## Bogata Man Charged In Rape

A Bogata man, Jim Bob Shipp, surrendered to authorities on Monday, March 2 after being charged with the rape of a 20-year old Bogata woman.

Theresa Allums told officers that she was returning home from the La Posada Club near Paris around 12:00 midnight on February 25. She was driving on FM 196 between Blossom and Deport and said that Shipp, whom she had spoken to briefly at the club, was following her. He began to flash his headlights at her, and finally she pulled over. She then

says that Shipp dragged her from her car and into his pickup, and drove to a side road off of FM 196 where the act was allegedly committed.

During the time the incident was allegedly taking place Lamar County Sheriff's officers had located Miss Allums vehicle with the door open, her purse and keys in it, and had towed it into Paris. They were initiating a search for the driver of the vehicle when they received a call from Red River County officers, reporting the alleged rape. Shipp had apparently taken Miss Allums back to

her vehicle, but found it gone. She then told officers that he drove her to the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Marcus Allums of Bogata, and pushed her out into the yard.

They called Red River County Sheriff's office and

the Red River County officers relayed the incident to Lamar County.

Charges were filed on Monday, March 2. At about 8:00 p.m. that evening, Shipp surrendered to officers, and appeared to have been severely beaten, prior to his surrender, Sheriff Roger

Peterson said. Officers took him to the emergency room at a Paris hospital for treatment, and he was then placed in jail.

Bond was set at \$10,000 on Tuesday, March 3, and was met soon thereafter. Shipp was released on that bond.

## Rebels Win District 20AA

The Rivercrest Rebels won the District 20AA Championship Tuesday, March 3, 1981 by out-hustling New Diana 71-60 in Pittsburg. The Rebels will play Sabine, the number one Class AA team

in the state, in Gladewater at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, March 10, 1981 in Bi-District competition.

The Rebels jumped to an early lead against New Diana, sinking nine points to two in the first four minutes of play. The Eagles rallied to tie the Rebels 14-14 by the end of the first quarter, and took the lead in the early minutes of the second quarter until James Strickland on a jump shot put the Rebels ahead 22-21. By halftime, the Rebels led 31-24.

The Rebels led by as many as 16 points in the third quarter, but the Eagles closed the gap to five points a couple of times in the fourth quarter.

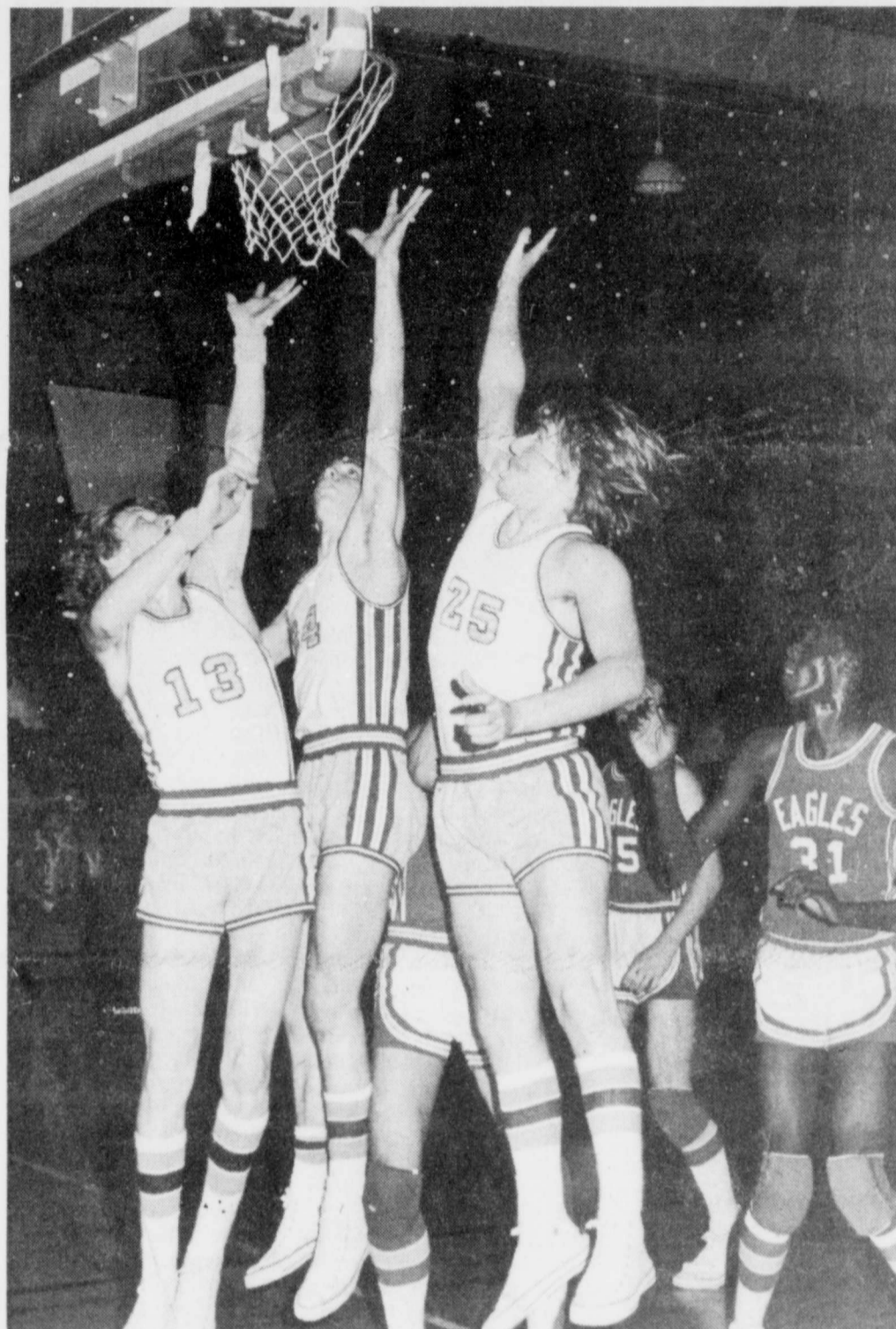
Action was extremely intense, with only the determination of the scrappy Rebel team the difference in the ball game.

This is the fifth time in the history of Rivercrest High School that the varsity boys have either tied or won their District Championship outright, Coach Wake Wood

said Wednesday, March 4. In 1968 the Rebels tied with Mt. Vernon, but the Tigers won in a playoff. In 1972 and 1974 the Rebels won the district outright, and in 1980 the Rebels tied for the title, but declared themselves ineligible. "We never got past bi-district," Wood said. "Maybe this is the year."

Sabine is a formidable opponent, one of three undefeated teams in all classes in the state. Sabine won the Class AA State Championship last year, and four starters are back this year. The lineup features players at 6'10", 6'7" and 6'5".

John Hines was high scorer for the Rebels with 20 points, with Stan Wood close behind with 18 points. David Wisinger made 10 points, Bubba Edge made nine, Bradley Moore six, James Strickland six and Rusty Reeder two.

## "Gag Order" Motion Denied

Judge William Wayne Justice in Eastern District Court in Tyler Friday, Feb. 27, 1981, denied both a "gag order" on attorneys and an attempt by attorneys Austin Guest of Clarksville and Hardy Moore of Paris to jointly defend both Donald Parks, a Clarksville police officer and the City of Clarksville. At the same time, the court held that no conflict existed and that Red River County Sheriff Bob Storey and Red River County could both be represented by the same attorney.

Guest said Monday, March 2, 1981 that he and Moore "are not going to remain in the case. We decided it would be better for us to withdraw."

Judge Justice wrote both orders before appearing in court Friday, based on the original motions alone and before a plea for intervention prepared for The Bogata News by a Tyler law firm could be filed.

The "gag order," or an attempt by Guest and Moore to impose a Texas disciplinary rule on all attorneys in the case was denied, with the court citing two previous cases in which the ruling had been held unconstitutional by appellate courts. The order held that the disciplinary rules, "on their face, constitute a broad, prior restraint on freedom of expression which may be exercised by attorneys involved in a civil action. A restraint of this nature is 'the most serious and the least tolerable infringement on First Amendment rights.'"

Nebraska Press Association v. Stuart."

The court order cited a number of remedies which defendants could take if they feel that the published remarks of the lead counsel are creating unfavorable publicity, "including a motion for a change of venue, a postponement of the trial to allow public attention to subside, and searching questioning of prospective jurors."

The court required that Officer Parks must be represented by separate counsel from the City of Clarksville, holding that "the interests of these defendants and the integrity of the judicial process will best be served if the City of Clarksville retains counsel separate from the counsel who represents the individual defendant, Donald Parks, in this action...The court is not convinced that a knowing and intelligent waiver by these defendants of their right to separate counsel, if possible under the circumstances, would cure the unfairness inherent in the multiple representation of clients with potentially adverse interests."

Citing a possible adverse interest, the court brought forward a situation in which Parks could "contend that if the events alleged did in fact occur, he was acting at all times in good faith within the scope of his lawful, official duties. Conversely, the City of Clarksville might try to avoid liability by proving that this police officer was acting without authority and outside the scope of his

employment."

In allowing Sheriff Bob Storey and defendant Red River County to be jointly represented by counsel, Judge Justice quoted an opinion by the Court of Appeals, which states that a sheriff in the state of Texas "holds virtually absolute sway over the particular tasks or areas of responsibility entrusted to him by state statute and is accountable to no one other than the voters for his conduct therein...Thus, at least in those areas in which he alone, is the final authority or ultimate repository of county power, his official conduct and decisions must necessarily be considered those of one 'whose edicts or acts may fairly be said to represent official policy' for which the county may be held accountable under Section 1983."

The order further states that in the particular case in which the plaintiffs allege that Storey did not use proper screening and testing techniques in hiring deputies and did not provide proper supervision of his deputies in the Red River County Jail, that these areas "fall within the scope of duties where the sheriff is the final authority, the ultimate repository of county power...Thus, all of plaintiffs' allegations concerning Sheriff Storey pertain to those responsibilities which can be directly attributable to the county itself. Since the suit against Sheriff Storey is, in effect, a suit against the county as such, no conflict can potentially develop between the

interests of defendant Bob Storey and defendant Red River County in this litigation."

The suit, which alleges police brutality on the night of Sept. 10, 1981, was brought by plaintiffs Glen Shadid and Peggy Mitchell against Sheriff Storey, Deputy Doug Jackson, Deputy Kelly Slaton, Officer Parks, the City of Clarksville and Red River County.

## Residential Burglaries Are Serious Area Problem

According to Charles M. Cobb, District Attorney, 76th Judicial District of Texas, residential burglaries have become one of the most serious crime problems in the area. This is true because of the large and increasing number of this type of crime and because of the large cost in each case in terms of property lost and damage done.

All law enforcement agencies in Titus, Camp and Morris Counties are making special efforts to prevent and solve burglaries. Unfortunately, man-power limitations make it impossible to prevent this type of crime altogether. The District Attorney's office urges all to help by being watchful and reporting any activity which might be related to burglary to the appropriate law enforcement agency.

The District Attorney's office, with the approval and cooperation of District Judge B.D. Moye, will also be making a special effort in the

I was reading in the paper about the baseball players that might go on strike, and it took me back to spring when I was small and we all played baseball.

We never thought about striking, we only worried about having enough kids to play. We usually had only six or seven on each side, but it kept us out of mischief. We usually played until dark, or until someone got mad, whichever came first.

We used whatever ball was handy. One was homemade. My grandmother made it for me. She would find an old wool sock or sweater, then unravel it. Then we found a small rubber ball and would wind the string around and around. Then she took a needle and sewed the ball so it wouldn't unravel.

Nowadays most grandmothers just dig in their purse and give the child enough money to go and buy a ball.

There wasn't any little league when I grew up. We didn't have anything like a uniform, store bought ball, or managers.

Another thing my grandmother used to do was play ball with us! It didn't make any difference to her what kind of game it was, she was good at all of them, and we really had to work to beat her.

She could tell you the batting average of nearly all the players in the Texas league. That was the league we were interested in back then. We didn't have radios and TV like small towns do now. So it was the local league and the Texas league, which was in the paper.

There were some good players in the small town leagues. Deport and Bogata had a very good team each, and when they played one another, it was a hard game. There was an awful lot of town pride on those games.

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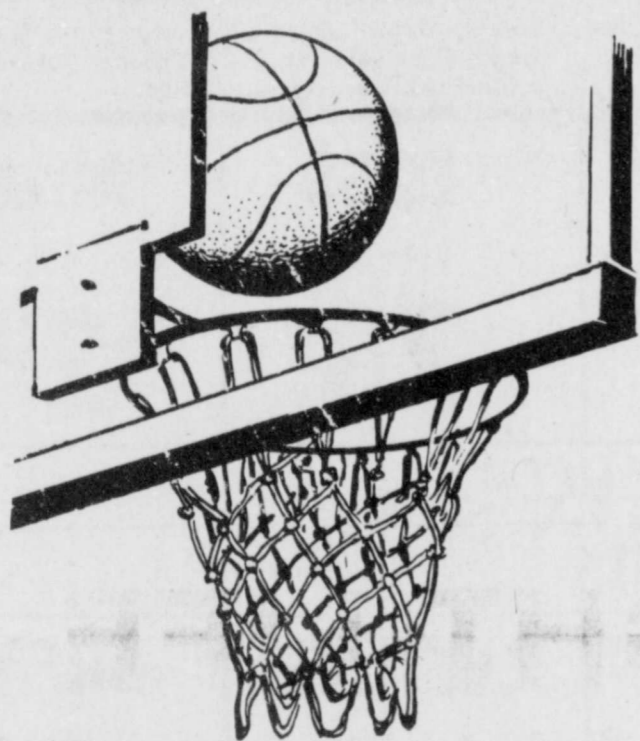
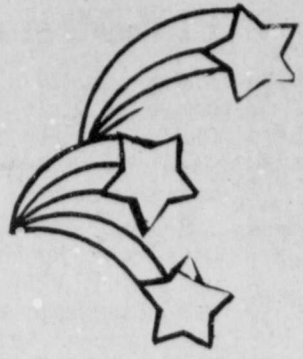
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1 loaf French bread, sliced in half lengthwise

## PUBLIC NOTICE OF TAX EXEMPTIONS AVAILABLE TO HOMEOWNERS

The Talco-Bogata Independent School District tax office is currently accepting applications for residence homestead exemptions. The deadline for filing is April 1, 1981. Applications should be filed as early as possible to avoid inconvenience to the homeowner.

Two types of homestead exemptions from school taxes are available to taxpayers who owned their residence homesteads in this school district on January 1 of this year. First, the general homestead exemption is available to all homeowners and exempts \$5,000 from the market value of the homestead.

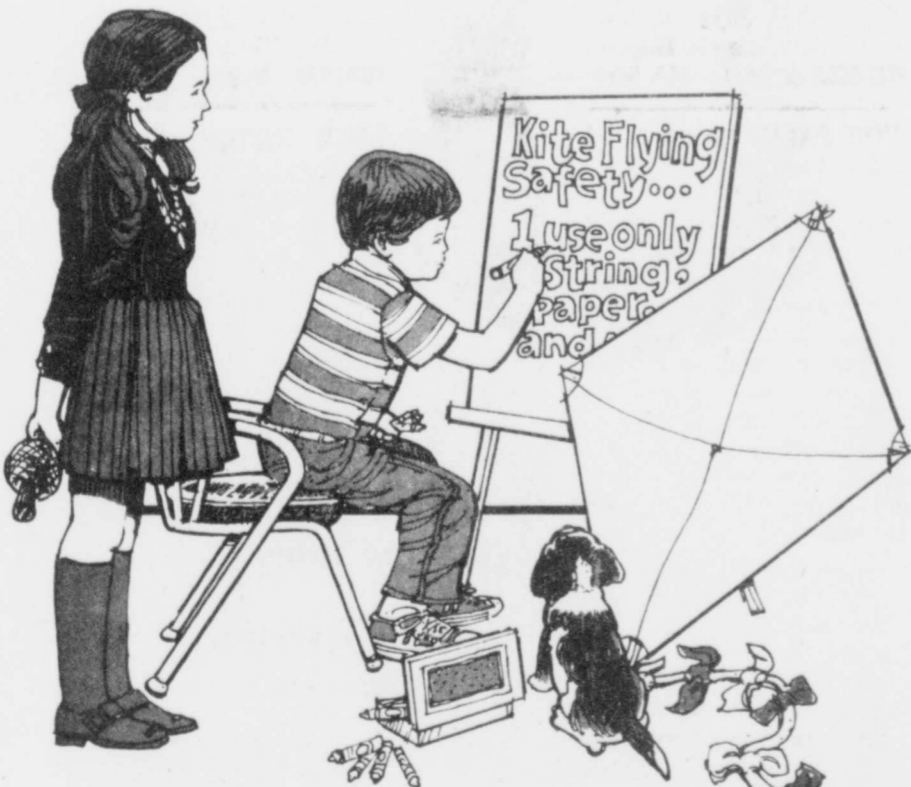
Second, any person who is 65 years of age or older or who is disabled can be exempted an additional \$10,000 from the market value of the homestead. Proof of age or disability may be necessary.

"Disabled," in this case, refers to the definition found in the Federal Old-Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance Act under the Social Security Administration. Disability is defined as inability to engage in any substantial gainful employment which exist in the national economy, or, in the case of someone who is 55 and blind, inability by reason of such blindness to engage in the employment in which he was previously engaged. The person claiming disability does not necessarily have to be drawing benefits from Social Security.

Homeowners age 65 or older who apply for their exemption will be granted a tax freeze. If application is not made, the tax freeze will be lost for this year.

Application forms were mailed earlier to all homeowners who qualified for a homestead exemption in 1980. If you did not receive an application, or if you have questions about qualifying for exemptions or filing application forms, contact the school tax office at 632-5205.

Application forms may also be picked up at the tax office at Rivercrest High School.
