PLAINVIEW (Special) - The office of Hale County school superintendent was abolished at a meeting here Friday morning with the resignation of Dr. Louis McGregor who had served in the

office since Jan. 1, 1971. McGregor, in campaigning for the office in 1970, told the voters he was running for the office expressly to make it possible to abolish it. Under state law the office could not be abolished while there was an incumbent.



Former 119th Judge Parish's Rites

BALLINGER (SC) -- Judge O. L. Parish, 87, who served as judge of 119th District from the time it was organized on Aug. 22, 1931 until he retired in 1964, died about 10 a.m. Thursday in Ballinger Memorial Hospital.

Services will be held at 2:30 p.m. today in First Baptist Church with burial in Evergreen Cemetery directed by Allen Davis Funeral Home.

He was born Sept. 30, 1885 in Denton and moved to Mills County and attended schools there. He moved to Runnels County in 1904 with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Parish. He was elected as Runnels County clerk in 1910 and moved to Ballinger that year.

He served as clerk six years and was elected Runnels County judge in 1916. He served as judge in the county until 1921 when he resigned to open his own law firm. He was elected as a state representative in 1924 and served two terms.

Judge Parish had also served on Ballinger City commission. When 119th Judicial District was

organized in 1931, he was appointed by the state legislature as judge. His district included Runnels, Toni Green, Coke and Coleman counties. He held this office for eight terms, being reelected each time without having had an opponent.

He was appointed presiding judge of the Seventh Administrative Judicial District in 1949 and served until he retired in 1964.

He was married to Esther Lillie Murphy Oct. 20, 1909 in Norton. Judge Parish was active in First Baptist Church and served on its board of deacons many years. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge and received his 50-year membership pin ja March 1964. He was also a charter member of the Rotary Club in Ballinger and only two other charter members survive him, E. E. King and Sam Behr-

Judge Parish often told the story of how he came by his knowledge of law. He was a selfeducated attorney, having studied at home after the working day ended. He too!: the bar examination and was elected to. membership in 1916. He became one of the most respected judges in West Texas, known always for his wise decisions. He often spoke of difficult decisions that caused him great concern. He was presiding judge through some of the most notorious cases ever to be tried in West Texas

Survivors include his wife: two sons, O. L. Parish Jr. of Ballinger and Bill Parish of Sar Antonio; three daughters, Mrs. Esther Gillean of Stamford, Mrs. Margaret Sprayberry of O'Donnell and Mrs. Charlene Christian of Denton; a sister, Mrs. A. B. Forbus of Abernathy; a half-brother, Ollie Parish of Abilene; two halfsisters, Mrs. Vera Curry of Abilene and Mrs. Lela Standard Norman, Okla.; 11 grandchildren and nine greatgrandchildren.







The 4-H Foods and Nutrition project is an educational and interesting one, for both boys available include "Exploring Foods the Picnic Way," "4-H Food and Fun," "Outdoor-Indoor Meals," and the "Wonder of Food." These projects start very simply for the younger 4-H'ers and get progressively more detailed for the older 4-H'ers. After a 4-H'er has completed these four projects, he may go into self-determined projects, which may be any area he wants to pursue concerning Foods & Nutrition. There are also several national Foods and Nutrition projects available, including 'Tricks for Treats." All American Foods," and. 'Meals For Today the Easy

Each Food and Nutrition project is divided into six parts. which can be spread over six or more meetings as the leader decides. These six parts include the Milk group, Meat group, Fruit and Vegetable group, Bread and Cereal group, a meal which the 4-H'ers prepare together, and a sharing part, where the members share what they have learned with each other. The project leaders use various ways to teach the members about food and nutrition, including demonstrations, discussions, tours, films, preparation of foods, food science, written assignments, and various repersons. County Extension Home Economics Agents train the leaders and serve as resource persons while the

Also included as a possible part of a Foods and Nutrition project is the Foods and Nutrition 'Let's Speak Out" method demonstration. 4-H'ers comcounty, district, and state 4-H Roundup. "Let's Speak Out" demonstration may be in any or an illustrated talk. 





New processing techniques hold the potential for expanding the use of "discount" cottons, according to the National Cotton Council.

Intensive research by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Southern Division at New Orleans, in house and under contract with the Texas Research Center, Lub bock, has developed methods of blending, processing, and producing textile products

from these cottons.
The USDA points out that this has increased the demand for these lower quality cottons. As a result, the farmer benefits from receiving a higher price, and the textile industry and con-sumer get lower cost prod-

According to the USDA, 25 per cent of the cotton crop falls into the category of "discount" cotton. This is cot-ton sold at reduced prices because it is too fine fibered,
