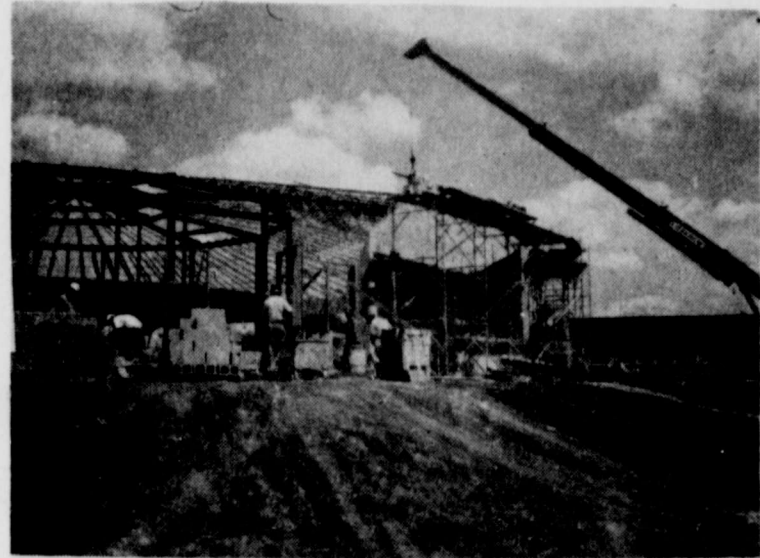
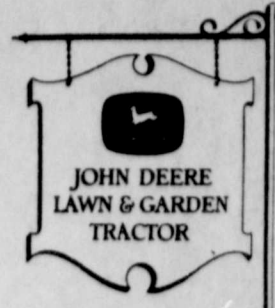

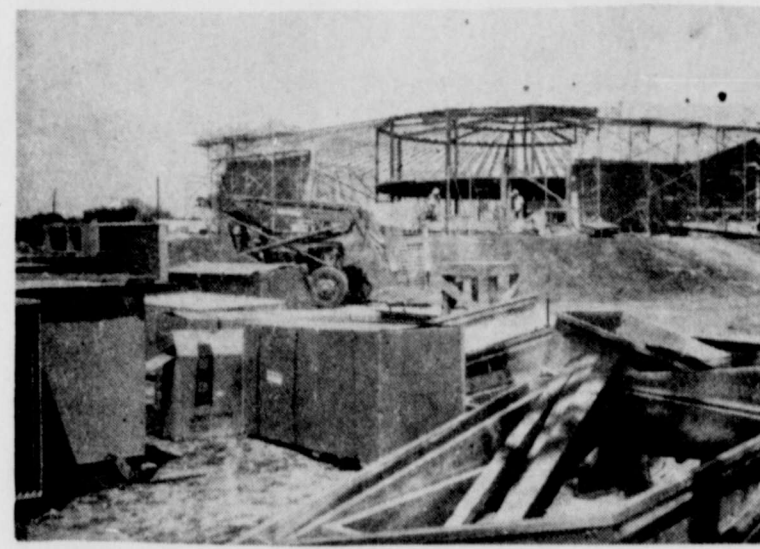

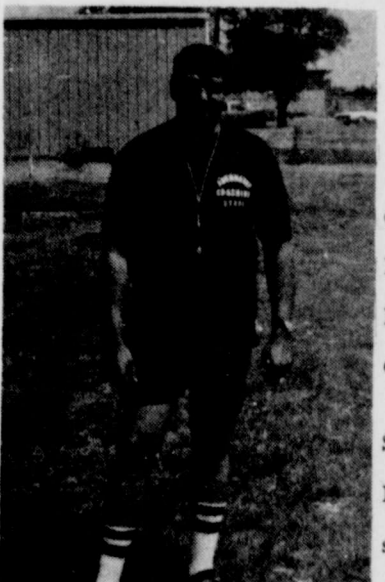
Session of Grid Workouts Start

The team has a new head coach, Larry Zierlein, who attended school at Fort Hays State. Coach Zierlein takes over this year after serving as an assistant in the '72 Antelope campaign. Harry Mathis, a local product who graduated from Eastern New Mexico, will serve as assistant to Zierlein. Darrell Selke, another local product, along with Pat Love who attended Tarleton State, will serve as the Junior High coaches (7th and 8th grades, respectively). Also helping out will be Carl Irbeck and Claude Hunter who are the basketball coaches. These men have great enthusiasm for their jobs and a love for the kids they come in contact with throughout the day. Abernathy is very fortunate to have the caliber of coaches it has. If everyone will get behind these men and the players who make up the Thundering Antelopes, success for the 1973 season will not only be spoken about but will be a reality.

Mrs. Hines, the former Mrs. John L. Haral of Abernathy, made the remark in her quiet, unassuming manner during the dedication of the quarter-million dollar structure which is her latest gift to the college. Mrs. Hines is also the donor of Haral Memorial Auditorium, a half-million dollar building, and a 60-rank Wick Pipe Organ, an \$80,000 gift. Future plans call for the construction of an additional wing adjacent to Haral Auditorium on the north, to house the departments of speech and theatre and art.

Dr. Sam Prestidge, secretary of music for the Baptist General Convention of Texas, was dedicatory speaker for the occasion which was held in the recital hall of the new building. Dr. Prestidge paid tribute to the donor of the "beautiful and excellent structure."

He pointed out, "Music has always been the handmaiden of religion through the years." He continued, "Music is God's gift to earth."

Dr. W. Neil Record, pastor of First Baptist Church, Lockney, formerly assistant to the president at Wayland, gave a history of Haral Music Center. He pointed out that during the development of Haral Auditorium and Music Center that the donor often asked, "You all don't really believe I can do this, do you?"

Naval Reserve Seeks Members

Naval Reserve Surface Division 8-87(M) is now meeting in the second week-end of each month, at the Naval Reserve Center, 2903 W. 4th St., Lubbock. Men from a hundred mile radius of Lubbock are attending drills here.

Meetings begin at 8 a.m. on Saturday and Sunday, and continue until 5 p.m. For this a man gets paid the equivalent of four active duty days.

Men with prior service are urged to affiliate with the Naval Reserve Center. Anyone interested can contact the Naval Reserve Center from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on weekdays or on drill weekends. There are opportunities in the Naval Reserve not only for former Navy men, but for those who have served with other branches of the Armed Forces. Telephone number of the Reserve Center is 765-6657. Persons living outside of Lubbock can call collect to get more information about the Naval Reserve, and to visit during a drill weekend to see what it's all about, with no obligation.

Another benefit accruing to Naval Reservists is going on two weeks' active duty each year, which can be either shore or sea duty, and being eligible for retirement benefits after six years of Reserve affiliation. Also, Reservists are eligible for military base privileges during drill days, with the exception of commissary.

Dear Buford, A group of men from Lamb County are to meet with the Texas Water Development Board August 28. We who are opposed to "Weather Improvement Associations" should express our views now.

For the last three years, some of us have watched the operations of the planes sent up into approaching clouds. In almost every instance, they have broken up the clouds. The claim of the organization is that hail is melted by the flares and then a slow, gentle rain falls. It is quite often almost unbelievable how quickly even a large cloud is dispersed. We can no longer depend on rain from any direction where the planes operate. Should other organizations be formed, it is likely we would get no spring and summer rains from any direction. Very few clouds reach Abernathy and the area south now. So we must depend upon irrigation for lawns, gardens and fields.

With our underground water level lowering approximately ten feet a year, we can see why we should be gravely concerned about receiving rainfall.

Boys Ranch Rodeo Labor Day Weekend

Approximately 10,000 people are expected to celebrate the Labor Day weekend by attending the 29th annual Boys Ranch Rodeo at Cal Farley's Boys Ranch.

Two performances of the rodeo are scheduled at 2:30 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. at the Ranch's Rodeo Arena where more than 150 boys will be riding calves, steers, bulls and bucking broncs. All of the 385 boys who make their home at the Ranch will have some part in the rodeo, either as contestants or working in the many behind-the-scenes activities. The older boys will ride profes-

sional rodeo stock under R.C.A. rules. The rodeo is also a traditional home-coming for those who have graduated from the Ranch and are members of the Boys Ranch Alumni Association. More than 2,500 boys have lived at the Ranch since it was founded by Cal Farley in 1939 and many travel long distances with their families for the rodeo.

An added attraction will be big bar-be-que sandwiches that will be prepared and sold by the boys for only \$1. Reserve box seat tickets for \$2.50 are available at the Boys Ranch office, 600 West 11th Street in Amarillo, or can be obtained by writing to Cal Farley's Boys Ranch, P. O. Box 1890, Amarillo, Texas 79105. General admission is \$1.50 for adults and 75¢ for children.

WATCH FOR HORSE SLEEPING SICKNESS--Texas horse owners are urged to keep a close watch on their animals and to vaccinate unprotected horses for equine encephalomyelitis (horse sleeping sickness). The disease is of three strains--Eastern, Western and Venezuelan. A case of both the Eastern and Western type has been diagnosed recently, the Eastern in Hardin County and the Western in Fayette County. Horses vaccinated against the Venezuelan strain in 1971 need to be revaccinated, and annual booster shots are necessary to protect animals from the Eastern and Western strains.

Mrs. Ralph Davis has been named chairman of the Breath of Life Campaign to fight children's lung diseases according to Frank Scott, president of the North Texas Chapter, National Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

Mrs. Davis of Rt. 2, Box 172, Abernathy, Tex., will lead Abernathy volunteers in raising funds to support research and care programs for children affected by lung-damaging diseases like cystic fibrosis, severe asthma, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis, and a condition called "childhood emphysema."

Cystic fibrosis, an incurable genetic disease, is inherited when both parents carry the recessive gene for C/F. It is believed that one in twenty persons or 10 million Americans may carry the C/F genes, usually without knowing it. Current research funded by the National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation is seeking a practical test to identify these carriers.

Because of improved therapy and constant research, many C/F patients are living beyond infancy to their teens and into young adulthood. That same kind of therapy is relieving and often curing children suffering from other respiratory afflictions whose symptoms resemble those of C/F.

"Most people don't realize that there are six million children in the U. S. affected by pulmonary illness," said Mrs. Davis. "For most of these children, breathing is not the natural function we, who are lucky, take for granted."

The Breath of Life Campaign supports not only research but over 100 C/F Centers for diagnosis and treatment across the country.

Brucellosis Testing Subject Of Meeting August 28

Cattle producers in Hale County are urged to attend a meeting in Plainview on Tuesday, August 28, regarding upcoming new regulations on brucellosis testing.

The meeting will be held at the Hale County Agriculture Center and will begin at 7:30 p.m., announces County Extension Agent, Ollie Linder. A veterinarian with the Texas Animal Health Commission will be on hand to inform producers of pending changes in the present brucellosis regulations. Comments and feedback are being invited from producers and a statewide hearing on the new regulations will be held in Austin on September 18.

The new brucellosis testing program is expected to begin October 1 and is designed to eliminate the cattle disease from Texas, thus allowing the state to be declared Certified Brucellosis Free.

Linder urges all cattle producers to attend this meeting. It is important that they be-

come familiar with the new regulations to benefit from the new testing program. The upcoming meeting on August 28 will provide an opportunity for producers to learn about the new plans for brucellosis testing.

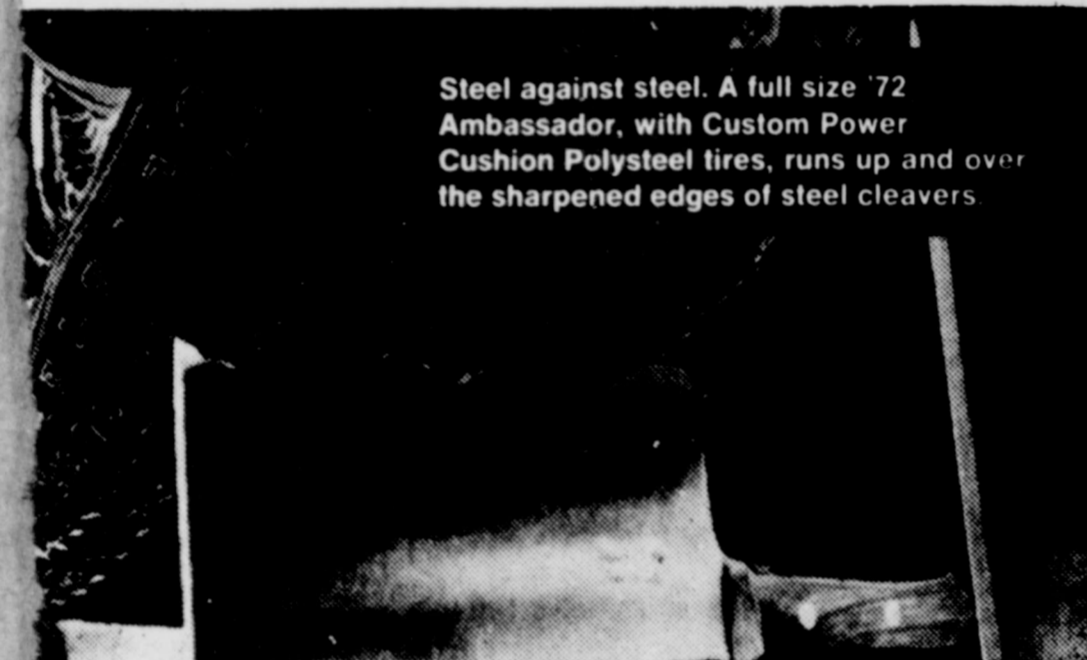

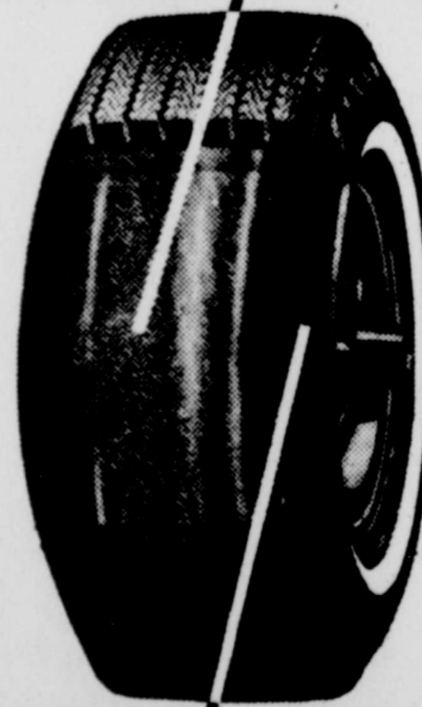

HALE WELLS PRODUCE OVER \$16 MILLION

The petroleum industry in Hale County played a significant role in 1972 in helping to satisfy the unprecedented demand for Texas' crude oil and natural gas.

Hale was one of 190 of Texas' 254 counties which produced oil and gas valued in excess of \$100,000 in a record production year for the state's No. 1 industry, according to figures compiled by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

Hale County ranked 78th in the state in the value of petroleum produced, nearly \$16.7 million. The sale of crude oil brought \$16 million; natural gas \$674,000.

The major production area is the Anton-Irish Oil Field at County Line in Southwest Hale County.

Reports said some 60 more wells are to be drilled in the Anton-Irish Field, starting this year.

The petroleum industry in Lubbock County also played a significant role in 1972 in helping to satisfy the unprecedented demand for Texas' crude oil and natural gas.

Lubbock County, too, was one of 190 of Texas' 254 counties which produced oil and gas valued in excess of \$100,000 in a record production year for the state's No. 1 industry, according to figures compiled by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

The county ranked 149th in the state in the value of petroleum produced, \$2.6 million. The sale of crude oil brought almost of that total.

SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS PAID

Social security benefits were being paid to residents of Hale County at a rate of \$577,000 a month at the close of 1972, Mancel King, social security manager in Plainview, said today.

Of the social security beneficiaries living in Hale County, 2,929 are retired workers and their dependents. Another 1,142 are receiving benefits as the survivors of workers who have died, and 501 are getting benefits as disabled workers or their dependents.

King pointed out that although most social security beneficiaries are older people, about one out of every four is under age 60. In Hale County, 1,076 people under age 60 are collecting social security payments each month. Six hundred and five are under age 18 and receive payments because a working father or mother has died or is getting social security disability or retirement benefits. Most of the 113 beneficiaries in Hale County between 18 and 22 years of age, are getting student's benefits under a provision in the social security law permitting the continuation of a child's benefits beyond his 18th birthday, and up to age 22, if the child is attending school full time.

Also in this 18-22 age group, King said, are some other types of beneficiaries, illustrating the broad family protection that the social security program provides workers of all ages. Some are children of retired, disabled, or deceased workers who became disabled before they reached 22 and who will probably never be able to work and become self-supporting. The monthly benefits of these young people, severely handicapped by physical or mental disabilities, will continue indefinitely. Benefits are also payable to the mother if the disabled son or daughter is in the mother's care.

King said that another relatively small but significant group of youthful social security beneficiaries are those who are receiving benefits as disabled workers.
