ABERNATHY (Special)--James F. Pace Sr., 62, of 503 E. 12th St., Lubbock, died about 8 a.m. Friday in Hi-Plains Hospital in Hale Center after an apparent heart attack. Services will be at 2 p.m. Sunday in First Baptist Church here.

Officiating will be the Rev. Joe Rodriguez, pastor of the Baptist Mission in Abernathy. Burial will be in Abernathy Cemetery under direction of Chambers Funeral Home.

A native of Utica, Okla., Pace had lived in Lubbock 17 years. He was a welder and had moved to Lubbock from Denison.

Survivors include his wife Dolores; four sons, James of Abernathy, Claude of Oklahoma, Roy of Houston and Larry of Texico, N.M.; two daughters, Mrs. Tom Whitehurst of Amarillo and Mrs. Mozelle Stringer of Alamogordo, N.M.; his mother, Mrs. Jenny Pace of Denison; a brother, Charles of Brea, Calif.; a sister, Mrs. Opal Butcher of Dallas; 16 grandchildren and three great grandchildren.

Waits Involved In Interesting Projects Here

Some twenty years ago, I was shocked to find several men from California trying to buy "careless weed seed" from the Abernathy area. They were going to row crop them and, by using fertilizer and irrigation, try to harvest several crops annually. Now I find myself awakened again by visiting Monroe Waits Farm Store where they are merchandising Abernathy weeds and dry discarded cotton bolls (cotton pods). Eight to ten items are being shipped in large quantities to Eastern markets where they are distributed to all parts of the world for use in artistic decorative arrangements.

Bleaching, dyeing and mounting are being done before shipment. A few of the seed pods that have been shipped by the thousands are Teasel, Black Bearded Wheat, Milkweed, Jimsonweed, Yucca, Okra and Devil's Crow. Approximately 100,000 cotton pods have been processed and shipped. Exotic names are assigned to enhance the value, such as "strobust." Monroe Waits extends an invitation to the public to visit them and observe some of their processes in action.

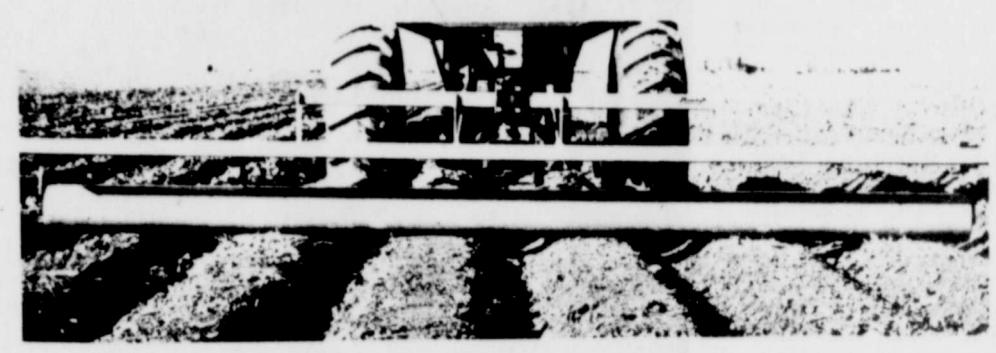

Nazarene Women Hold Meeting

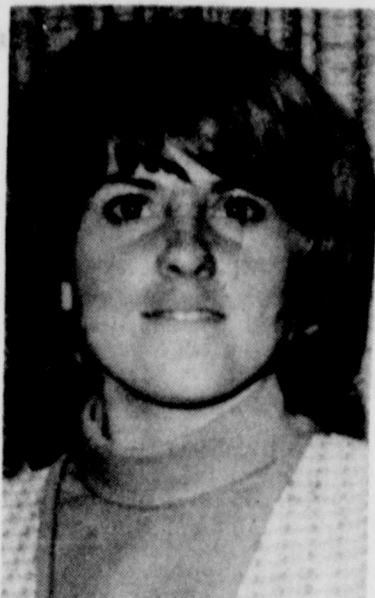

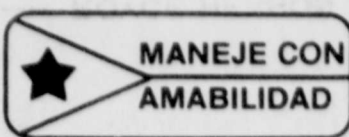

Dr. Doug Owen, soybean breeder with the High Plains Research Foundation, will present information on the available adaptable varieties for this area. Yield trials from High Plains Research Foundation and the Hale County Extension Result Demonstration Handbooks will be discussed, as well as variety needs on planting date and irrigation.

All farmers planning on growing soybeans for 1973 are urged to attend, states Linder. The meeting will last an hour to an hour and 15 minutes.
