## GERMAN FROM AUSTRALIA IS "LOCAL CITIZEN"

A Proclamation issued last week by Mayor J. Pete Thompson, right, added another citizen to Abernathy's population. Paul Josef Weiser is shown, left, receiving Honorary Abernathy Citizenship credentials from the Mayor. This is the third citizenship for Paul Josef Weiser, who now lives in Australia. He was once a German citizen and soldier. During World War II, Mr. Weiser was in the German armed forces and was on duty at a camp where the Germans kept prisoners of war. In this camp, as a prisoner of war, was Brooks Speer, who resides in this area. He was captured while serving with the U. S. Armed Forces in Europe during World War II. On this 1973 Thanksgiving Day, Brooks Speer, who farms east of New Deal, repaid in part the debt he owed Mr. Weiser. . . food. While Brooks Speer was a POW, Paul Josef Weiser took great risks by smuggling extra rations of good food to him. Paul Josef Weiser has been visiting in Germany, and on his way back to Australia, he stopped here for a visit in the Speer home.

### PROCLAMATION

## Antelope Basketball

A rebuilding season, which is expected to produce another district championship, is well underway for the Antelopes. Coming off a 29-1 season last year and with only one returning starter has proved to be a great challenge to Coach Irlbeck, who in his years of coaching basketball has amounted the fantastic record of 229 wins and 61 losses. After losing the majority of his players from the district championship team of last year, Coach Irlbeck went to his hands full in trying to fill these vacancies. Such players as Dick Rogers, Joe Evans, Randy Settle, Kent Snodgrass, Larry Lutrick, Bill Blackmon and Dickie Overstreet rarely come along in a coach's career.

Speed and outside shooting will no doubt be the main ingredients of this year's team. RAY MARTIN, the only returning starter and the leading scorer last year with an 18.6 average, should be one of the finest offensive ball players on the South Plains. Speed will come from returning letterman DAVID MCGLENDON and ALBERT DOMINGUEZ. These two fellows are defensive specialists with a goodeye for the basket. ARTIS BETTS should provide the outside shooting threat at his forward position. With 6'3" TOMMY HORSFORD at the post position the Antelopes will have a well-balanced attack. STEVE RILEY, ALONZO RAMOS, KEN DAVENPORT and KELLEY TOOKER will round out the roster. These four fellows, as they gain experience, will help the team tremendously. All seem to be fine fundamental players.

Pre-season ratings have picked the Antelopes to run a close second to the Tulia Hornets in the district race. But a team doesn't survive on ratings. There is a lot of basketball to be played before the district campaign ever begins. The Antelopes are in a rebuilding stage, but the talent is there and the coach is there. As the newness wears off and the competition gets tougher, so will the Antelopes.

### LADY 'LOPES

The Lady 'Lopes will be out to improve on their 1972 season record of 10 wins and 16 losses with intentions of bringing home a district championship. The girls should be a better shooting ball club this year with forwards like NAN SHIPMAN, CHERYL ROGERS (who scored 32 points in her first game), MELINDA HUFFAKER, TERRI HILL, MELANIE MOOREHEAD, DEBBIE RASTINE and CINDY ALLEN. Guards for the Lady 'Lopes will be MARVA JOHNSON, SYLINDA HUNTER, GLORIA CUEVAS, PAM ROGERS, ELAINE HAMILTON, DORINDA LOVELACE and JANE GOHEEN. Overall it looks like a good year for girls basketball in Abernathy. One thing will be a factor—hustle and enthusiasm for the game. Hang on and watch the Lady 'Lopes put it all together.

## Shortage, Price Hike Hits Review; New Policies Set

The central printing plant in which The Abernathy Weekly Review and several other South Plains weekly newspapers are printed has increased printing prices for us. This was done on the basis of an increase in cost of newsprint. . . "and, the newsprint salesman said there will be another hike in price for newsprint in January, 1974," said the printing plant manager. "Also, the paper salesman said our plant will receive 15% less newsprint in 1974." The manager continued. "Until this hit The Review in the face, the 'shortage' of things seemed to us only something that happens to somebody else. Now, that it has hit The Review, we must make certain policy changes to adjust to the problem which is new to us.

We dislike having to burden our advertisers and subscribers with declarations of policy change. We want to make it as easy and trouble-free as possible to do business with The Abernathy Weekly Review.

Here are a few changes that will help keep The Review coming to you every week:

1. Paid up mail subscribers to The Review will be served first. The 15% cut may diminish the number of copies on newsstands, and may eliminate the news stands altogether. If you want The Review every week, your chances are better at a paid up mail subscriber.

2. Mail subscriptions will be taken off the list as they expire. Only one notice of expiration will be mailed.

3. The U. S. Postal System has asked for an increase in postage rates to start in January, 1974 (including a 38% hike in postage on newspapers).

4. Due to the coming postal increase, starting NOW, Nov. 29, ALL individual want-ads, thank you notes and cards of thanks will be on a cash-in-advance basis. Minimum charge for these is \$1 each insertion. Most want-ads and thank notes come within the minimum price of \$1 in size. If your want-ad or thank note are extra long, they will be measured and you will be billed for the difference, if any.

5. Write-out your want-ad or bring them by The Review office. If The Review is closed, drop your want-ad or thank note, along with \$1, through the mail slot in The Review office door. This way, you, too, can save postage. Or, if you prefer, mail the want-ad or thank note and \$1 to The Review, P. O. Drawer D. After this date, Nov. 29, no more want-ads or thank notes will be taken by telephone. They must be delivered to The Review office or mailed to The Review at P. O. Drawer D, with \$1.

6. For your protection, if we fail to publish the want-ad, or for some reason make a mistake that causes the want-ad to be worthless to you, we'll either re-run the correct ad or mail you dollar back. Put your mailing address on the want-ad or thank note copy you turn in to us.

7. Under the postal rate increase, with first class mail at 10¢ we cannot pay postage and billhead printing cost and envelopes and bookkeeping cost on a \$1 ad bill and come up with any money left after these costs plus those for typesetting the ad and printing it. Cash-in-advance for want-ads is becoming a common practice with Texas weeklies. This idea did not originate in The Review office.

8. The emergency policy will make it necessary to dispense with an announced deadline for turning in news and ads. News and ads will be on a first come first served basis. When enough news and ads are in our office to fill a paper, no more will be taken for that week's paper, and news and ads coming in after the paper is filled will be carried over until next week.

## HEARING SET FOR SCHOOL'S APPLICATION

PUBLIC HEARING DEC. 6 ON SCHOOL'S APPLICATION

Abernathy citizens have been invited by the Abernathy Public Schools to attend a public hearing Thursday evening, Dec. 6, concerning the school district's application for funds under the Emergency School Aid Act program. Persons attending the meeting Dec. 6 will hear a discussion of the application and will have an opportunity to make recommendations. The hearing is set for 7 p. m. in Room 117 in the high school building.

In a previous announcement concerning the program, Charles Bowen, director of Federal Programs for the school district, said that the purposes of the Emergency School Aid Act were three-fold: to meet the special needs related to elimination of minority group segregation and discrimination among students and faculty in elementary and secondary schools; to encourage the voluntary elimination, reduction or prevention of minority group isolation in elementary and secondary schools with substantial proportions of minority group students; and to aid school children in overcoming educational disadvantages of minority group isolation.

An advisory committee of twenty adults and seven students is serving to make periodic recommendations about the applications for a Basic Grant and a Bilingual Grant. Adult members of the committee are Rev. Joe Rodriguez, Dan Ward, Hugh Hill, Carroll Bradley, Israel Garza, Mrs. Esther Sepeda, Floyd Shipman, Mrs. Maybell Glass, Mrs. Olean Mathis, Mrs. Georgia Garza, L. S. Chen, Harry Mathis, Sammy Hunley, Harold Stillwell, Mrs. Ruth Fulton, Mrs. Lajana Grindstaff, Miss Sarah Burkhardt, Miss Linda Wooten, Mrs. Mary Lope, Mrs. Yolando Vecchio, Mrs. Carolyn Wade, and Charles Bowen. Seven students are members of the Advisory Committee. They are Cleo Hood, David McClendon, Judy Valdez, Debra Burnett, Alonzo Ramos, Josephine Lock, and Elizabeth Lock. Mrs. Erma Dunn Johnson was named to the committee, but has since moved to Lubbock.

The public hearing is required by law to give local citizens an opportunity to hear discussion and make recommendations concerning the applications. Bowen said today that the applications would be mailed to the Department of Health, Education and Welfare on December 13, 1973.

The Advisory Committee for the Emergency School Aid Act had their fourth meeting on Monday night, November 26, 1973, in the high school building, Room 117. The meeting was changed from Tuesday, the 27th, because of conflict with previously scheduled basketball games. Adult and student members are encouraged to attend these meetings.

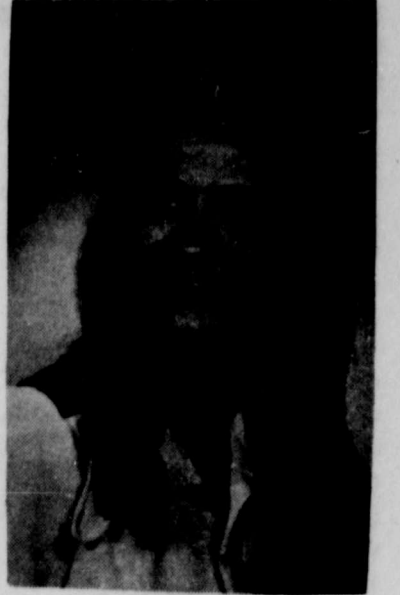

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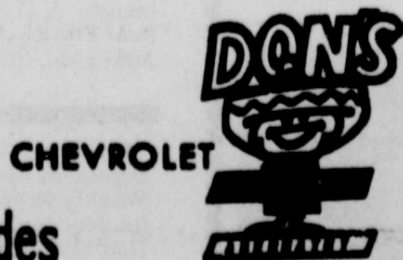

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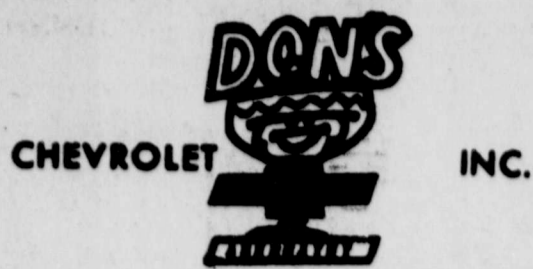
