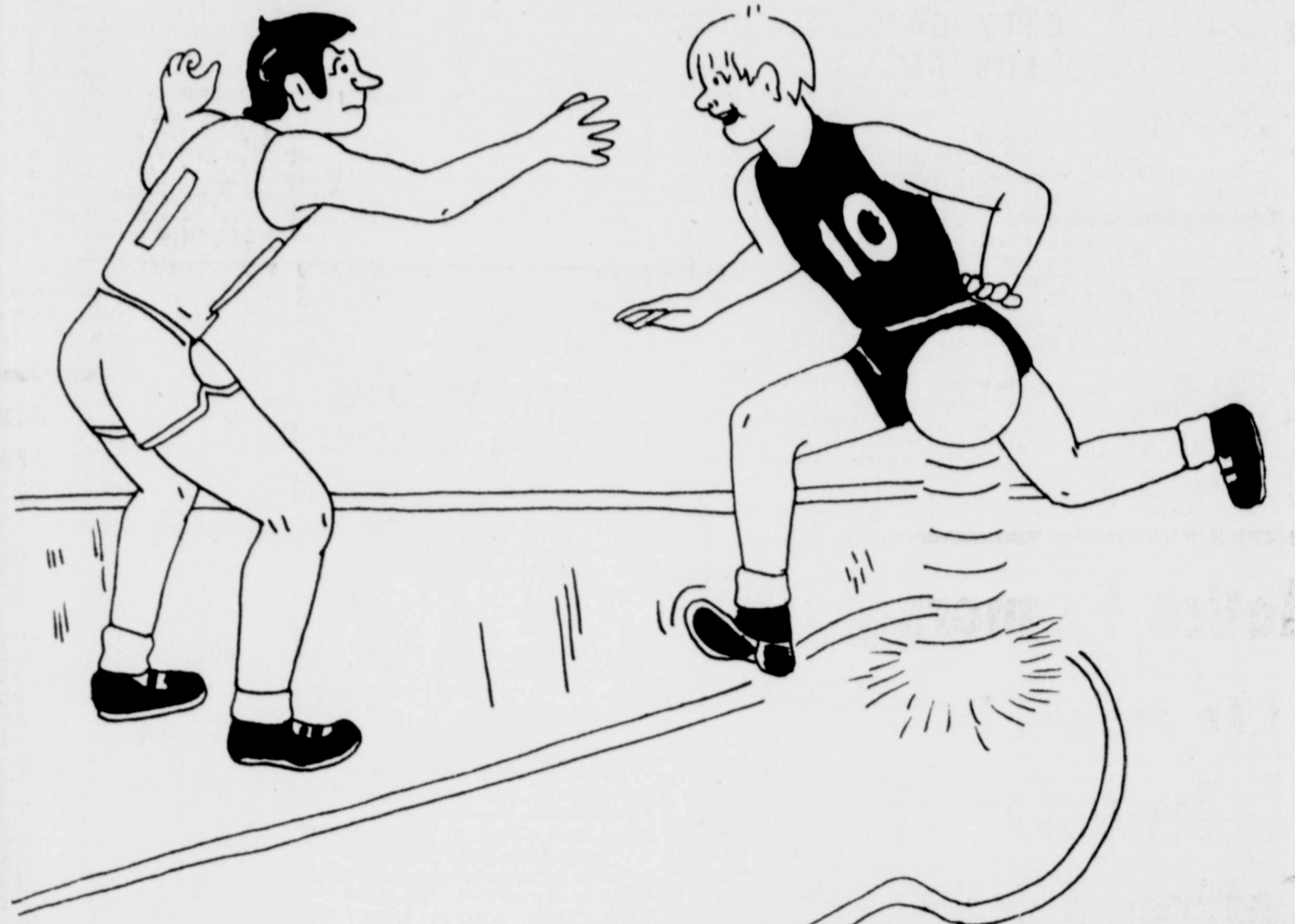

FUEL SHORTAGE RELIEF SOUGHT

AUSTIN—Greater oil and gas production to pare down Texas energy shortages is the aim of companion bills introduced in the Texas Legislature this week.

The measures would liberalize unitization requirements for oil and gas fields so as to increase production of oil and gas reserves, according to sponsors of the legislation, Sen. Jack Hightower of Vernon and Rep. Dave Finney of Ft. Worth.

They said the legislation would help accomplish one of Gov. Dolph Briscoe's goals: To get the maximum recovery from reserves as one of the means to solve the energy shortage.

A major obstacle, aside from technological aspects, preventing the tapping of part of the 98 billion barrels of Texas oil reserves has been an obsolete oil-gas unitization law that requires 100 per cent agreement from operators and royalty owners in a field to unitize, the lawmakers said. The requirement has been so restrictive that only one of every 10 Texas fields now operates as a unit.

Under terms of the Hightower-Finney proposal, a consent majority of 75 per cent of all interests would be required.

It is believed that several billion more barrels of fuel can be recovered by removing restrictions, the legislators said.

Both legislators warned that their proposal was not a cure-all for energy shortages, but would be a step toward greater energy supplies.

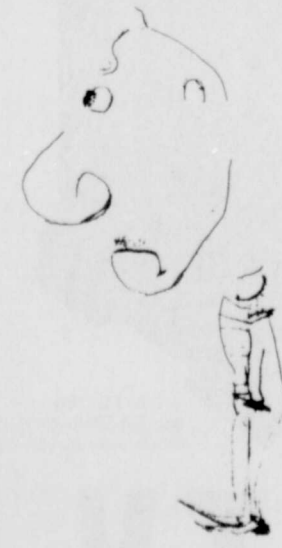
More than \$13 billion is invested in land and equipment to grow cotton.
