




Street Paving **Project Plans** Are Announced

The Abernathy City Council met in regular session at 7:30 p.m., May 14, 1973, at City Hall.

Permission was granted to the City Manager to advertise for bids for Aerial Mosquito Spray-

ing this summer. The 1973 Paving Program was reviewed and City Engineer Bennett Reeves of Parkhill. Smith & Cooper was on hand to discuss various phases of the program. The present status of the program is to recontact those parties who have expressed interest in paving particular streets. The engineer has prepared unit estimates and assessment rolls which will inform each individual property owner of their total cost. Upon notification each property owner will be required to sign one of two forms which will indicate the desire of the property owner. One form will require the property owner to agree that upon the letting of a contract for the street paving program they will execute a note payable to such Contractor and a Mechanic's and Materialman's Lien Contract covering the property of the signee which will secure payment of such Note as estab-

lished in the Paving Policies. All property owners who have expressed interest in the 1973 Paving Program should be recontacted in the near future.






