



Bartlett On Dean's List At Sul Ross

> ALPINE, Tex. --- Over 300 students enrolled at Sul Ross State University during the fall semester qualified for the Dean's List, according to Dr. Delbert Dyke, vice - president for academic affairs.

The university vice-president said 304 students, about 11.5 per cent of last semester's enrollment, earned grade point averages above 3.0 or "B" on a 4.0 scale. He said 121 of the students

on the honor list earned grade points better than 3.5, with 25 students completing the semester with 4.0, or an all "A" average. Dr. Dyke explained only

full-time students carrying at least 15 semester hour loads could qualify for the Dean's List. He also noted that in any semester no more than 15 per cent of the total enrollment could be named to the Honor Roll. type feeds on the cattle's hair coat. All types cause much rubbing and irritation to the victims. Lice can only exist on the body of the host animal and spend the summer in seclusion in the ears and under the forearms of cattle. Lice become more active and begin to multiply as cooler weather approaches, and by the time winter is blending into early spring, the pests are much in

evidence among cattle herds. Ranchers that give their herds a thorough spraying in late November or December can get the jump on the increasing louse population, and cattle will reach spring grass in better condition. A spray material should be used that will be toxic to lice, and cattle should be soaked with spray from head to tail. Follow directions on the spray product container used.

Ranchers will find that cattle with a poor level of nutrition seem to be affected the most by lice, as well as other parasites, internal and external. Adopt a balanced feeding program to go along with a sound spraying and dusting pro-
