CITY CHANGES

A group of local businessmen met with the members of the city council to discuss the possibility of placing an alarm system in the city hall which would provide additional protection for the downtown area. The reason for the discussion is the result of recent attempted break-ins of several local businesses. No definite plan or type of alarm system was decided on at this time. The city council requested that the local businesses investigate the possible types of alarm systems available and meet with the council at a later date for possible selection of an alarm

system.

The city council approved and adopted a revised Street. Alley and/or Other Improvements Policy for the City of Abernathy. The revised policy has basically two major changes from the original policy used by the City: (1) Lowers the percent of voluntary participation of property owners petition from 100 percent 66-2/3 percent; in other words, under the original policy all of the property owners fronting on a particular street would have to voluntarily petition for such improvements and place the necessary monies in an escrow fund with the city before such improvements could be completed. The new revised policy provides for a lower percent (66-2/3) property owner participation re-

quirements for street improvements. For instance -if there were six property owners fronting on a particular block under consideration for paving, four of the six would have to voluntarily petition for the street to be paved and also place the necessary monies for such improvements into an escrow fund before the letting of bids for the paving program of that particular year. (2) The second major

change of the revised policy is the establishment of an assessment program for the remaining one-third (1/3), or less, of the property owners not voluntarily petitioning for such improvements. Such an assessment program will be executed by the paving contractor under the policy set forth by the City of Abernathy.
