Vandals Set Back Community Center Restoration

Vandals have caused a serious set back in plans by the Bogata Lions Club to restore the old Bogata Community Center.

The Lions had raised enough money to repair, reroof and remodel the structure, which is located at the city park, also under renovation.

As part of the project the Bogata Boy Scouts rebuilt a bridge, making a sturdy, excellent bridge to replace the old one, which was impassable.

Shortly thereafter someone, whether at separate times or only once, vandalized the building. Ceiling tile were completely destroyed, and a wall kicked in. Other damage was less severe, but the total of damage was so heavy that funds will no longer cover remodeling.

Although other projects, such as a donkey basketball game scheduled for May are in the works, the renovation will be delayed for an indefinite length of time now.

The community center would be definite benefit to the community, providing a place for activities such as suppers, entertainment, meetings and numerous other things.

The Lions have asked that whoever did the damage consider how senseless and

Historic Deport Cemetery Needs Funds

The Deport Cemetery south of town was already forty years old when the city was incorporated in 1911. Maybe older. The oldest marked grave in the cemetery is dated 1871. There may be even older unmarked graves.

Several of Deport's pioneer citizens are buried there, as are many of their children and grandchildren. So, the burial place is one of the city's chief historical sites.

It is also one of the city's most neglected. No longer used, it was overgrown with weeds and bushes until 1971 when a cemetery association was formed and a caretaker hired to clean and mow the grounds during the weed and grass season.

Ed Bryson was named president, Marvin Nobles was chosen vice-president and Edith Fuller elected secretary-treasurer. Columbus Picklesimer was hired as the first caretaker and later was succeeded by Jinks Whittle who still has the job.

Fish Delivered To Local Pond Owners

Over 6,000 channel catfish, 1500 redear bream and 45 pounds of fathead minnows were delivered to local pond owners Thursday, April 16. The delivery was arranged by the Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District.

The fishpond stocking program is sponsored by the Red River Co. SWCD as a service to local landowners. Since federal and state agencies no longer stock private waters, the small fish must be purchased from

private hatcheries. Prices of the fish this year are: channel Catfish and redear bream 25 cents each and fathead minnows \$5.50 per pound. A small amount of hybrid bass was also delivered at 75 cents each.

The district may have another delivery during the fall months, providing sufficient interest is shown by pond owners. Orders must be prepaid to the Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Fresh Strawberry Shortcake is THE April dessert, in my opinion. Recipes and methods of putting the shortcake together vary from cook to cook. My favorite is made by splitting individual shortcakes, hot from the oven, and layering with red-ripe strawberries, straight from the garden, and real whipped cream. I always serve the shortcakes on our prettiest dessert plates and with our silverest forks because they just seem to go together.

Here is the recipe for Favorite Strawberry Shortcake. It is delicious. And, it is quick and easy. Whip the cream and slice the strawberries, if you desire, during the 10 to 12 minutes the shortcakes are baking. Favorite Strawberry Shortcake (serves 4 to 6, depending upon size of shortcakes) 1 quart ripe, fresh

strawberries, rinsed, drained and hulled. 1 pint whipping cream Shortcakes: 2 and one third cups Bisquick baking mix 3 Tbsp. sugar 3 Tbsp. butter, melted 1/2 cup milk Heat oven to 425degrees F. Mix ingredients until soft dough forms. Gently smooth into a ball on a floured surface. Knead the dough 8 to 10 times Roll 3/8 inch thick. Cut with 3 or 4 1/2 inch cutter dipped in flour or baking mix Bake on ungreased cookie sheet until golden brown, 10 to 12 minutes. Split each shortcake when it comes from the oven. Top the bottom layer with whipped cream then strawberries. Put on the top layer and repeat the layers of whipped cream and strawberries. Serve immediately!



Footprints From The Past

I was out planting black eyed peas in the garden the other day, and I got to thinking of the time when Mother told me to plant some peas in the garden.

Now, I thought I had a lot more exciting things to do than planting peas and didn't think to much of the idea.

I went to the field and planted the peas where Mon told me to, but that night it came a big rain and washed all the peas in to the ditch.

Now I didn't plant those peas in the ditch, but that's where they came up, and to this day my folks still think that's where I planted them.

My mother thought I had thrown the peas away rather than plant them, and boy,

was she put out with me.

Farm families used to always plant a garden, that was what provided food for the winter. There weren't any deep freezers then.

Dad and Mom would plant a big garden, and mom and sis would always can everything that came out of it.

It was a busy time when canning took place.

Fruit jars had to be washed, lids bought and the fruit or vegetables had to be put in the jars, boiled, packed and stored.

We always had a lot of pickles, tomatoes and such in the jars. There were no fresh vegetables to be bought in stores back then.

Dad would always dig his Irish potatoes and spread them out so they would dry out and not rot. We ate them all summer and in the fall he dug the sweet potatoes and the turnips. Dad would then dig a shallow pit and line it with hay and put Irish potatoes on one end, turnips in the middle and sweet potatoes in the other end. He then covered all with hay and dirt. When we wanted fresh potatoes or turnips we dug them out.

Nothing tasted better back then than fresh eggs from the hens, homemade sausage, home made busquits and some good sorghum syrup made locally.

The work was hard, but boy, the rewards were worth it.



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
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
