The four sons, R. C. Jr., Lewis, Melvin, and Vester sang the special song, which was appreciated by all.

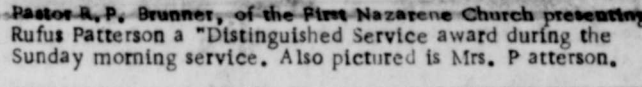

Local youngsters will be "dusting off" their footballs and loosening up their throwing arm soon for the 1976 Punt, Pass and Kick competition.

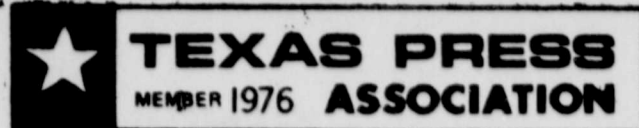

"I Felt His Presence There," says Pat Stanton. After Trip to the Holy Land

 Israel is a land of destiny and purpose. God himself brought his chosen race to dwell in this Holy Land. The people have always prided themselves in their homeland and have purposed to keep the land.
 They have survived Pharaoh. Israel has survived Haman. Israel has survived Hitler and Israel will survive the antichrist. She is now surrounded by a host of enemies. Soon the Arabs will be joined by the Asiatics and the Russians. The Jews in Israel have sworn that they will not be driven into the sea.

Israel will never again be completely destroyed because she has a date with the Messiah, Jesus Christ (Zechariah 12:10a) "And I will pour upon the house of David, and upon the inhabitants of Jerusalem, the spirit of grace and of supplications: and they shall look upon whom they have pierced, and they shall mourn for him." (Ezekiel 37:28) "And the heathen shall

know that I the Lord do sanctify Israel, when my sanctuary shall be in the midst of them forevermore." (Romans 11:26) "And so all Israel shall be saved: as it is written. There shall come out of Zion the Deliverer, and shall turn away ungodliness from Jacob." Also read Ezekiel 36:24-27 for more information regarding Israel's spiritual state.

The Christian believer today also has purpose in regards to Israel. Israel is the Christian's "spiritual home." This is one reason why Christians experience such peace and contentment while visiting in the Holy Land. It is also true, that once you visit the land, you always long to return. Galatians 3:29 says that believers are Abraham's descendants by faith and heirs to all the promises of God. The Holy Land was given to Abraham and his seed. Today, the true believer can also claim the Holy Land as really being "his land." The New Testament teaches that the "New Jeru-

salem" shall descend from heaven to be "the heaven" and dwelling place eternally for the followers of the Lord. My tour of Israel ended just a month ago, and the feelings and thoughts of the trip are still fresh within my mind.

The Sea of Galilee was an inspiring place for our group as we boarded a large cabin cruiser at 8:30 a.m. We departed Tiberias and arrived in Capernaum one hour later. This is the area where Jesus centered his ministry while in Galilee.

It was in the Galilee area that Jesus did his first miracle, this was in Cana when he turned the water into wine. It was also on the Sea of Galilee that Jesus calmed the stormy waters. Near Capernaum is the Mount of Beatitudes where Jesus gave the Sermon on the Mount. There was also the feeding of the 5000, which has been commemorated by the Church of Multiplication. The warmest place that we were in was in Jericho

and the Dead Sea area. The temperature was near 100 degrees. Jericho appears suddenly as an oasis in the desert. It was old before Abraham lived. There is only one sycamore tree in all of Jericho today. It is very old and stands by the main street of the city. I was reminded that Zacchaeus had climbed a sycamore tree because he was short and he wanted to see Jesus as he passed by.

During our last tour day, we visited Nazareth, Nain, Jezreel, and Megiddo. In the valley we were able to see the place where the scripture states that the last battle of Israel will be waged. This is called Armageddon in the Hebrew. (Rev. 16:16)

Later in the day, we arrived in Haifa, the main port of Israel and an important industrial city. It was here that we toured a diamond factory. It was certainly interesting to see the workers busily engaged in polishing and cutting the stones. We were able to make

purchases at much lower prices than that of the United States. Their diamonds came from Africa and are of good quality.

The productive landscape of all Israel is blossoming and is fast becoming a great garden. We saw roses growing in hot houses next to cotton fields watered by sprinkler systems, wheat fields with New Holland and John Deere combines nearby, and onion crops here and there. Also banana trees, oranges and grapefruit were a common sight in some areas.

The Spirit of God is in all of Israel's history. From Mount Hermon in the North to Beersheba in the South, God is still at Work, and I certainly felt His Presence as I walked throughout "His Land."

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 2, 1976

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution. S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

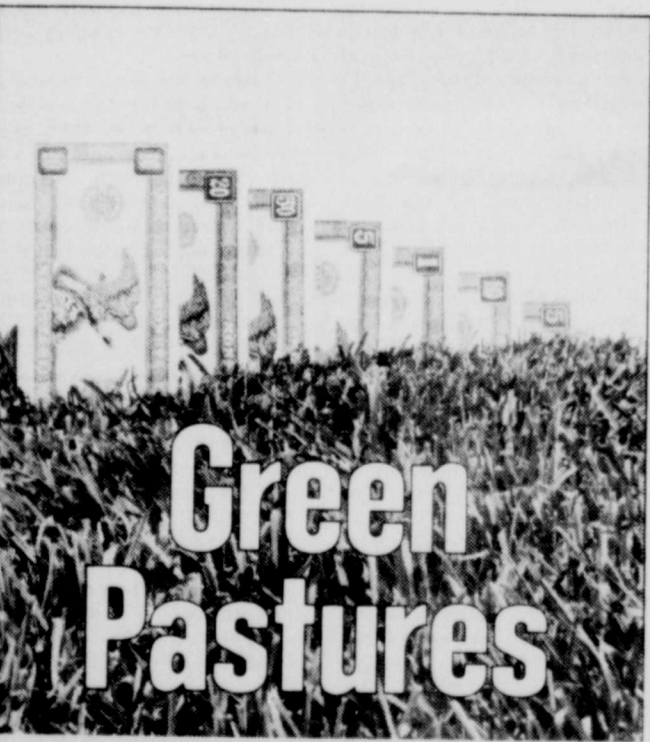
"The constitutional amendment authorizing an increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legislature, amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution; and repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 99)

H.J.R. 99 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the aggregate principle amount of Texas water development bonds which may be issued and outstanding by the Texas Water Development Board to provide grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"A constitutional amendment to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued for water quality enhancement purposes."

SPORTS WORLD BUILDING PURCHASED BY STATE FIREMEN'S ASSOCIATION

The State Firemen's and Fire Marshals' Association of Texas has purchased the Sports World building in Grand Prairie, according to an announcement made by association president Bob O'Burke of Duncanville.

The 24,000 sq. ft. structure, located in the heart of the metropolitan entertainment area, was purchased from Gulf Western, parent organization of Paramount Pictures. Assisting the firemen's association in negotiating the purchase was Grand Prairie City Manager, Cliff Johnson and Dallas County Commissioner, Roy Orr.

The property is in the area of Six Flags, Texas Stadium, Arlington Stadium, the Wax Museum, Lion Country Safari, and Hawaii Kai. Money to pay for the building will be raised by the 760 member

"We have been looking for a building to house a museum for over five years," O'Burke said, and added, "This building is ideal for our purpose and we feel it was a tremendous purchase."

The association will seek assistance from the Texas Historical Committee in formulating plans for the museum.

VEGETABLES, GIFTS WILL AID CHILDREN AT METHODIST HOME IN WACO

Fred Hubbard of Cotton Center is at it again!

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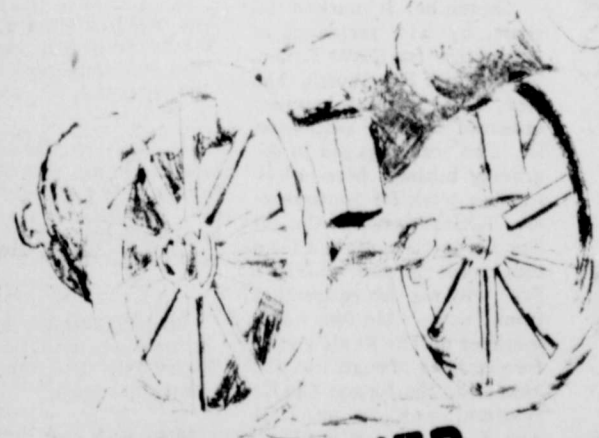
