#### NEW I. H. TRACTORS TO BE DISPLAYED FOR FARMERS AT STRUVE IMPLEMENT OPEN-HOUSE, FIELD DAY

Area farmers will get their first look at International Harvester's much talked-about line-up of the Pro-Agline tractors at Struve Implement, local IH dealership, during the Open House and Field Day Friday, Sept. 10. OPEN HOUSE SITE-Struve Implement Company, local International Harvester dealership, will hold a dual purpose Open House Friday, Sept. 10. The firm is housed in the large building three miles north of Abernathy at the intersection of I-27 (Hiway S7) and FM 54. Entrance to the place of business is off of FM 54, east of the main highway. 




