Two other bands also received a Division-I in concert playing (Ralls and Idalou). Only one other band received a Division-I in sight-reading (Post). Ten bands competed in the AA-Class.

Each band is required to play a warm-up type march of choice plus two overtures off the AA list. Any band may choose one of the overtures off the Class-A or Class-AAA list if they feel the selection best suits the band for competition. NASA Astronaut, Mr. Fred W. Haise, Jr., is a native of Biloxi, Mississippi, where he graduated from high school. He later attended the University of Oklahoma where he was awarded a degree in Aeronautical Engineering with highest honors. His military career began in 1952 as a Naval Avia-tion Cadet and has extended over a long and colorful career in which he has accumulated over 7,000 hours of flying time, including over 4,000

hours in jets. Mr. Haise is one of the 19 astronauts selected by NASA in April 1966. He was lunar module pilot for Apollo 13 in April 1970 and, with his fellow crewmen James A. Lovell and and John L. Swigert, experienced the explosion of their oxygen system and miraculously converted a tragedy into a mission of safety and survival.

Mr. Haise has received many awards and citations in recognition of his distinguished service to his country and the scientific world. Astronaut Haise will be the principal speaker at the Abernathy Chamber of Commerce an ual banquet to be held May 5.
