Blue Ribbon Animals Ready For Stock Show

MARCH 5-6

The Abernathy Stock Show Association has set the dates for the local FFA-4-H Project Show as March 5 and 6 at Service Grain Company's south barn. Officials for the 1973 show are as follows:

General Superintendent, Harvey Lutrick; Assistant General Supt., Lewis Lutrick; Sec.-Treas., Joe Oswald; Beef Supt., Don McKenzie; Swine Supt., Gwin Myatt; Sheep Supt., Lynn Shadden; Barn Supt., Jerry Oswald; Finance Chairman, Larry Griffin; Publicity Chairman, Curtis Dav- enport; Trophies Chairman, Leland Phillips.

Weighting in will begin at 2:00 p. m. March 5 and continue until 7:00 p. m. Judging will begin at 2:00 p. m. March 6.

Weight limits are as follows: Steers--750 to 1150 lbs., Swine--180 to 240 lbs. (with 10 lb. tolerance), Lambs--75 to 120 lbs. (with 5 lbs. tolerance. Swine exhibitors will be limited to four barrows and five gilts, with no limits on steers and lambs.

Trophies will be furnished by the Chamber of Commerce and be given to Grand and Reserve Champion Steers, Barrows and Gilts, Breed Champion and Reserve Breed Champion Lambs will receive trophies also. Rosettes will go to Breed Champions and Reserve Breed Champions in the steer, barrow, and gilt divisions. Ribbons will be given to the top ten animals in each class.

Prize money will go to the top three exhibitors in each division. The following amounts were approved: Steers--\$15, \$10, \$5 Barrows--\$5, \$3, \$2 Lambs--\$5, \$3, \$2 Gilts--\$5, \$3, \$2

The Chris Benn Award will again be presented by the Abernathy Lions Club to the outstanding overall showman. Showmanship awards will be presented in each of the steer, swine, and sheep division.

Approximately 140 swine, 25 steers, and 80 lambs are expected to be entered by local 4-H Club and FFA young- sters.

A judge for the show has been selected by Hale Co. agent, Ollie Linger, and Vo. Ag. teachers, Jerry Adams and Walter Cox. He is Mac Heald, Farmer Co., Ext. Agent.

REVIVAL is to be experienced here during the week of March 4 as the Ed Robb Evangelistic team leads in services at the First United Methodist Church. Services are scheduled to begin Sunday morning, March 4, and continue through Thursday evening, March 8.

Following the Sunday night service, a time of fellowship will be enjoyed in Fellowship Hall.

Monday through Thursday, Breakfast Devotionals will be conducted starting at 7:00 o'clock. This will be followed at 10:30 each morning with a Bible Study. The weekday evening services will be held at 7:30.

Ed Robb, who met his Lord as a young sailor, will be preaching and teaching, and the noted singer and minister Gene Moore will be leading and witnessing with music.

Sunday night, March 4, will be Youth Night, with all area youth invited and urged to attend. From a sailor's conversion in 1946 at Glide Memorial Methodist Church in San Francisco, the story of Ed Robb and his service to the Lord has been one of great excitement and success. Since that time churches in the Northwest Texas conference increased in membership and grew physically. Under his dynamic leadership St. Paul Church in Midland received 830 persons into the church in four years.

It was in 1966 that Mr. Robb was appointed as a conference evangelist and stepped out in faith to bring the message of salvation to an estranged space age world.

Gene and Bobbie Moore are well known in this area for their musical and singing abilities. Bobbie plans to accompany her husband to Abernathy but may not participate in the revival activities as they recently became parents of a new addition to the family.

The Moores have witnessed with music to thousands upon thousands of people. It is their conviction that Christianity is just as relevant today as it was two thousand years ago.

The Moores make up the singing team for the Ed Robb Evangelistic Association and travel constantly with Mr. Robb. They have been around the world with him and have participated in the many city-wide and area crusades. The Moores had been in full-time evangelism for several years when they joined the Ed Robb team.

They have been in charge of the music for United Christian Ashrams, the South Central Jurisdictional Conference on Evangelism, and the National Committee of the Twelve. They have four record albums, and no doubt will have others. Gene is an accomplished songwriter and has had several songs purchased for publication.

The Moores feel that they don't have to be old fashioned to be Christians. The songs they sing are loved and appreciated by people of all ages.

Perhaps the Moores sum up their own witness when they say, "Through our music and the songs we have written, we are trying to tell the message

of what God has done for us." The couple is also funding a lectureship series. The Timothy Moore Memorial Lectures on the Holy Spirit are in memory of the Moore's deceased son.

In preparation for the revival, Cottage Prayer Groups are being formed; and a 24-hour prayer vigil will be conducted just prior to the beginning of the revival.

During the revival, at least two after-glow gatherings are being planned. Church Pastor Conrad Ryan and Methodist congregation extend a cordial invitation to the general public to attend.

Holdover aldermen are J. L. Miller, Jr., Billy Shipman and Morris Stevens.

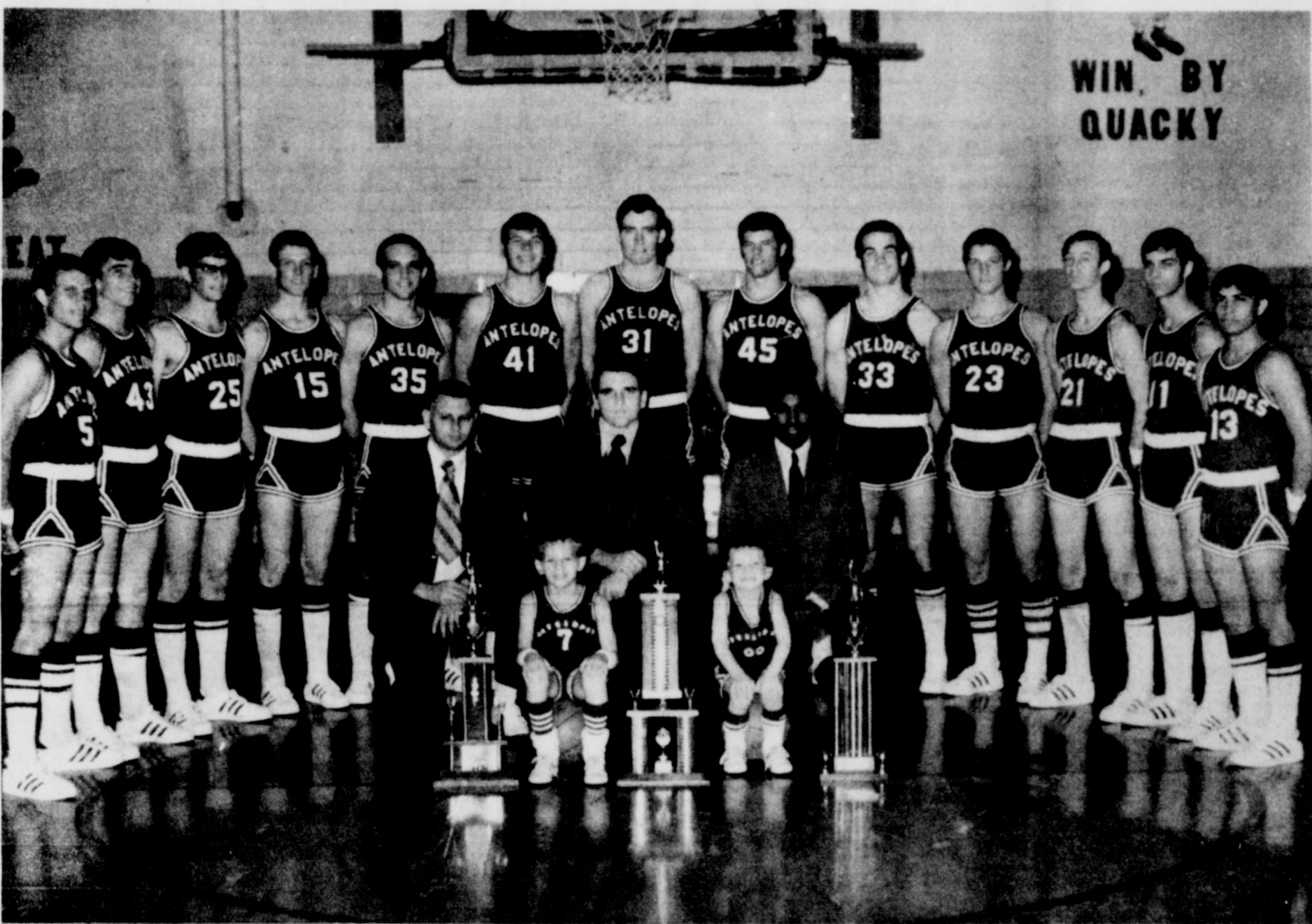

Each year after the basketball season has ended, a group of coaches and sports writers get together to choose the All-District and All-South Plains teams. The usual procedure is to pick at least one and sometimes two players from each team in their particular district. The same is done for the All-South Plains team. The players chosen are the best in the league and were consistent players for their respective teams.

Abernathy broke all precedence in the selection for the two honor teams.

The Antelopes placed six players on the All-District squad, Dick Rogers, Joe Evans, Kent Snodgrass and Ray Martin were on the first team, while Randy Settle and Larry Lutrick were honorable mention selections.

The All-South Plains AA team was no different. Dick Rogers and Ray Martin made the first team, while Joe Evans, Randy Settle and Kent Snodgrass were honorable mention.

COACH AND PLAYER OF THE YEAR Abernathy not only dominated the two honor teams for the 1972-73 season, but they also produced the Coach and Player of the Year.

Taking the Antelopes to an undefeated regular season and a total of 29 wins and a single loss, Carl Irlbeck was voted the area's number one coach. Carl has compiled a fantastic 228-60 record in his coaching career and brought the basketball fever back to Abernathy. He not only gave this town a

winner, but he established pride and a winning attitude that will be seen for years to come.

Dick Rogers, a quiet young man in many respects, was voted the Player of the Year in Class AA basketball. Dick used his 6'7" frame to hit an almost unbelievable 72 percent of his field goals for the year. He averaged 16 rebounds a game and was a constant threat to all shooters who came close to the basket. Dick was the leading scorer for the Antelopes with a 19.1 per game average. Developing that winning attitude early in the season and having talent for the game itself, Dick definitely lived up to the fine honor given him.

COMPLETE TEAM No single player can produce a winning team as the Antelopes have done. It takes five players on the court at one time. The Antelopes were definitely laden with the type of talent necessary to produce a winner.

RAY MARTIN, one of the finest guards in the area, was selected on the All-District first team as well as the All-South Plains first team. Only a junior, Ray averaged 18.6 points per contest and was always a threat on the defensive end of the court. Ray will leave a bright spot in the future of next year's team.

KENT SNODGRASS was voted to the first team All-District squad and Honorable Mention All-South Plains. Kent kept the Antelopes ahead in many games the past year averaging 15 points per game. His outside shooting, probably

the best in the area, gave the Antelopes that extra punch they needed all year long. Besides his shooting ability, Kent possessed that sense of control and poise that is necessary to be a winner.

JOE EVANS was selected to the first team All-District squad and Honorable Mention All-South Plains team. Nursing a knee injury, Joe began to develop his game during the off season and soon became a starter as the season opened. Joe, who averaged 12.8 points a game, used his greatest asset -- that of hustle and self-determination -- to lead the Antelopes to their undefeated season.

RANDY SETTLE was selected as Honorable Mention to the All-District and All-South Plains team for the 1972-73 season. Every team needs a leader, someone who can hold the team together in any situation that arises. A player who can at a moment's notice recognize and change a game plan to benefit the situation. A player who can instill that winning attitude in the rest of his teammates. Randy Settle has been that player. Besides his ability as an all-around performer, his leadership traits held the team together.

LARRY LUTRICK was selected to the Honorable Mention All-District team. Larry was the sixth man on the team. His cool-headed play was a great asset in the winning season the Antelopes produced. Larry gave the team that extra offensive punch needed on a moment's notice.

These six fellows received honors well deserved, but they

were not the entire team. A group of young men who saw only limited action played a very important part in the success of the team. Albert Dominguez, Steve Riley, Bill Blackmon, Dane Vickers, Audie Corning, Dickie Overstreet and David McClendon provided competition during practice and proved through their attitudes that they, too, were winners. Any one of them could have started on any team in the district.

SEASON WRAP-UP This year's team was truly a winner. Their State Championship hopes did not blossom and to many this was a disappointing ending to such a fine season. One fact remains outstanding -- the Antelopes of 1972-73 have set a pattern for teams of the future to try and equal. They have given Abernathy that winning tradition that will be held in the highest esteem for many seasons to come.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Littlefield has recently been struck by tragedy. Can tragedy strike our community? What form might it take? Regardless of what comes out of the investigation that is underway, nothing will be changed. There will still be those who are dead, those who will be scarred or perhaps maimed, and what of the bus driver and the families? Artis Ray Johnson will carry scars from this accident, mostly inside where no one will see them. The families and friends will carry scars inside. Could it have been prevented?

Recently, I was travelling east on 8th Street when a bus driver in an empty bus pulled out of the one way entrance, crossed in front of me as he turned west, and proceeded on his way. He came from the wrong way, and he neither slowed down nor stopped before turning onto 8th Street. I'm not sure he saw me. It shook me up and I hope it shook him up. I hope it won't take a local tragedy to shake him up.

However, for the most part, our bus drivers are safety conscious. Thank the Lord for that. But, are we? Do we always observe courtesy and safety in relation to school buses out on the roads and around town? Do we drive carefully around the schools and in residential sections? Do we try to make it across a railroad crossing in that split second before the train reaches the crossing? Do we keep our children out of the streets? Are we sure our young bicyclists observe safety rules when their parents aren't watching? Do you drive around the schools or in residential areas after long periods of sleep loss when your reactions are not up to par? Can we prevent tragedy in our community? Will we?

Minimum tillage being used on the W. B. Criswell farm near Idalou, Texas. Double row grain sorghum followed cotton in 1972 with a yield of 7200 pounds per acre.

MINIMUM TILLAGE YEAR

"The year for minimum tillage is here," stated W. Y. Reece, District Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service. The soil moisture conditions are excellent; therefore, the least amount of disturbance we can do in the preparation of the seedbed for spring planting is very desirable.

Minimum tillage does not mean a no-tillage. Minimum tillage is the smallest number of trips we can make over a given tract of land throughout one complete cropping season to insure a good crop. Minimum tillage means leaving crop residue on the soil surface and planting the succeeding crop in the residue. It means making maximum use of weed control chemicals.

Under dryland conditions, it could mean as little as three to four trips over the land from the harvesting of one crop to the harvesting of another. Surface irrigated land requires an extra trip to prepare the land for irrigation.

Minimum tillage means no sand fighting in the spring, better stands of crops, and no re-planting due to wind damage.

W. B. Criswell, Idalou, a member of the Lubbock County Soil and Water Conservation District Board of Directors, reports grain sorghum (irrigated) following cotton produced 7200 pounds per acre under minimum tillage operation while conventional tilled grain sorghum produced 6700 pounds per acre.


