Best news to come from the meeting Friday night were plans for the intersection of U. S. Highway 87 and Farm Road 54 three miles north of Abernathy. An overpass or underpass structure will be built there so that the intersection will carry traffic on the two busy highways on different levels. That intersection has

taken a high toll of traffic deaths and injuries over the years since FM 54 was designated and paved. Main changes indicated for Abernathy will be relocation and redesigning of exits and entrances from service streets off of and on to I-27. The

dangerous cross-over south of the Mobil Service Station in South Abernathy will be eliminated by placing chain-link fence between lanes to prevent the crossover. Link fence also will be used at other locations in town to prevent illegal turn-

Golden Eagle passports entitle the bearer (and any person accompanying him) in a single, private, noncommer-cial vehicle to general admission to designated units of the national park system and national park areas. The Golden Eagle passports are \$10 each.

The Golden age passports also entitle the bearer to utilize special recreation facilities within those areas at a rate of 50 percentum of the established daily use fee.

Golden age passports are free with proof of age of 62 or older.

Use Varies **On County** Revenue

Hale County will spend the major portion of its expected \$131,944 in general revenue sharing funds for the first six months of 1973 for financial administration, Account County Judge Henry Reck. Devoted for this purpose will be \$41,691.

Other operating maintenance expenditures out of general revenue sharing funds will be public safety, \$24,855; environmental protection, \$6,123; public transportation, \$3,790; health, \$21,574; libraries, \$3,-557; and social services for aged and poor, \$10,835.

Capital expenditures derived from this source will be multi - purpose and general government equipment, \$2,800; and road equipment, \$16,719.

Judge Heck has further estimated that approximately \$8,330 of revenue sharing funds will be devoted to new or expanded services in financial administration. He added that it is too soon to predict the effect of revenue sharing on local taxes.

Records documenting the plan are open to public inspection at the county auditor's office.

General revenue sharing is a \$30.2 billion, five year program which returns a portion of federal taxes to state and local governments. The unique feature of the program is that it allows state and local officials to determine how funds allocated to their jurisdiction are
