

With this issue, The Abernathy Weekly Review reaches 2. Number 52, which means the newspaper is completing its 52nd year of service to the people of South Hale County and North Lubbock County.
The Review began publica-

tion in November of 1921.

The editor has been with The Review in one capacity or the other (sweeping out to ownership) since 1932. The late J. C. Hurst appointed me as editor of The Review when he moved Vic Lamb to The Hale Center American in Sept. of 1935. Mr. Hurst owned both papers at that time.

Mrs. BFD and I bought The Review from Mr. and Mrs. Hurst in January of 1946, and, thanks to Mrs. BFD's many abilities, we have not missed publishing an edition of The Review since that date. She put out The Review alone for six months in 1967, while I was recuperating from a heart attack. The nearest we ever came missing a paper was the 1967 Christmas edition. 
