

Mr. Hon was admitted and underwent a two-year intensive training program before he was recognized as a qualified textile fixer. Afterwards, he attended the night class of Hong Kong Technical

College and graduated.
Mr. Hon, in his late twenties, is still a single man. His father and a married sister live in Hong Kong, His mother lives in mainland China. Now as a new immigrant, he has the language barrier yet to overcome. The town people are urged to help him out where ever the occasion may come

The City of New Deal was represented at a City planning workshop by Ollie Martin, City secretary, Thursday, March 8, in Plainview. This workshop was sponsored by the South Plains Association of Governments and the Texas Department of Community Affiars.

The topics discussed were selected to assist the elected officials in planning their city's growth and orderly development. Mr. Jay Stern of the De-partment of Community Affairs, Austin, discussed the community development process and the availability of government programs that will be of benefit to the local cities. He also explained the Block Grant Revenue Sharing that is being considered by Congress and how it differs from the General Revenue Sharing.

Mr. Jim Delashaw, an urban regional planner with the department of Community Affairs, presented an overview of the State's requirements in working with the cities in planning. He discussed the items required by the state and subjects that will be of the greatest benefit to cities in their planning. The private consultant's perspective of planning was presented by H. Bennett Reaves of Parkhill, Smith and Cooper, Inc., Consulting Engineers. He described how a consulting firm can develop plans to fit a par-ticular city's needs and the desires of the elected officials. Mr. Reaves presented city planning from a professional view and how they obta n their information to make recommendations to the cities for their consideration.

When to Control Agent Liner reports that research conducted by Dr. George Teetes of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock indicates that two grubs per square foot are sufficient to cause economic losses. Sampling must be made before bed preparation and preplant irrigation. A shovel may be used to take square foot samples for examination of the extracted soil. Sample numbers will depend on the size of the field, but take at least one sample per five acres. When the number of grubs per square foot average one or more larvae, control

will probably be justified. Control Recommendations Difficulty in control stems from ineffectiveness of registered chlorinated hydrocarbon insecticides, such as chlordane or heptachlor, due to apparent resistance by the grub. Presently, diazinon is registered for preplant broadcast application. Diazinon should applied at 10-15 pounds of 14G granular or I-1/2 to 2 quarts of AG-500 liquid per acre. Apply, broadcast and incorporate immediately prior to listing with a disk or other suitable equipment to a depth of 4-5 inches. Listing can be done following incorporation.
