COTTON AND TRAILERS ARE LOST IN FIRE

It happens somewhere in this area every cotton-ginning season. FIRE.

Fire was discovered in a trailer-load of unginned cotton on the City Gin yard about 12 noon Monday. A high, west wind quickly scattered the fire to other trailers filled with seed cotton. Wind velocity began increasing shortly after the fire was discovered. Burning trailers of cotton were dragged to isolated spots, while trailers of cotton not being deployed to a distance upwind from the fire, and later were transferred to a location west of the city limit. Abernathy Volunteer Firemen were assisted by farmers and others who had vehicles with trailer hitches to tow the trailers away.

Reports said the City Gin buildings and machinery were not damaged by fire.

The Review went to press early this week, and no estimate of the number of trailers or bales destroyed was available.

Abernathy Mill Scores First With New Spinning Machinery

Abernathy -- What is believed to have been the first delivery of revolutionary open-end spinning machinery to a mill in Texas was made here Tuesday afternoon to Southwest Textiles, Inc.

The equipment, manufactured in Czechoslovakia, was shipped here from the International Textile Machinery Show at Greenville, S.C. Joe Thompson, president and general manager of Southwest Textiles, said the open-end equipment was "a big attention

getter" at the exposition, attended by more than 100,000 persons.

"We expect to have three open-end spinning frames in operation in December," Thompson said, "and we will have four more in production by next spring."

This is the first step in a program that is aimed at doubling the capacity of the yarn mill.

ANTELOPES CLOSE GRID SEASON

The Antelopes traveled to Lockney Friday night for their final game of the 1973 season with hopes of a second place finish in District 2A. The outcome was far from expectations as the Longhorns defeated the Antelopes by a score of 28-14.

The Antelopes got behind on the score board midway through the first quarter as Lockney pushed the ball over from the five to lead 7-0.

Neither team could produce any offensive show until the second quarter. Lockney added their second score early in the second period on an 18 yard run.

The Antelopes retaliated with two minutes left in the first half on an 18 yard Martin-to-Alonzo pass. The score read 14-7 with 55 seconds left in the first half.

The Longhorns got really mad with 31 seconds left on the clock and scored their third touchdown to lead 21-7. The clock refused to run out as the Longhorns took full advantage and wiped an Abernathy pass. With 10 seconds left in the first half the score was 28-7 in favor of Lockney.

No one will ever know what was said in the Antelope dressing room during half time, but it did the Antelopes a lot of good as they completely shut off the Lockney attack and held them scoreless the entire second half. The Antelopes were able to score another touchdown in the third quarter as Ray Martin pushed the ball over for the score. The score read

Much Faster Machines
"These open-end machines are three to five times faster than conventional ring spinning," Thompson said, explaining that "our plans for the future are to automate as fast as possible."

Thompson knows of only two mills in the United States that now have as many as several open-end spinning frames in operation. The open-end concept is in wider use in Europe and the Far East.

The mill here at present produces more than 1 million pounds of yarn a year and annually consumes approximately 4,000 bales of Texas cotton.

Yarn Quality Upgraded
"Quality of yarn produced on the open-end system is much superior to that from ring spindles," Thompson said. "Everybody agrees with that. I've not found anybody who disagrees with it."

Much of the widespread interest in open-end spinning in West Texas stems from the system's reputed suitability for spinning what is now known as "discount cottons" grown in the region.

The open-end method is said to be most efficient in the formation of coarser yarns for

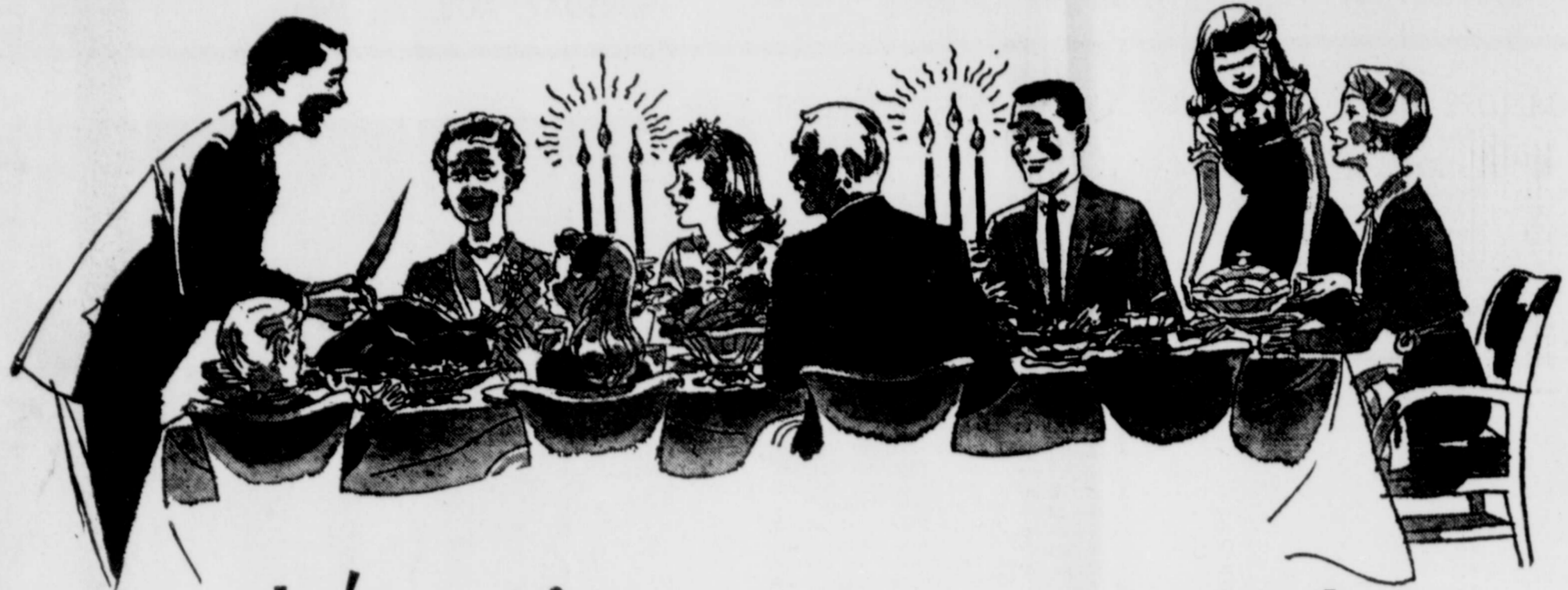
Lockney 28, Abernathy 14. Neither team added to the score board and the game ended 28-14 in favor of Lockney.

(Continued From Page One) which shorter, lower micronaire cottons normally are used, whatever the spinning system. But studies at the Textile Research Center at Texas Tech University and elsewhere have shown the spinning of these cottons on open-end frames to be much more economical than on the ring system.

Greater Strength
It also has been shown by Tech and others that yarns produced from low-micronaire (a measurement of fiber fineness or maturity) cottons in the open-end process actually have greater strength and better uniformity than similar type yarns produced from the same system with higher-micronaire, premium-price cottons.

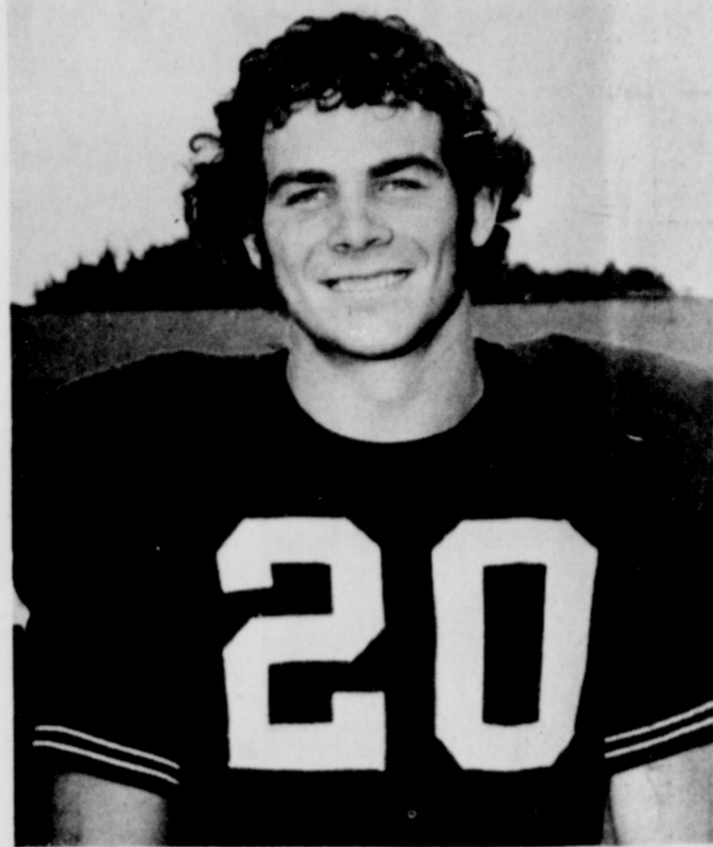
Thompson said the open-end spun yarn will be marketed within the United States. Until last July, the plant here for three years had been exporting virtually all of its production, shipping the yarn mostly to

mills in Indonesia and Cambodia. "We're going to start out with good quality cotton on the open-end system and gradually work into lower quality raw material until we find the optimum quality for our uses, everything considered," Thompson said.

Plant Seven Years Old
Thompson said current plans are to use cottons stapling an average of 1-1/2 inch. The Southwest plant, which employs about 80 persons and has an annual payroll of approximately \$350,000, was established seven years ago with an original investment of about \$750,000.

Except for Sundays and other short intervals, the plant has been operated continuously on an around-the-clock basis since then.

In addition to Thompson, the board of directors of Southwest Textiles includes R.R. Struve, vice president; A.B. Reid, secretary, and W.F. Wolf,

Tech Grads Living In Israel Write Of Events, Reaction

Editor, Lubbock Avalanche-Journal:
We would like to say thank you to our President and fellow citizens for the help you have given this wonderful country of Israel.

We write this on the part of our Israeli neighbors and other American Jewish friends now living in Israel. We are a Christian family living here since September 1967. Many times our Israeli friends have told us even before this war that American friendship is very important to Israel.

All of the Americans here have said many times "Thank God we were born Americans". None of our Jewish friends left America because they were dissatisfied there. They are here in Israel, even as we are, because God brought them here and since there is an Israel they cannot be anywhere else. They are working to inculcate in the Israeli society the best principles of American society and to build their land upon the ideals given in the Holy Scriptures.

We live in a moshav (a farming cooperative of over 100 families about 10 miles from Ashdod) and we saw a nation go to war from our living room windows. We watched the tank trucks, the troop carriers, the halftracks, and all go by with the best of Israel's young men. Our neighbors and our young men left within 24 hours. Yes, we cried with them too when news came from the fronts of our dead and missing.

But these people are marvelous, the spirit of work and cooperation is as it must have been in America's frontier days. We've asked no one to send their sons to die on Israel's soil. All we ask is your help and your prayers for a just settlement.

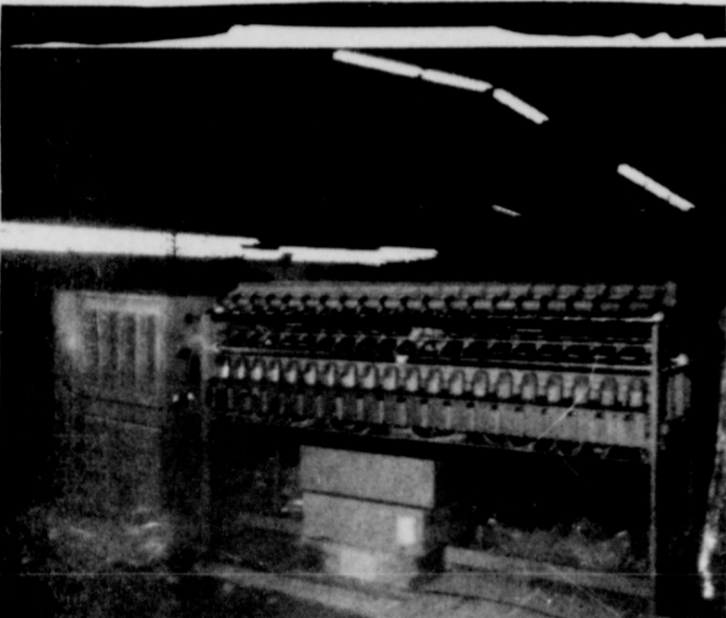
These people have no hate for the Arab people. In our six years we've never heard one word expressed against the Arabs. As a neighbor said who lost his son-in-law, "I don't hate the Arabs, but the Russians I hate and distrust". Israel is ready for a just peace settlement, but we cannot give back land and then have Sam-3 missiles in Gaza - 50 miles from Tel Aviv, or overlooking settlements by the Sea of Galilee.

God has brought these people back. Israel is here to stay though it shall be "a time of Jacob's trouble, but he shall be saved out of it". God said to Abraham, "I will bless those who bless you and curse those who curse you". May America always stand for the right as she is doing this time. God has blessed America as He has blessed no other nation in history. If you don't believe it - ask your friends or people who have traveled outside America. Yes, America has its problems, but with your work and God's help you can solve them.

The people from all walks of life here in Israel say thank you from their hearts and ask that you pray with us that there will be a time of Shalom (peace) for all nations in the Middle East.

We are graduates of Texas Tech, Classes 1948-49. Don's parents are Mr. and Mrs. S.L. Montgomery of 4923 12th St. I am the former Mary Teeters and lived at Levelland many years.

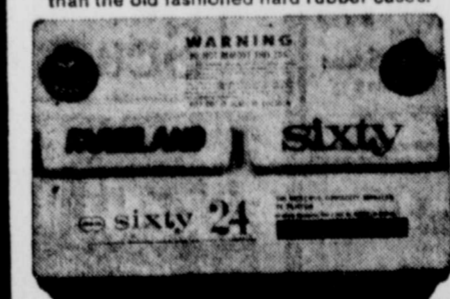

Dedication of Shovel Mountain's Von Struve House

MARBLE FALLS -- The 104 year old Struve spring house-kitchen at Shovel Mountain, recently named a recorded Texas historic landmark, had a Texas Historical Building Medallion affixed to it last Saturday. The occasion brought out more than 200 visitors to the Double Horn Ranch, site of the former Amand Von Struve ranch and owned in recent years by W.E. Pielop, Jr., of Houston. The Fritz Bruns now operate the ranch. Saturday's occasion means there are now almost 30 medallions in Burnet County, with a Texas total of approximately 6,500 official markers. The marking of local historic sites and landmarks is part of the Texas Historical Commissioner's program of preservation activities. These also include archaeological investigations, small museum consultation and administering the National Historic Preservation Act in Texas. The inscription on the Struve House, located 11 miles southeast of Marble Falls, reads:

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Amand Von Struve (1838-1902) came to Texas in 1848 with his father, a former Imperial Russian Officer. Buying land here, 1858, and later, he amassed over 8,000 acres, with herds of horses, cattle, and sheep. To wooden dwelling, he added (1869) this stone spring house-kitchen, to protect food and water from Indians and animals. He married (1871) Christiana Fissler Ebeling. Had 8 children. Their main dwelling was razed in 1940's. Stone annex was restored for preservation, 1950's.

Waymon Jones last week added a revolutionary piece of new equipment in his Abernathy Body Works in the south part of town. It is the VVW anchor and hydraulic power unit, newest thing in body shop frame equipment. In addition to the usual frame repair jobs, this unit can repair the body of a compact car. Most of the compacts do not have frames like larger cars, and this machine was built to handle compacts, too. Also, since moving to the south part of Abernathy, on the west side of the highway, Jones has added a spot welding unit to his inventory of body shop equipment. It is the kind of welding unit used in the factory to put car bodies together. In addition to saving time, this spot welding unit does not damage and warp body sheet metal like the usual welding processes.
