TEXAS 4-H ROLLS GROW

COLLEGE STATION --More Texas youth are becoming actively engaged in 4-H activities than ever before.

"Our enrollment continues to make rapid gains," points out Dr. Don Stormer, state 4-H and youth leader with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "We presently have almost 146,000 boys and girls between the ages of 9 and 19 engaged in 4-H activities throughout the state. That's an increase of more than 23,000 during the past year.

"Of course, we are continuously working to expand our program to include more of the youth in the state. With National 4-H Week approaching--Oct. 7-13--special efforts are underway in all counties to enroll new members."

This year's 4-H Week theme is "4-H Gets It All Together."

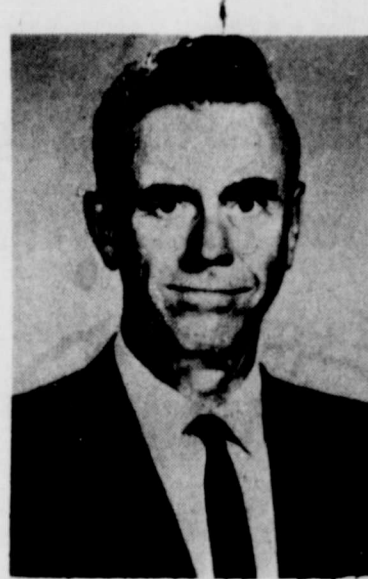
Much of the growth in the Texas 4-H program has been in urban areas, but participation by rural youth continues to increase, according to Stormer. Participation among Mexican-Americans has also increased sharply in the past year.

4-H'ers are also engaging in an increased number of individual projects, notes the Texas A&M University System 4-H leader. Prospects for this year total well over 181,000, an increase of almost 34,000 over 1972.

The leading or most popular 4-H project area is food and nutrition, which has held this distinction for the past few years.

"Adult and junior leaders continue to play an all-important role in working with 4-H boys and girls and are vital to the success of any 4-H program," points out Stormer. The past year showed an increase of almost 2,000 among the adult leaders. We presently have almost 14,000 adult and 6,255 junior 4-H leaders actively involved in programs at the local county level."

TRACTOR SHORT COURSE SET FOR OCT. 22 - 25

A tractor maintenance short course for adult farmers will be held Oct. 22-25 under the sponsorship of the Abernathy High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Dr. Delwin Webb, Superintendent, and Mr. Adams and Mr. Cox, teachers of vocational agriculture.

The short course is being sponsored by the vocational agriculture department of Abernathy High School.

Mr. Norman K. Waggoner, tractor maintenance specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M University, will do the instruction. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Mr. Waggoner, a native of Michigan, received his B. S. Degree in Agricultural Education from Michigan State University in 1942 and his Master's Degree in Ag. Economics in 1948 from the same institution. He taught Vocational Agriculture in Central Michigan five and one-half years. Since 1951 he has been associated with Ford Motor Company in several capacities in the Tractor & Implement Division. For three years prior to joining the Specialist Program, he trained service and sales personnel for the Ford Motor Company at Paris, Texas.

Arrangements for the adult education short course in tractor maintenance and in other fields are made through Mr. Cox's office.

The short course at Abernathy is scheduled to begin Monday, Oct. 22, at 7:30 p.m. in the vocational agriculture Power Mechanics building. Other meetings in the series of four will be held Tuesday through Thursday.

During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Waggoner will be available to assist farmers with individual tractor problems and to provide "on-the-farm" instruction, according to Cox and Adams.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Webb, or the Teacher of Vocational Agriculture, Mr. Cox. An entry fee of \$3 will be charged. Tractor Maintenance Short Course Certificates are to be presented to each individual who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Waggoner states that the key to longer tractor life comes from a full knowledge of the fundamentals of an engine and the application of the proper maintenance skills involving lubrication, fuels, carburetion, air cleaners, cooling systems, valves and ignition. Mr. Waggoner will cover the proper adjustments and maintenance of the above, with emphasis on the importance of each in obtaining a longer tractor life, and improved performance. Throughout the short course, emphasis will be placed on "learning to do by doing" through the use of several demonstration tractors. All enrollees will have the opportunity to perform actual adjustments and maintenance on their own tractors. Safety and operating techniques will also be stressed.

"Short courses in tractor maintenance, as well as other subjects, are available to farmers throughout the state under the new cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University," stated Bob Jaska, associate professor,

OPEN DATE SET FOR ANTELOPES

The Abernathy Antelopes took another defeat on the chin Friday night in their Homecoming battle with the Olton Mustangs by a score of 34-18. The Mustangs, along with the weather, put quite a damper on the 1973-74 homecoming crowd, leaving town with heavy fog and the Antelopes winless for the season.

The Antelopes kicked to the Mustangs, and right from the start things began to look pretty good. Arthur Betancur jarred the ball loose from an Olton running back and came up with a fumble recovery. Abernathy was unable to move the ball and had to punt.

Olton was moving the ball when Steve Oswalt pounced on another fumble. The Lopes were off sides and Olton retained the ball. The Mustangs took advantage of the penalty and, with 4:35 left in the first quarter, scored their first touchdown. Extra point was good and Olton led 8-0.

Olton attempted an onside kick. The ball went one yard, and the Antelopes had the pigskin in good field position on the Olton 39 yard line.

The Antelopes found themselves with the opportunity to even up the score, but a fumble on the first play from scrimmage gave the ball back to Olton.

The defense dug in. After Ruben Rodriguez swamped the Olton quarterback on the 12 yard line, the Mustangs punted the football.

This time Abernathy took advantage of the good field position; and, two plays later, David McClelland scored from the six yard line. Extra point was no good and as the first quarter ended the score read 8-6 in favor of Olton.

The Antelope defense opened the second quarter by shutting off the Mustangs. But the offense was unable to generate anything. The Mustangs took advantage of the offensive miscues by the Antelopes and, with 6:54 left in the first half, scored their second touchdown. The score read 16-6 in favor of Olton.

Forced to punt late in the second quarter, the Antelopes were given another scoring chance when Olton was called for roughing the kicker. Still having its troubles, the offense had to give up the ball on downs. Steve Oswalt immediately turned things around by pouncing on an Olton fumble. The Lopes were unable to score as time ran out in the first half.

SECOND HALF

Olton opened the second half with another onside kick that gave the Lopes good field position. On the opening play from scrimmage Ray Martin moved the ball to the Olton 27 yard line. The offense bogged down at this point, and Rodriguez tried a field goal. The kick was wide. Olton took over on the 20 yard line.

Olton moved the ball for a couple of downs until McClelland jarred the ball loose and came up with a fumble. The offense bogged down again and punted the ball. Olton was unable to move the ball, and the third quarter ended with both teams swapping the ball.

Olton scored another touchdown after a personal foul penalty by the Lopes put them inside the five yard line. The score was 22-6 in favor of Olton.

The Antelopes got off a couple of good plays on the offensive side of the game but were unable to get on the scoreboard.

Olton wasn't hampered in this department as their tailback Glen Johnson got loose and scored on a 55 yard romp. The score was 28-6, Olton.

'72 YIELD LOW

Prospects at this time indicate a good cotton yield for this area from the 1973 crop, but it all depends on the weather.

The 1972 cotton crop was a great disappointment. A total of 29,443 bales of 1972 cotton were ginned by all plants in this area. This 29,443 total is from City Gin, White Gold Gin, Hygrade Gin, Abernathy Farmers Co-op Gins, Abernathy Gin Co., Farmers Tucco Gin, Martin Gin, County Line Co-op Gins and Teakell Gin at County Line.

CAMPAIGN FOR MUSEUM WILL BEGIN OCT. 19

The campaign to build a \$600,000 Museum for Hale County is here. The contact campaign in Abernathy will begin October 19 and end October 24. Arno Struve will serve as chairman of the Abernathy campaign. Similar fund drives are planned for Hale Center, Petersburg, Plainview, and Edmondson.

The museum, a joint effort of the Hale County Historical Society and Wayland Baptist College, will be located adjacent to the Wayland campus in Plainview. The college will assume responsibility for maintaining and operating the facility, but policy will be set by a Museum Advisory Board composed of representatives from the Hale County Historical Society, Wayland College, and the community at large. Arno Struve serves as the member of the board from Abernathy.

To date, over \$150,000 has been pledged in advanced gifts. Foundation support is expected but the brunt of the load will be borne by residents of Hale County. Wide-spread participation is needed to make this campaign a success.

Christmas Cantata Practice Begins

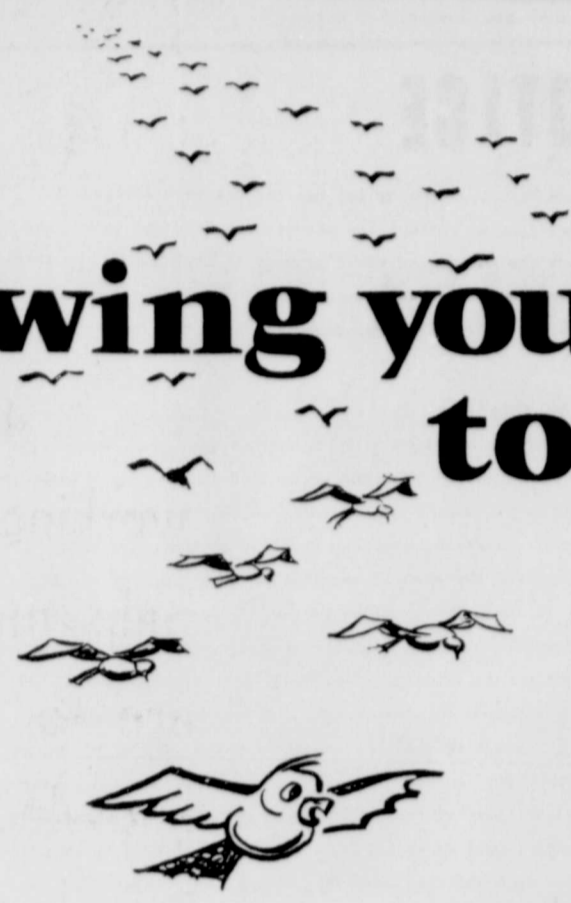

You are hereby notified that the City Council of the City of Abernathy, Texas, has determined the necessity for and ordered the improvement of certain streets and avenues or portions thereof hereinafter described within the limits hereinafter defined, the nature of which improvements is hereinafter generally set forth; and that the City of Abernathy has approved and adopted the estimate, statement and report of the City's Engineer and has taken other proceedings with reference to the making of such improvements are of record in the Minutes of the City Council of the City of Abernathy and has by ordinance ordered that a hearing be held, and notice thereof given, NOW THEREFORE,

PURSUANT TO SAID PROCEEDINGS AND SUCH ORDINANCE,

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN:

I.

That a hearing shall be given to the owners and to all persons owning or claiming any interest in or lien upon any property abutting the streets and avenues or portions thereof of the City of Abernathy, Texas, hereinafter named, within the limits hereinafter set out, and to all other interested parties, including their agents and attorneys, before the City Council of the City of Abernathy, Texas, which hearing shall begin on the 5th day of November, 1973, at 8:30 o'clock P.M. and shall be held in the City Hall of Abernathy, Texas, at which hearing all of said owners and other interested parties, their agents or attorneys shall have the right to be heard on any matter as to which hearing is a constitutional prerequisite to the validity of any assessment sought to be imposed and to contest the amounts of the proposed assessments, the lien and the liability thereof, the special benefits to the abutting properties and the owners thereof by means of the improvements for which all of such assessments are to be levied, the accuracy, sufficiency, regularity and validity of the proceedings and contracts in connection with such improvements and proposed assessments, or concerning any matter or thing connected therewith. 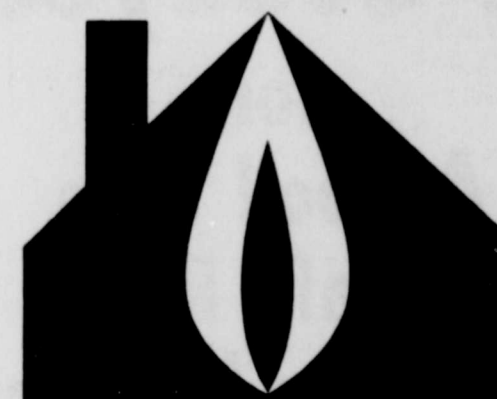

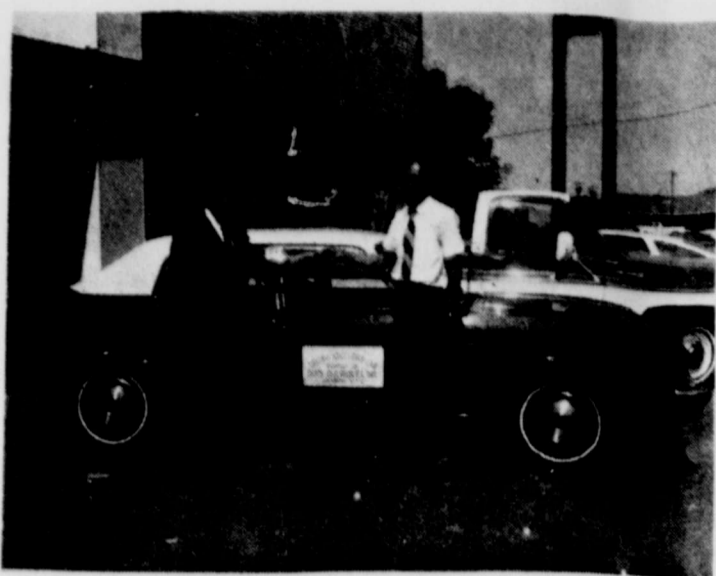
