Waits Involved In Interesting Projects Here

Some twenty years ago, I was shocked to find several men from California trying to buy "careless weed seed" from the Abernathy area. They were going to row crop them and, by using fertilizer and irrigation, try to harvest several crops annually. Now I find my-self awakened again by visiting Monroe Waits Farm Store where they are merchandising Abernathy weeds and dry discarded cotton bolls (cotton pods). Eight to ten items are being shipped in large quantities to Eastern markets where they are distributed to all parts of the world for use in artistic decorative arrangements. Bleaching, dyeing and mount-

ing are being done before shipment. A few of the seed pods that have been shipped by the thousands are Teasel. Black Bearded Wheat, Milkweed, Jimsonweed, Yucca, Okra and Devil's Crow. Approximately 100,000 cotton pods have been processed and shipped. Exotic names are assigned to enhance the value. such as broomweed being called "Starburst," Monroe extends an invitation to the public to visit them and observe some of their processes in action.






