Rebelettes Continue On Their Victory March

As visions of championships dance in their heads, the Rivercrest Rebelettes scored two or more hefty victories the past week.

On January 27, the Rebelettes took on the Ore City girls, defeating them 98 to 18 in a no-contest game.

Scotti Wood racked up an impressive 22 points, shots connecting from the field and two free throws. Veronica Howerton, whose improvements in accuracy have been obvious this year, scored 18 points. Close behind was lightning fast Donna Hines with 17 points. Monica Belcher contributed 15 points, splitting them

evenly between field goals and free throws.

Sarah Scales zipped in 14 points, all from the court, and Jean Norman scored seven and Janet Webb, five.

On the 30th of January, the girls defeated Redwater 89 to 20 in a game that again posed little problem.

Scotti Wood again led with 20 points and five steals.

Veronica Howerton was only one point behind her, and had three steals to her credit. Following after in the scoring were Janet Webb with 12, Monica Belcher with 10 and Sarah Scales with an impressive 18 points. Jean

Norman's seven points were only a little more important than her four times to remove the ball from the control of the opposition.

Donna Hines scored three points.

The Junior Varsity girls played on the same nights, but found themselves not quite as lucky. They had no trouble defeating Redwater 46 to 25, but fell to Saltillo 41-28.

High scorer against Redwater was Jackie Via with 15 points, and close behind 14 points for Kim Reeder. Cassandra Dugger earned eight, and Rhonda

Branch, Tessa Morgan, Nelda Anderson and Kristi Foxworthy all scored two points each, and Pam Ward scored one. Karen Caddell and Pam Mauldin were valuable in ball handling.

Against Saltillo, Kim Reeder was high scorer with seven points, Pam Ward had six, Rhonda Branch and Jackie Via four each, and Pam Mauldin had three. Cassandra Dugger and Nelda Anderson scored two each.

Still, despite a good effort, the girls found the Saltillo girls too tough to handle. They have high hopes for their next game.

Rebels Blast Ore City

The Rivercrest Rebels put on a spectacular performance Tuesday night at the Rebel gym to defeat the Ore City Rebels by a score of 71-63.

The victory was a tremendous team effort for the Rebels as they played 10 players with all players again contributing to the victory.

The Rivercrest team fell behind the first quarter by a score of 19-17 and trailed at half time by a score of 32-31.

During the third quarter Rivercrest had a hard time of it falling behind 13 points before their game plan began to work. Fresh substitutions were made as the Rebels were 13 down and renewed players for Rivercrest began to wear down the taller Ore City players. By the end of the third period, Rivercrest had cut the opponent's lead to three points, 51-48.

The fourth quarter was all Rivercrest's as they blasted Ore City by a score of 23-12 to make the final score.

According to the Rebel coach, this was the finest game played all year. "I just cannot say enough about these kids. They never let up and just would not give up. We had players diving on the floor numerous times for loose balls. We did an excellent job the second half of blocking out Ore City's 6'5" postman, Tim Morrow. Morrow was held to a mere 14 points, 10 points below his season average. When we beat Ore City, we beat one of the best teams in East Texas. We will have to beat them again at Ore City to win the district championship, but I know we will. Our boys have vowed to give 100 percent at all times and win a district championship."

In the Ore City game David Weissinger has his best offensive night of the year with 25 points, followed by Stan Wood with 18 points and a good defensive game. Edge had a tremendous game on defense and gave a good overall effort. James Strickland and Bobby Thompson were outstanding on defense, with David Rozell standing out under the boards both offensively and defensively. Rusty Reeder and Larry Davis did a lot of good defensive playing to help keep good pressure on Ore City, while Bradley Moore and John Hines, both sophomores with no experience except ninth grade basketball to their credit, scored 10 and 11 points respectively, and had a good game overall.

The Redwater Dragons spoiled the Rebel's chance for an undefeated first half of district by a narrow margin of 62-61. The Rebels led by as much as 19 points at half time, but Redwater came out hot the third quarter and quickly scored eight unanswered points. The Rebels lead stayed at 11 points until about four minutes were left in the

fourth period. Then the bottom fell out as the Rebels went stone cold, hitting only three of 12 free throws which spelled defeat. The Rebels still had every opportunity to win the game with five seconds left and a 1-1 free shot but missed. Then Redwater was fouled with one second left and Terry Stinson, who was only two of six at the line, made both free throws to give Redwater the victory. The Rebel's will now await the outcome of Tuesday's game where Ore City is at Maud. A victory by Maud will give the Rebels the first half championship.

A win by Ore City will put Ore City in a tie with Rivercrest for the first half championship. This tie-off would not be played until the end of the season if it is necessary.

Tuesday night will find Rivercrest open, Ore City at Maud, Redwater at James

Bowie, and New Diana at Harmony. The Rivercrest Rebels will start the second half of District 20-AA action Friday night as they travel to Simms to challenge the James Bowie Pirates. The Rebels will be attempting to start the second half out on a good note by defeating James Bowie as they did earlier in district action.

The Rebel's remaining home district games will be on Tuesday nights, and this should help attendance. The home attendance has been tremendous so far this year.

In Tuesday's basketball action, Maud beat Ore City, making the Rivercrest Rebels first half District Champions.

worked in the bookkeeping department, credit department and served as a teller. He is now a Loan Officer with principal duties in the collection department.

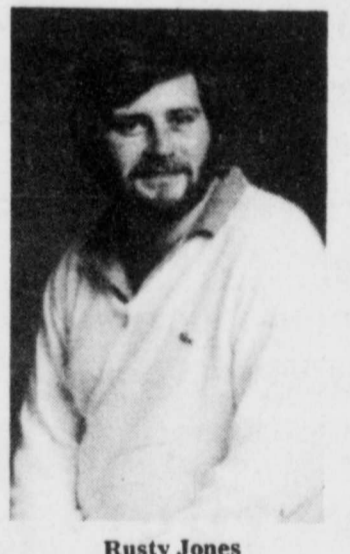
He is a graduate of East Texas State University with a BA Degree in Business Administration, married to the former Donna Ward of Bogata, and they have one son, Joshua.

Settlement Of Civil Suit May Come Soon

A tentative agreement for the settlement of the lawsuit filed against the City of Clarksville, Red River County and several law enforcement officers has been agreed to by both the City and the County Commissioners.

A special meeting of the Commissioners Court on Friday, January 30 was held and the court approved the offer made by attorney Jim D. Lovett on behalf of his

clients. Clients Glen Shadid and Peggy Mitchell have filed a Federal suit asking for \$300,150 in damages following and alleged brutality incident on September 10.

Clarksville Mayor Williamson had been granted authority to act by the City Council, and also has approved the terms offered.

Under the presently written agreement, Chief

Deputy Sheriff Doug Jackson, a co-defendant must also accept the agreement.

Jackson's attorney will consider the agreement, and it is hoped that next week it will be accepted.

Exact terms of the agreement were not made public, but the formation of a Public Review Board, an increased liability insurance, and a statement of policy on justice by both administrative bodies of the City and County would be included.

Census Analysis Shows District Changes

An analysis of preliminary 1980 census figures provided by Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby indicates that population changes over the past ten years will have an effect on both the Congressional District and the State Senatorial District which encompasses Franklin, Red River, Titus, and Lamar Counties.

According to the report, the overall state population is up 27 percent above the 1970 census figures, or a total of three million. The Texas growth rate, more than double the national rate of increase of 11.4 percent, reflects the much publicized move of the population to the "Sun Belt."

In general, the census figures reveal that the metropolitan areas of the state did not grow as quickly as some other areas. Locally, Franklin County's population grew from 5,291 in 1970 to 6,932 in 1980, an increase of 31.1 percent. Lamar County's population

grew from 36,062 to 41,745, an increase of 5,683 or 15.76 percent. Red River County grew from a population of 14,298 in 1970 to 15,946 in 1980, an increase of 1,648, or 11.53 percent. Titus County grew from 16,702 to 21,158, an increase of 4,456, or 26.68 percent.

Much of the population increase during the 1970's was located close to the major urban areas of the state, with the high growth areas immediately outside of the main metropolitan counties. Dallas and Tarrant counties increased 19.7 percent and 16.8 percent respectively; but Collin, Hood and Rockwall counties more than doubled. Denton, Ellis, Johnson, Parker and Wise counties grew substantially faster than the central counties, with only Kaufman growing at about the same rate as Dallas county.

Three additional congressional seats are due Texas because of the increase in population. In

order for the Texas Legislature to equalize the population of each district, present boundaries will have to be altered, and the size of the average district, whether congressional or senatorial, must also grow significantly.

In a letter accompanying the analysis, Gov. Hobby wrote, "The fact that Texas' growth has not been uniform among congressional districts, senatorial districts, or geographical areas, but concentrated in east and central Texas and in the suburban areas of the state means that some significant changes in district boundaries are all but inevitable."

The report continues, "In considering the redistricting of congressional seats by the 1981 session of the Legislature, the growth rate in state population together with the growth rate in the number of seats indicated that the overall ideal population will have to grow from 466,530 to 526,977 based on the preliminary

population data currently available for Texas.

Congressional District 1, in which Franklin, Titus, Lamar and Red River Counties are included, has experienced a population growth of 93,053 during the past 10 years, from 466,545 in 1970 to 559,598 in 1980, a 19.95 percent change. The figure is 35,438 above the ideal district figure, or 107 percent of ideal, which means that the area included in District 1 will have to be decreased.

As related to Texas Senatorial Districts, the ideal district size has grown from 361,247 in 1970 to 458,980 in 1980. Eight Texas districts, including Sen. Ed Howard's District 1, grew at a rate less than the state average. District 1, which includes Franklin, Lamar, Red River and Titus Counties, had an increase of 47,644, or 12.9 percent. The increase was less than the state average, or 91.6 percent ideal. Because of this, the size of the district will have to be increased to approach the ideal level.

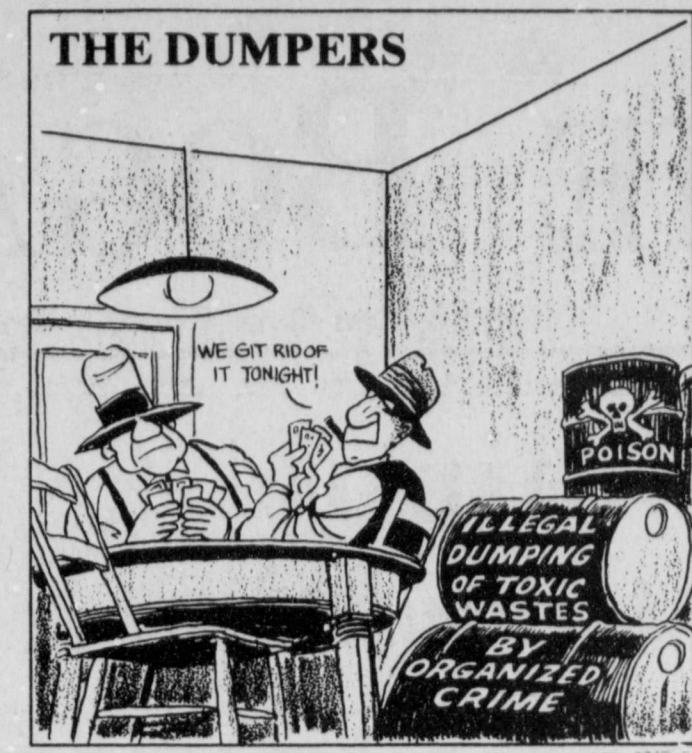

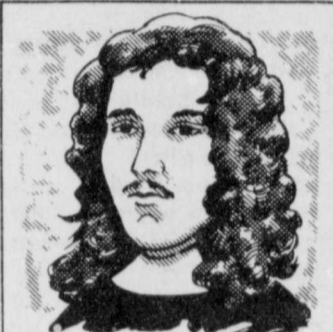

Decontrol Will Increase Revenue

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said President Reagan's early decontrol of crude oil prices could mean up to \$150 million more in state tax revenue this year. Bullock said Reagan's decision to speed up the decontrol of crude oil prices instead of waiting until October 1, to allow existing law to take off controls, will immediately hike up the price of domestic oil. The state collects a 4.6 percent tax on the market value of oil produced in the state and Bullock said the crude oil production tax will produce about \$3.1 billion in revenue during the state's 1981-83 budget period. Bullock estimated that

most of the money the state will earn from early decontrol will be taken in this fiscal year and that amount will push up the state's \$568 million surplus by whatever is collected before August 31. He said he would not formally revise his revenue estimate to the Legislature until more precise data becomes available. Federal decontrols of propane and gasoline will not earn the state extra income, Bullock said. The easing of controls on these petroleum products is likely to be met with consumer resistance because prices can be expected to go up.

If Texans use fewer gallons of gasoline or propane, the state will collect less in taxes on these products, he said. He said the decontrol impact on propane and gasoline would probably be minimal.

Texas sales during the month amounted to \$21,523,252, while sales for the first eight months of 1980 totaled \$192,143,237 with 69 percent of the yearly sales goal of \$280 million achieved.

More On Wheat Insect Situation

By Paul D. Payne
There is no one problem with area wheat plantings. This is the conclusion I have come to after inspecting several fields, visiting with many producers, chemical dealers and professional agricultural consultants. Probably the one thing that would improve the appearance of the wheat more than any other single thing would be the receipt of a good soaking rain. Even though we have some insect damage, some fertility deficiencies and other unknown abnormalities, a good rain would help the wheat overcome all of these problems.

The insect situation in the county varies from field to field. This past week I had the opportunity to inspect fields at Maxey, Midway, Shady Grove, Pattonville and Blossom and talked to producers in about every community in the county.

Some fields have a severe aphid problem and will need treatment or yields will be lowered. Other fields do have a severe winter grain mite infestation, but probably have not reached the economic damage level yet. Then there are some fields that have both and others that have a very low number of each.

What I want to impress upon you is the need for each producer to determine the insect infestation level in each field. Do not apply chemicals just because the neighbor down the road started spraying his field. Certainly, if you need to

spray, do so.

Many of you have asked for more assistance with finding the Winter Grain Mite. I have found the best way to spot the little rascals is to part the wheat back between the drill so that the sunlight reaches the ground and they will really move out. They do move very swiftly and if you have very many you can easily see them crawling. I would suggest that you not waste your time inspecting the plants for the mite. They will fall off very quickly to the soil when the plant is disturbed. If you examine them under a lens they are dark brown with yellowish legs.

Chemicals that do have label clearance for use on wheat for control of the Winter Grain Mite are methyl parathion, disulfoton and malathion. I have been told that other chemicals will do a good job, but these are the only ones that have label clearance.

For aphid control, dimethoate, disulfoton, malathion, parathion, and thinet have label clearance for use on wheat. Be sure to read label for grazing restrictions.

Remember that for most of these chemicals to be effective there needs to be at least two to three hours of 60 degree temperature after application of the chemical.

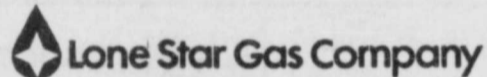
